#### From the Pastor's desk

In the Gospel for this 20th Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year B), we reach the CLIMAX of the Discourse in John 6. It is the final part of Jesus's explanation of the Sign he performed; and the language that Jesus used is quite explicit – in fact, it is very strong and realistic language... so much so that we will hear next week how some of his followers no longer walked with Him because they couldn't accept what he had to say. See my Reflection on the Readings for a fuller meditation on the Text of John for this weekend.

As I mentioned at masses over the last two weekends, Very Rev Fr Peter Williams, the Administrator of the Diocese, has appointed me to be the Coordinating Priest for Deacons in the Diocese. This involves oversight of the Permanent Diaconate Programme: Vocations (directed by Fr Arthur Bridge, Toongabbie), Formation (directed by Fr. Jolly Chacko, Glenbrook), and Ongoing Formation of Deacons and their wives (in conjunction with the Director of Deacons, Deacon Tony Hoban, North Rocks). The role also involves oversight of transitional deacons (those going on to Priesthood) in conjunction with the Rector of the Seminary, Fr John Hogan. Given all this – and the various committees that go with the role(!) – I will be called upon to

be absent from the parish at times. Fr. Robert William, the Assistant Pastor here, will be having to do a bit more than usual at times. Please keep me and the Deacons in your prayers.

- Given that Fr. Robert will be absent for two weeks, there will be no masses on Monday and Tuesday mornings this week coming and the following week. There will be a Liturgy of the Word with the distribution of Communion instead. Furthermore, please make the Dominican Friars from Kingswood Parish welcome at the 9:00 and 10:30am masses this weekend and next.
- There is a second Confirmation Practice this Wednesday (19th August) for those who were unable to make it last week. It will commence in the church at 7:30pm.
- At the same time (7:30pm) on Wednesday 19th August, there will be the General Parish Council Meeting in the School Staff Room. All welcome.



- On Friday evening (21st August) commencing at 7:30pm in the Church, I will offer the final session of my Introduction to Mark's Gospel and his Theology. All welcome.
- Next weekend (23-24th August) there will be a leaving collection to support Catholic Mission. This is an annual appeal.

### VI. ECOLOGICAL EDUCATION AND SPIRITUALITY (202-246)

The final chapter goes to the heart of ecological conversion, to which the Encyclical invites everyone. The roots of the cultural crisis are deep, and it is not easy to reshape habits and behaviour. Education and training are key. "Change is impossible without motivation and a process of education" (15). All educational sectors are involved, primarily "in school, in families, in the media, in catechesis" (213).

**1.** Towards a new lifestyle: Despite practical relativism and the consumer culture, "all is not lost. Human beings, while capable of the worst, are also capable of rising above themselves, choosing again what is good, and making a new start, despite their mental and social conditioning... No system can completely suppress our openness to what is good, true and beautiful, or our God-given

ability to respond to his grace at work deep in our hearts. I appeal to everyone throughout the world not to forget this dignity which is ours" (205). Changes in lifestyle and consumer choices can bring much "pressure to bear on those who wield political, economic and social power" (206). "If we can overcome individualism, we will truly be able to develop an alternative lifestyle and bring about significant changes in society" (208).

**2.** Educating for the covenant between humanity and the environment: The importance of environmental education cannot be overstated. It is able to affect daily actions and habits, the reduction of water consumption, the sorting of waste and even "turning off unnecessary lights" or wearing warmer clothes so as to use less heating (211).

**3.** Ecological conversion: Faith and Christian sprituality offer profound motivations toward "a more passionate concern for the protection of our world" (216), following the example of St Francis of Assisi. Personal change is essential but not enough. "Social problems must be addressed by community networks" (219). Ecological conversion implies gratitude and generosity and develops creativity and enthusiasm (220).



#### Gospel Reflection

For the past four Sundays the Gospel Readings have been taken from the Story of the Multiplication of the Loaves and Fish in John, with the succeeding explanation that Jesus offered the Crowds in explaining the Sign.

Today we reach the CLIMAX of the Discourse in John 6. It is the final part of Jesus's explanation of the Sign he performed; and the language that Jesus used is quite explicit – in fact, it is very strong and realistic language... so much so that we will hear next week how some of his followers no longer walked with Him because they couldn't accept what he had to say.

What was it that was so difficult to accept? He had said he was the living Bread from Heaven, the one who had come down to give Life to all. And the way he was to do this was to give his flesh for the life of the world. And now he clarifies what that means. No longer is it simply through his Teaching, but the language used reflects the sacramental language of John's community: over and over again he tells his followers that one must eat his flesh and drink his blood in order to have life within. This action is the way that a followers receives the true bread from heaven.

