(continuing the ACBC's summary of the Encyclical, Laudato Si')

IV. INTEGRAL ECOLOGY (137-162)

The heart of the Encyclical's proposals is integral ecology as a new paradigm of justice. It "will help to provide an approach to ecology which respects our unique place as human beings in this world and our relationship to our surroundings" (15). In fact, "nature cannot be regarded as something separate from ourselves or as a mere setting in which we live" (139). This holds true in all fields: in economy and politics, in different cultures and particularly in those most threatened, and even in every moment of our daily lives.

There is a relationship between environmental issues, and social and human issues, that can never be broken. "Today, the analysis of environmental problems cannot be separated from the analysis of human, family, work-related and urban contexts, and of how individuals relate to themselves" (141). Consequently, it is "essential to seek comprehensive solutions which consider the interactions within natural systems themselves and with social systems. We are not faced with two separate crises, one environmental and the other social, but rather one complex crisis which is both social and environmental" (139).

1. *Environmental, economic and social ecology*: Everything is connected. Time and space, physical, chemical and biological components of the planet, form a network that we will never fully understand. Fragmented and isolated knowledge must be integrated into a broader vision that considers "an interrelation between ecosystems and between the various spheres of social interaction" (141), and also involves the institutional level, because "the health of a society's institutions affects the environment and the quality of human life" (142).

2. *Cultural ecology*: "Ecology, then, also involves protecting the cultural treasures of humanity" (143) in the broadest sense. It is necessary to integrate the rights of peoples and cultures with the proactive involvement of local social actors from their own culture, with "particular concern for indigenous communities" (146).

3. *Ecology of daily life:* Integral ecology involves everyday life. The Encyclical gives particular attention to the urban environment. The human being has a great capacity for adaptation, and "an admirable creativity and generosity is shown by persons and groups who respond to environmental limitations by alleviating the adverse effects of their surroundings and learning to live productively amid disorder and uncertainty" (148). Nevertheless, authentic development presupposes an integral improvement in the quality of human life: public space, housing, transportation, etc. (150-154). The human dimension of ecology also implies "the relationship between human life and the moral law, which is inscribed in our nature" (155). "Our body itself establishes us in a direct relationship with



First Reading Exodus 16:2-4,12-15

I will rain bread from heaven upon you.

The whole community of the sons of Israel began to complain against Moses and Aaron in the wilderness and said to them, 'Why did we not die at the Lord's hand in the land of Egypt, when we were able to sit down to pans of meat and could eat bread to our heart's content! When the coating of dew lifted, there on the surface of the desert was a thing delicate, powdery, as fine as hoarfrost on the ground. When they saw this, the sons of Israel said to one another, 'What is that?' not knowing what it was. 'That' said Moses to them 'is the bread the Lord gives you to eat.'

Gospel Reflection

One theme that stares us in the face in today's Liturgy of the Word is that of "New Life"

In the Book of Exodus we see the People of Israel in the desert; and they are hungry. So, in order to keep them alive in the barren wilderness, God sends them quails and also manna (bread from Heaven). They did not realize that salvation was so close to them, for they failed to recognise the manna. It needed to be pointed out to them.

In the reading from the Letter to the Ephesians, the author speaks of the new life of the Christian, and the responsibilities that go with this: to put away the old, and embrace the new. Indeed, "your mind must be renewed by a spiritual revolution so that you can put on the new self that has been created in God's way..."

And building on the Jewish custom of throwing away the old yeast at Passover, Jesus in John's Gospel speaks of the old being superceded by the new. That is, the old bread of the Old Testament is now replaced by the new bread of the new covenant.

In all of this we are being encouraged to put away the old yeast of sinful lives and embrace the New Bread of Life = Jesus Christ. In this we gain never-ending fullness of Spirit, and we will no longer hunger and thirst for meaning in life without hope of finding it. Jesus truly is the Bread come down from Heaven who gives us New Life.

