From the Pastor's desk

Sisters and Brothers

This weekend we celebrate Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday.

Let's acknowledge the Darug People who were the original custodians of the Land on which we meet today.

We pay our respects to elders past and present, and acknowledge the Aboriginal People for their custodianship of this Land.

Let's strive to work together for a united Nation that respects this Land and values the contribution to our community and culture of all people of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander heritage.

Some points to highlight in the coming weeks:

- The **building works** on the Roof are coming on. We hope to finish by the end of the week (especially as there is a Wedding on Friday 10th July!).
- This weekend will be another chance for the **Census Cards** to be filled in. If you have not had a chance to do so before now, please fill it in before leaving for Home after Mass.

- The RCIA will commence with Enquiry Nights in August: Thursday 20th August and Wednesday 26th August. Any Enquirer is invited to attend one of the two evenings, which will commence at 7:30pm in the Parish Kitchen. More details soon. In the meantime, if you know of anyone who may be interested in becoming a Catholic Christian, then invite them to come to one of these evenings.





Evangelicum

(Continuing the summary of the Pope's Encyclical on the Environment from the ACBC website)

The dialogue that Pope Francis proposes as a method for addressing and resolving the environmental problems is followed throughout the Encyclical. It refers to contributions by philosophers and theologians, not only Catholic but also Orthodox (the already cited Patriarch Bartholomew) and Protestant (the French thinker Paul Ricoeur) as well as the Islamic mystic Ali Al-Khawas. The same occurs in the key of that collegiality that Pope Francis has proposed to the Church since the beginning of his ministry: alongside the references to the teachings of his predecessors and of other Vatican documents (in particular of the Pontifical Council for Justice and Peace), there are many taken from numerous Episcopal Conferences from all continents. At the heart of Laudato si' we find this question: "What kind of world do we want to leave to those who come after us, to children who are now growing up?" (160). Pope Francis continues: "This question does not have to do with the environment alone and in isolation; the issue cannot be approached piecemeal". This leads us to ask ourselves about the meaning of existence and its values at the base of social life: "What is the purpose of our life in this world? Why are we here? What is the goal of our work and all our efforts? What need does the earth have of us?" Unless we struggle with these deeper issues - says the Pope - I do not believe that our concern for ecology will produce significant results."

It is clear that, after Laudato si', the examination of conscience, the instrument that the Church has always recommended to orient one's life by reflection on one's lived relationship with the Lord, should include a new dimension. One would regularly review, not only how one has lived in communion with God, with others and with oneself, but also with all creatures and with nature. The attention that the media has given to the Encyclical before its publication has primarily concentrated on aspects tied to the environmental policies currently being discussed on the global agenda. Certainly Laudato si' can and must have an impact on important and urgent decisions to be made in this area. However, the magisterial, pastoral and spiritual dimensions of the document must not be put in second place. Its value, breadth and depth cannot be reduced to the mere scope of determining environmental policies.

Gospel Reflection

In this Sunday's Second Reading, Paul writes that "When I am weak, then I am strong". Many people are too proud to admit that they are weak, that they may have failed in some way. And so they continue on their merry way, often compounding their failure by refusing to ask for the Lord's help. Such people are described by Ezekiel in the First Reading as 'rebels'...those who have turned to their own pursuits and neglected their relationship with God.

We know that the same problem of being too proud to admit mistakes occurred in the life and ministry of Jesus. People only saw what they wanted to. They failed to discern the presence of God in the carpenter from Nazareth. Indeed, in today's Gospel from Mark, we see the Pharisee and the Sadducees, the Jewish leadership, as well as the people of Jesus' own home town as being too proud, too self-assured, too sure of their own 'rightness' in matters of religion, too blind – to see that God could work in ways different from theirs!

At times, we find ourselves categorising people, placing them in little boxes of our own making.

What energies are suppressed, discouraged!

What joys smothered by final judgement on those we think we know!

Our Loving God calls us to see His Hand at work:

- In the ordinary events of life
- In the people around us with whom we live and work
- In those we may categorise as 'untouchables' and file them away!