This must have sounded strange – if not offensive – to his hearers, as it smacks of cannibalism and drinking the life-force of humans: both forbidden in Judaism. Yet, for one who has faith and sees the truth of these sacramental words, the Teaching offers hope of salvation. When we eat the flesh and drink the blood of the Church's Eucharist, Jesus then lives in us and we live in Him. The words are tough, but they offer hope, hope of New Life: the Jesus Christ who died to give life to the world is ready to give Himself in a humbling and simple way to every believer who receives the bread and wine of the Eucharist.

Let's continually give God praise for so great a Gift!

**4. Joy and peace:** As proposed in Evangelii Gaudium, "sobriety, when lived freely and consciously, is liberating" (223). Similarly, "happiness means knowing how to limit some needs which only diminish us, and being open to the many different possibilities which life can offer" (223). "One expression of this attitude is when we stop and give thanks to God before and after meals" (227).

**5.** *Civic and political love:* "An integral ecology is also made up of simple daily gestures which break with the logic of violence, exploitation and selfishness" (230). With its civic and political dimensions, "love for society and commitment to the common good are outstanding expressions" of charity (231). In society there are countless associations that intervene in favour of the common good by preserving the natural and urban environments.

6. Sacramental signs and the celebration of rest: We encounter God not only in intimacy, but also in the contemplation of creation which bears a sign of his mystery. The Sacraments show, in a privileged way, how nature was assumed by God. Christianity does not reject matter and the body, but fully values them. In particular, the Eucharist "joins heaven and earth; it embraces and penetrates all creation... Thus, the Eucharist is also a source of light and motivation for our concerns for the environment, directing us to be stewards of all creation" (236).

7. The Trinity and relationships between creatures: "For Christians, believing in one God who is trinitarian communion, suggests that the Trinity has left its mark on all creation" (239). The human person is also called to assume the trinitarian dynamism, going out of oneself "to live in communion with God, with others and with all creatures" (240).

**8.** Queen of all creation: Mary, who cares for Jesus, now lives with him and is Mother and Queen of all creation. "All creatures sing of her fairness" (241). At her side, Joseph appears in the Gospel as a just man and worker, full of the tenderness of one who is truly strong. Both can teach and motivate us to protect this world that God has given us.

**9.** Beyond the sun: In the end we find ourselves before the infinite beauty of God: "Eternal life will be a shared experience of awe, in which each creature, resplendently transfigured, will take its rightful place and have something to give those poor men and women who will have been liberated once and for all" (243).

Our struggles and concerns do not take away the joy of hope, because "in the heart of this world, the Lord of life, who loves us so much, is always present" (245) and his love always compels us to search for new ways. Praise be to him. "At the conclusion of this lengthy reflection which has been both joyful and troubling" (246), the Holy Father proposes that "we offer two prayers": *A prayer for our earth and A Christian prayer in union with creation (246)*.

#### Why we do what we do.....

#### Before Going to Mass

It is good to plan to arrive early for Mass. One of your reasons for selecting a particular Mass on the schedule, in fact, should be that you can get there without rushing, without being in danger of lateness, without having any compulsion to hasten away.

Arrive early but not so early that you find the parking lot filled with cars from an earlier Mass. And if you can walk to church rather than ride, you will be even better disposed to worship with fewer distractions. Getting there about ten minutes before Mass is about right.

You are probably accustomed to dipping your fingertips in the holy water font and making the sign of the cross on yourself. This is a traditional reminder of your own baptism in Christ, and of the new sinless life in Christ that you are living  $\Box$  and exercising today with the Church community.

If the Blessed Sacrament is kept in your church (the sign is the tabernacle and a special "tabernacle light"), then you should genuflect before entering a pew. This is a formal gesture of respect to the Eucharistic Lord. You should do this deliberately, to show reverence, and should bend the knee before (or in the direction of) the Blessed Sacrament. As you genuflect, say a prayer of adoration.

Many Catholics at the present time genuflect in hasty, improper fashion. For some this gesture means nothing. Others genuflect in the center, even when the Blessed Sacrament is to the side. Such individuals have need of a refresher course as to what the genuflection is, and how and why it is done. And if Mass is in an auditorium or location where the Blessed Sacrament is not present, you need only bow to the cross.

Where do you sit? Select a location which will give you the best opportunity for participation in the Mass. Usually the front quarter of the church is your best place for seeing, hearing and participating.

After entering the pew, kneel for a few minutes of prayer before sitting down. This is a valuable time for private prayer in the Lord's house. If you have not yet said morning prayers, this is an opportunity to express the familiar sequence of ideas: adoration, thanksgiving, acts of faith, hope and love, resolution to live in Christ like fashion and worship well.

Then it is time to prepare for the liturgy. Now you need help. A "missalette" may be in the pew, or a hand missal may be available. Usually these books explain the general theme or lesson of the day's Mass. Read the theme. If there is time, read the Scripture lessons starting with the Gospel and the prayers. This preparation will help you considerably to follow the Mass with attention and benefit.