Let's reflect on what the Eucharist, this New Bread from Heaven, Jesus Christ, really means for us. Let's look at those areas of our lives that may be barriers to the New Life that Christ offers us. Let's tear down those barriers; let's throw out the old yeast of sin; let's be reconciled to God; let's embrace the true Bread of Life. And we do all this so that, like Jesus our Master, we can be of service to those in need.

the environment and with other living beings. The acceptance of our bodies as God's gift is vital for welcoming and accepting the entire world as a gift from the Father and our common home, whereas thinking that we enjoy absolute power over our own bodies turns, often subtly, into thinking that we enjoy absolute power over creation" (155).

4. The principle of the common good. Integral or human ecology "is inseparable from the notion of the common good" 158). In the contemporary world, where "injustices abound and growing numbers of people are deprived of basic human rights and considered expendable", working for the common good means to make choices in solidarity based on "a preferential option for the poorest" (158).

5. Justice between generations: the common good also regards future generations: "We can no longer speak of sustainable development apart from intergenerational solidarity" (159), without, however, forgetting the poor of today "whose life on this earth is brief and who cannot keep on waiting" (162).

Why we do what we do.....

Lamb of God (Agnus Dei)

This is new content in the second edition of Praying the Mass: The Prayers of the People, Chapter 11, "Communion Rite" www.prayingthemass.com

We first called Christ the "Lamb of God" in the Gloria. This title is deeply significant and ancient in its origin, reaching back to Abraham, the first of the Patriarchs of Israel. God tested Abraham, asking him to offer his only son Isaac as a sacrifice. Isaac, bearing the wood for the sacrifice on his back as he and Abraham walked up the mountain, asked his father where the lamb to be offered was; Abraham replied "God will provide himself the lamb." (*Gen. 22:8*) What Abraham found was no lamb, but a ram with its horns caught in a thicket.[1] From that time on, God's people sought the "lamb of God."

To commemorate His liberating the Hebrews from Egypt, God instituted the feast of Passover at which every family was to take a pure, unblemished lamb and kill it, marking their doorposts with its blood and roasting and eating its flesh. (*cf. Ex. 12*) In time, Jerusalem maintained a sacrificial flock of Temple lambs so that families on pilgrimage for the Passover could be sure to have a pure and unblemished lamb (rather than bringing one with them on the journey). Still, these lambs were not God's lamb, but each family's lambs.[2]

It was not until St. John the Baptist cried out, "Behold, the Lamb of God!" (John 1:29, 36) that the fulfilment of this ancient promise was made known. This title, which might sound peculiar and obscure to our modern ears, would have rung loud and clear in the ears of the Jews to whom St. John spoke. And he was not the only one to make such a clear connection between Christ and the Passover lamb. St. Paul, writing to the Corinthians, announced that "Christ, our paschal lamb, has been sacrificed." (1 Cor. 5:7)[3] St. Peter wrote that we have been ransomed "with the precious blood of Christ, like that of a lamb without blemish or spot." (1 Pet. 1:19) And St. John the Apostle and Evangelist, in his book of Revelation, refers to Jesus as "the Lamb" nearly thirty times, most notably describing His appearance as "a Lamb standing, as though it had been slain." (Rev. 5:6)

It is this Lamb of God, Jesus Christ, Who "takes away the sin of the world" by His self-sacrifice. (*John 1:29*) Every time we say that Jesus "take[s] away the sins of the world," we should be aware that we are speaking in the present tense, not the past tense. This is a reminder that Christ's work of redemption did not conclude with His death, but is continual and ongoing: the Mass is offered for the expiation of our sins.

[1] This scene is rich in Christological symbolism: Christ, like Isaac, bore the wood for His own sacrifice on His back, and He wore a crown of thorns, prefigured by the ram whose horns were caught in a thorn-bush.

[2] The ritual of the Passover also points to Christ: He, like the lamb, is pure and without blemish, and His bones were not broken when He was sacrificed.

[3] "Paschal" (as in "Paschal mystery") comes from the Greek word pascha, which comes from the Hebrew word pesach, which means "Passover."


