From the Pastor's Desk

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ

What is powerful in all three readings this weekend is the admonition not to recall the past: the sinfulness that led to Israel's destruction and exile; the past life of Paul lived as a slave to the Law of Moses and its strict interpretation; the past life lived as a slave to sin.

Rather, the future is the thing on which the faithful person should place all their hopes: the New Life opening up in the wilderness of despair; the New Life that flows from the Resurrection of Christ Jesus; the New Life that comes through liberation from Sin.

In the week ahead, as we prepare for Holy Week's commencement next Sunday, let's reflect on how we are living the New Life in Christ that being a baptised Christian calls us to. Let's reflect on Paul's prophetic words: "I am racing for the finish, for the prize to which God calls us upwards to receive in Christ Jesus".

Let us continue to pray for each other, my friends, as the weeks of Lent are coming to a conclusion.

Spiritual Reflection

POPE FRANCIS ON RETREAT



The Church must not shine the spotlight on herself but instead on Christ, and She still has some work to do in this regard. This was stressed by Fr. Ermes Ronchi, the priest leading the spiritual exercises for Pope Francis and Roman Curia members, currently participating in their Lenten retreat. The preacher made this point during this morning's meditation, as he reflected on the Gospel account where Peter professes his faith in Christ as the Son of God. Noting that this was preceded by Jesus asking the disciples who they thought He was, Father Ronchi said in this way Christ is not giving lessons or suggesting replies based on what other people say about Him, but rather urges His Apostles to look into their own hearts. Jesus, the priest explained, wants to know if His disciples have opened their hearts to God who is living inside them, so they "can be the cradle or the tomb of God." The preacher also underscored that Jesus warned His Apostles that following Him means "an appointment with a man on the Cross." Fr. Ronchi highlighted that Christ doesn't sacrifice anyone else's life, just His own. Turning to the Church's role, the priest reminded the Pope and Curia, we are "the mediators between God and humanity." Like John the Baptist, he suggested, we are to prepare the path and then step to one side. Father Ronchi concluded, saying, "Think of the beauty of a Church that does not shine the spotlight on herself" but instead on Christ, and warned that we still have some progress to make on this point."

Gospel *John 8:1-11*

Let the person without sin be the first to throw a stone.

Jesus went to the Mount of Olives. At daybreak he appeared in the Temple again; and as all the people came to him, he sat down and began to teach them.

The scribes and Pharisees brought a woman along who had been caught committing adultery; and making her stand there in full view of everybody, they said to Jesus, 'Master, this woman was caught in the very act of committing adultery, and Moses has ordered us in the Law to condemn women like this to death by stoning. What have you to say?' They asked him this as a test, looking for something to use against him. But Jesus bent down and started writing on the ground with his finger. As they persisted with their question, he looked up and said, 'If there is one of you who has not sinned, let him be the first to throw a stone at her.' Then he bent down and wrote on the ground again. When they heard this they went away one by one, beginning with the eldest, until Jesus was left alone with the woman, who remained standing there. He looked up and said, 'Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?' 'No one, sir,' she replied. 'Neither do I condemn you,' said Jesus 'go away, and don't sin any more."

Reflection on Readings

All three Readings for this Fifth Sunday of Lent (Year C) speak of the need that faithful people have to forget the past and concentrate on the future, a future dull of promise, the promise of New Life.

The First Reading from the Prophet Isaiah has 2nd Isaiah speaking to the People of Israel in exile in Babylon. He encourages them to look to the future rather than dwell on the destruction of the Temple and the Jewish State: "No need to recall the past, no need to think about what was done before". Rather there is something new that is happening: "I am making a road in the wilderness, paths in the wild". And thus the people should give praise to God for the New Life that will be theirs.

The Second Reading from Paul's Letter to the Philippians also sings the praises of God, for Paul rejoices in the fact that he has been called to New Life in Christ: "... I look on everything as so much rubbish if only I can have Christ". His old life of justification through the works of the Law of Moses is considered by Paul as something useless (rubbish) for salvation with comes through Faith in Christ is the future towards which he looks. As he says: "I am no longer trying for perfection by my own efforts....(rather) I want only the perfection that comes through faith in Christ".

And the woman caught in adultery who was brought before Jesus as recorded in today's Gospel receives compassion from Jesus, not condemnation. Yes, she had sinned, but the past is forgiven, and she must now strive to live a good life in the future. The woman receives liberation from her past life and is invited to walk new paths that lead to New Life.

Why we do what we do......

Palm Sunday is the final Sunday of Lent, the beginning of Holy Week, and commemorates the triumphant arrival of Christ in Jerusalem, days before he was crucified.

Palm Sunday is known as such because the faithful will often receive palm fronds which they use to participate in the reenactment of Christ's arrival in Jerusalem. In the Gospels, Jesus entered Jerusalem riding a young donkey, and to the lavish praise of the townspeople who threw clothes, or possibly palms or small branches, in front of him as a sign of homage. This was a customary practice for people of great respect.

Palm branches are widely recognized symbol of peace and victory, hence their preferred use on Palm Sunday.

The use of a donkey instead of a horse is highly symbolic, it represents the humble arrival of someone in peace, as opposed to arriving on a steed in war.

A week later, Christ would rise from the dead on the first Easter.

During Palm Sunday Mass, palms are distributed to parishioners who carry them in a ritual procession into church. The palms are blessed and many people will fashion them into small crosses or other items of personal devotion. These may be returned to the church, or kept for the year.

Because the palms are blessed, they may not be discarded as trash. Instead, they are appropriately gathered at the church and incinerated to create the ashes that will be used in the follow year's Ash Wednesday observance.

The colours of the Mass on Palm Sunday are red and white, symbolizing the redemption in blood that Christ paid for the world.