Indeed, God calls us to see Him in the weak...

- People like Paul of Tarsus: a sinner, a weak and fragile human beings, whose weakness became strength through the power of God
- People like Jesus of Nazareth: an ordinary man from an ordinary town, but the One Sent by God for the salvation of All!

We need to open our eyes at times, acknowledge our need of God's mercy, and see God's power at work in the weak and fragile of this world.

Let's pray for the grace of true discernment in the week ahead.

What we do why we do......

Why Do We Sing In Church?

Have you ever wondered why singing is part of our church services? Isn't church the place where we're supposed to learn about God? Doesn't God just want us to proclaim his word? After all it took him 1,500 years to put it all together. The least we could do is devote as much time as possible to expounding it. Certainly we all need to hear as much of it as we can.

Well, all of that is true. We are supposed to learn about God in his house. God wants us to hear what he has to say. And it is true that we all need to hear it in huge volumes. But God's word is so much more than a history book. It is more than just the greatest instruction manual ever written. And yes, it is more than a collection of stories designed to teach us lessons on morality. In fact, as you spend time in God's word you will find that he often mentions music and singing. The various verses and passages that mention music are also part of God's word and he wants us to hear those parts as well.



So, let's take a quick look at some of the things God has to say about this part of our worship services. Following are some verses directly from God's word that help to explain his view of music and most specifically singing.

- Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom; teaching and admonishing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord. (*Colossians 3:16*)
- Is any among you afflicted? let him pray. Is any merry? let him sing psalms. (James 5:13)
- Speaking to yourselves in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord; (*Ephesians 5:19*)
- Make a joyful noise unto the Lord, all ye lands. 2 Serve the Lord with gladness: come before his presence with singing (*Psalm 100:1-2*)
- Praise ye the Lord: for it is good to sing praises unto our God; for it is pleasant; and praise is comely. (*Psalm* 147:1)
- O come, let us sing unto the Lord: let us make a joyful noise to the rock of our salvation (*Psalm 95:1*)

Notice that the last three entries are from the book of Psalms. Did you realize that a Psalm is a poem set to music? The collection of Psalms we know today is the longest book of the Bible. It seems to me that God is saying that there is a place for singing in our worship of him.



Let's look at some examples of how some of the Bible characters we know so well included singing in their worship of God.


After God successfully delivered the Israelites from Egyptian bondage how did Moses celebrate? In chapter 15 of Exodus you will find the first song of worship recorded in scripture. Paul and Silas had been stripped and beaten. They were tired and sitting in a drab and dreary jail cell. What did they do? They proceeded to pray and sing praises to God while the other prisoners listened. (*Acts* 16:25)

Jesus during his last hours as a free man led his disciples in song after the Passover meal and before venturing out to the garden of Gethsemane. Can you imagine the thrill the disciples must have felt as their Lord encouraged them to sing by singing himself and giving praise to God? (Matthew 26:30)

So it seems clear that God endorses singing. As a matter of fact he encourages it and you might say that he commands us to sing.

Take another look at Psalm 100. The first 2 verses read: Make a joyful noise unto the Lord, all ye lands. 2 Serve the Lord with gladness: come before his presence with singing. It does not read: "why don't you make a joyful noise". It doesn't say "it might be a good idea to serve the Lord with gladness" and it doesn't just "suggest" that we come before his presence with singing.

This endorsement, encouragement, commandment is not just meant for those people who happen to have finely tuned vocal chords either. It starts out by saying: Make a joyful noise unto the Lord ALL YE LANDS. I take it that this means that everyone should be singing praises to God. So even if you don't feel like you have a great voice sing anyway. God wants to hear you sing.



Now, how you participate is your choice. You don't have to be a member of the choir and you don't have to sing solos or as part of special groups such as trios, quartets or ensembles. But at the very least you should open your mouth and sing what is in your heart along with the rest of the congregation when the time comes for that part of the worship service.

God gave us the gift of music and song. Join us in embracing and enjoying it.





A prophet is not welcome in their hometown
