

#### From the Pastor's desk

With today's Feast of the Ascension begins the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.

Last week I spoke of the all-encompassing love of Jesus Christ that, as Christians, we are called to emulate. To be like the Lord demands that we ignore distinctions, and that we make certain our love is offered to all. During this *Week of Prayer for Christian Unity*, let's make certain that we pray for all those who try to follow Jesus and His Gospel in their lives.

In the future, we should aim to build on the good relationship that already exists between St. John XXIII Parish and Quakers Hill Uniting Church. Let's make certain that, in twelve months' time, we host an Ecumenical Prayer event for all Christians in our local area, so that the words of Jesus in John 17 may become a reality: "Father, that they may all be ONE"!

We pray in a particular way this week for all the children in the Sacramental Programme who will be making their First Communion during all masses next weekend. As already mentioned, there will be an extra Parish Mass on Sunday 24<sup>th</sup> May at 12:00 midday. Furthermore, next Sunday is Pentecost Sunday, when we pray for a new outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon us all.

One final point. The children are being trained in the correct way of receiving Communion in the Hand (or on the tongue if they prefer). Let's make certain we re-look at our own physical practice of Reception of the Blessed Eucharist. Let's make certain we are receiving the host correctly. If we receive on the hand, let's place our primary hand under the other so that AFTER THE PRIEST or MINISTER has placed it on our hand, we can then pick it and consume the host BEFORE RETURNING to our seat. If on the tongue, then please truly stick your tongue out so that the Priest or minister has something to place the host on! Furthermore, everyone in the Church is welcome to receive a Blessing from the Priest if you can't, for whatever reason, receive the Lord in the Eucharist at this time. The minister can make the Christian's Sign of the Cross on your forehead as we do at Baptism. The blessings offered by Fr. Robert or myself at the end of Communion time are for the children who have NOT yet made their First Communion.

God bless you all.

Let us continue to pray for one another.

#### Evangelicum

(We continue with the Pope's announcement of the Year of Mercy, and his reflection on the concept of Mercy)

Mercy is the very foundation of the Church's life. All of her pastoral activity should be caught up in the tenderness she makes present to believers; nothing in her preaching and in her witness to the world can be lacking in mercy. The Church's very credibility is seen in how she shows merciful and compassionate love. The Church "has an endless desire to show mercy." Perhaps we have long since forgotten how to show and live the way of mercy. The temptation, on the one hand, to focus exclusively on justice made us forget that this is only the first, albeit necessary and indispensable step. But the Church needs to go beyond and strive for a higher and more important goal. On the other hand, sad to say, we must admit that the practice of mercy is waning in the wider culture. It some cases the word seems to have dropped out of use. However, without a witness to mercy, life becomes fruitless and sterile, as if sequestered in a barren desert. The time has come for the Church to take up the joyful call to mercy once more. It is time to return to the basics and to bear the weaknesses and struggles of our brothers and sisters. Mercy is the force that reawakens us to new life and instils in us the courage to look to the future with hope.

Let us not forget the great teaching offered by Saint John Paul II in his second Encyclical, Dives in Misericordia, which at the time came unexpectedly, its theme catching many by surprise. There are two passages in particular to which I would like to draw attention. First, Saint John Paul II highlighted the fact that we had forgotten the theme of mercy in today's cultural milieu: "The present-day mentality, more perhaps than that of people in the past, seems opposed to a God of mercy, and in fact tends to exclude from life and to remove from the human heart the very idea of mercy. The word and the concept of 'mercy' seem to cause uneasiness in man, who, thanks to the enormous development of science and technology, never before known in history, has become the master of the earth and has subdued and dominated it (cf. Gen 1:28). This dominion over the earth, sometimes understood in a one-sided and superficial way, seems to have no room for mercy... And this is why, in the situation of the Church and the world today, many individuals and groups guided by a lively sense of faith are turning, I would say almost spontaneously, to the mercy of God".

Furthermore, Saint John Paul II pushed for a more urgent proclamation and witness to mercy in the contemporary world: "It is dictated by love for man, for all that is human and which, according to the intuitions of many of our contemporaries, is threatened by an immense danger. The mystery of Christ... obliges me to proclaim mercy as God's merciful love, revealed in that same mystery of Christ. It likewise obliges me to have recourse to that mercy and to beg for it at this difficult, critical phase of the history of the Church and of the world". This teaching is more pertinent than ever and deserves to be taken up once again in this Holy Year. Let us listen to his words once more: "The Church lives an authentic life when she professes and proclaims mercy – the most stupendous attribute of the Creator and of the Redeemer – and when she brings people close to the sources of the Saviour's mercy, of which she is the trustee and dispenser".



# First Reading Acts 1:1-11

Why are you standing here looking into the sky? Jesus has been taken into heaven.

In my earlier work, Theophilus, I dealt with everything Jesus had done and taught from the beginning until the day he gave his instructions to the apostles he had chosen through the Holy Spirit, and was taken up to heaven. He had shown himself alive to them after his Passion by many demonstrations: for forty days he had continued to appear to them and tell them about the kingdom of God. When he had been at table with them, he had told them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for what the Father had promised. 'It is' he had said 'what you have heard me speak about: John baptised with water but you, not many days from now, will be baptised with the Holy Spirit.'

Now having met together, they asked him, 'Lord, has the time come? Are you going to restore the kingdom to Israel?' He replied, 'It is not for you to know times or dates that the Father has decided by his own authority, but you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you, and then you will be my witnesses not only in Jerusalem but throughout Judaea and Samaria, and indeed to the ends of the earth.'

As he said this he was lifted up while they looked on, and a cloud took him from their sight. They were still staring into the sky when suddenly two men in white were standing near them and they said, 'Why are you men from Galilee standing here looking into the sky? Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven, this same Jesus will come back in the same way as you have seen him go there.'

#### Reflection on the Reading

Today's Feast of the Ascension celebrates the 'turning point' between Jesus' Mission on earth in His own person and the mission continued by his followers in the Church. This is a mission which involves the proclamation of the Words and Deeds of the Lord, in the hope that they6 will lead to the conversion necessary for all human beings to encounter the Risen Jesus.

# What does the Ascension mean for us today?

The Ascension is Good News indeed! We believe that we will experience Resurrection after Death. The Ascension tells us that this experience of New Life will involve being with the Father and the Son forever. It speaks to us of our FUTURE.

But, beyond this Truth, the Ascension speaks to us of another truth that is live out in our day-to-day lives: in coming to a closer relationship with God, we are more often than not SENT to others!

We are reborn in Baptism, and from that point onwards our whole life's journey is a continuous experience of Ascension to God and Return from Him in the Spirit to be of service to our brothers and sisters. Our New Life in Christ is thus not just modelled on the Resurrection, but on the Ascension as well! In prayer and in our daily tasks we 'ascend' to the Father: that is, we offer ourselves and our experience up to God as a pleasing sacrifice (just like

Jesus offered His life to the Father). But, as St. John says: 'it is for your own good that I am going because unless I go, the Advocate (the Holy Spirit) will not come to you" (john 16:7ab). Thus, the consequence of these 'Ascension' experiences in life is the further experience of being 'sent back' to our neighbour with the strength of the Holy Spirit to express the unconditional love of Jesus Christ to them!

Perhaps in this week of preparation for Pentecost, we can reflect on the Ascension experiences in our lives, and prepare for the Pentecost even of being sent out to all for the renewal of the whole world!!

## What Does the Bible Say About Church Giving? - con't The Widow's Offering

I see at least three important things about giving in this story of the widow's offering:

### 1 God values our offerings differently than men do.

In God's eyes, the value of the offering is not determined by the amount of the offering. The text says that the wealthy gave large amounts, but the widow's offering was of much higher value because she gave all that she had. It was a costly sacrifice. Note that Jesus did not say she put in more than any of the others; he said she put in more than all the others.

### 2 Our attitude in giving is important to God.

The text says Jesus "watched the crowd putting their money into the temple treasury." Jesus observed the people as they gave their offerings, and he watches us today as we give. If we give to be seen by men or with a stingy heart toward God, our offering loses its value. Jesus is more interested and impressed by how we give than what we give.

We see this same principle in the story of Cain and Abel. God evaluated Cain and Abel's offerings. Abel's offering was pleasing in God's eyes, but he rejected Cain's. Rather than giving to God out of thankfulness and worship, Cain may have presented his offering with evil or selfish intent. Maybe he had hoped to receive special recognition. Regardless, Cain knew the right thing to do, but he didn't do it. God even gave Cain an opportunity to make things right, but he chose not to.

This illustrates again that God watches what and how we give. God not only

cares about the quality of our gifts to him, but also the attitude in our hearts as we offer them.

#### 3 God doesn't want us to be overly concerned with how our offering is spent.

At the time Jesus observed this widow's offering, the temple treasury was managed by the corrupt religious leaders of that day. But Jesus did not mention anywhere in this story that the widow should not have given to the temple.

Although we should do what we can to ensure that the ministries we give to are good stewards of God's money, we can't always know for certain that the money we give will be spent correctly. We should not be overly burdened with this concern, nor should we use this as an excuse not to give. It's important for us to find a good church that is wisely managing its financial resources for God's glory and for the growth of God's kingdom. But once we give to God, we don't need to worry about what happens to the money. This is God's problem to resolve. If a church leader or a ministry misuses its funds, God knows how to deal with them.

### We rob God when we fail to give offerings to him.

Malachi 3:8 - Will a man rob God? Yet you rob me. But you ask, 'How do we rob you?' In tithes and offerings. (NIV)

This verse speaks for itself, don't you think?

# The picture of our financial giving simply reveals a reflection of our lives surrendered to God.

Romans 12:1 - Therefore, I urge you, brothers, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God—this is your spiritual act of worship. (NIV)



When we truly recognize all that Christ has done for us, we will want to offer ourselves wholly to God as a living sacrifice of worship to him. Our offerings will flow freely from a heart of gratitude.

A Challenge

In conclusion, I'd like to explain my personal convictions and offer a challenge to my readers. As I've already stated, I believe tithing is no longer the law. As New Testament believers, we are under no legal obligation to give a tenth of our income. However, my husband and I feel strongly that the tithe ought to be the starting point of our giving. We see it as the minimum to give, a demonstration that everything we have belongs to God.

We also believe most of our giving should go to the local church (the storehouse) where we are fed God's Word and nurtured spiritually. *Malachi 3:10* says, "Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house. Test me in this,' says the LORD Almighty, 'and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that there will not be room enough to store it.""

If you're not currently giving to the Lord, I challenge you to start by making a commitment. Give something faithfully and regularly. I'm certain God will honour and bless your commitment. If a tenth seems too overwhelming, consider making it a goal. Giving may feel like a huge sacrifice at first, but I'm confident you'll eventually discover its rewards.

God wants believers to be free from the love of money, which the Bible says in 1 Timothy 6:10 is "a root of all kinds of evil." Giving honours the Lord and allows his work to go forward. It also helps build our faith. We may experience times of financial hardship when we can't give as much, but the Lord still wants us to trust Him in times of lack. He, not our paycheck, is our provider. He will meet our daily needs.

A friend of my pastor once told him that financial giving is not God's way of raising money--it's his way of raising children.

#### WORKING WITH CHILDREN CHECK (WWCC)

#### NOTE FOR ALL PARISHIONERS

Anyone who is a member of the following Parish Groups MUST get a Working with Children Check (WWCC) from the RMS/Services NSW Registry.

Requirement applies for the following groups: Sacramental Team Members, Special Religious Education teaches and helpers (SRE), Sunday School Children's Liturgy teachers, Altar Ministers, Youth Leaders over 18 years of age, Choir members who have children/youth under 18, St Vincent de Paul team Members, Youth for Christ, Couples for Christ, etc.

If you belong to any of the above groups, please:

- 1. Go to the www.kidsguardian.nsw.gov.au > Working with children and register
- 2. When you receive your letter/email notifying you of your registration number proceed to RMS/Services NSW Registry to apply for the WWCC#
- 3. When you receive the final confirmation of your number please take this letter to the Parish Office.

There is an **URGENT** need for some parishioners to catch up with our Parish Office to follow up on additional details required by the Office for Safeguarding and Professional Standards in Parramatta:

- A copy of their WWCC letter giving their WWCC number, age, expiry date of WWCC.
- 2. A required form (1/2 page) in the Parish Office.

The Parish Office needs the above completed and copy is sent to the Parramatta Diocese. This office will inform WWCC holders when renewal is needed in 5 years.


