Evangelicum

In his address to the Faithful during his General Audience on 5th August this year Pope Francis said the following:

"The Church knows well that the situation of the divorced who have entered a second union contradicts the Christian Sacrament of Marriage. However, her gaze always draws from a mother's heart, which, animated by the Holy Spirit, always looks for the good and the salvation of people."

The Holy Father said he is especially grateful to the many pastors, guided by his predecessors, who have worked diligently "to let these families know they are still a part of the Church".

"As these situations especially affect children, we are aware of a greater urgency to foster a true welcome for these families in our communities"

The biblical icon of the Good Shepherd presented in the Gospel of John, Pope Francis said, sums up the mission that Jesus received from the Father to give his life for his sheep. "This attitude," Francis stressed, "is a model for the Church, which welcomes her children as a mother who gives her life for them."

As the Good Shepherd gives his life, so the Church as a Mother gives her life for all her children, by being always the "house of the Father, with doors wide open".

Reflection on those whose marriages have failed, the Pope said: "In fact, these people are not at all excommunicated, and should never be treated as such; they are always part of the Church". The Holy Father concluded, praying that everyone, especially Christian families, "imitate the Good Shepherd, who knows all his sheep and excludes no on from his infinite love".

Gospel Reflection

In the Gospel for this 24th Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year B), Jesus asks his followers to do three things: "If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him..."

"Deny himself"

This is means that the disciples of Jesus should not be preoccupied with oneself and one's own problems, but have Christ and one's neighbour in the forefront of our minds.

Indeed, we can ask ourselves: where are my priorities? Is my self-worth measured in material successes or spiritual ones? Do I find myself paying lip-service to the Gospel while still pursuing the false gods of materialism and hedonism? If we were asked to give up something precious, to deny ourselves what is legitimately our right, for the sake of God and the other, WOLLD WE?

"Take up his Cross"

This phrase obviously evokes the Crucifixion of Jesus and reminds us that the faithful disciple of the Lord must be prepared to follow the Master even unto Death. Just as Jesus died for us, our life must be a continual dying to selfishness for the sake of our neighbour.

And so we reflect on the Cross in our lives: do we avoid the concept? Has Christianity become for us just a warm and fuzzy feeling of love of God and Neighbour? Has the necessity of Sacrifice been ripped out of our Spirituality? If we had the opportunity

to embrace something difficult for the salvation of another, WOULD WE?

"And follow me".

The first two conditions of Discipleship prepare for this: a continuous and sustained fidelity to Jesus; a following in the very footsteps of Him which involves total acceptance of His Way of Life.

Thus we should examine our following of the Lord. Where can we see the need for improvements in our fidelity to Jesus and His Gospel? What aspects of our lifestyle need changing so that we are seen as a true disciple of Christ? How do we follow the Lord?

This Gospel challenges us to try to be the perfect disciple of Jesus Christ: to deny ourselves, to take up our Cross, and to follow the Lord.

Why we do what we do.....

Continuing on from last week's article on the Mass, the following articles during the next few weeks are further explanation of the importance of the different parts of the mass.

The Introductory Rites

"OFF TO A GOOD START": The Introductory Rites

The "General Instruction on the Roman Missal" describes the structure of the Mass this way: The Mass is made up as it were of the liturgy of the word and the liturgy of the eucharist, two parts so closely connected that they form but one single act of worship. For in the Mass the table of God's word and of Christ's body is laid for the people of God to receive from it instruction and food. There are also certain rites to open and conclude the celebration. (GIRM 8) Clearly the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist are the "heart and soul" of the celebration. The secondary parts of the Mass – the Introductory Rites, Preparation of Gifts and Concluding Rite – serve respectively as an introduction, transition and close in the liturgy.

Although one of the secondary elements, the Introductory Rites have a very important role. Their purpose is to gather the people together as a worshipping community, to prepare them to listen to the word and celebrate the Eucharist and to begin the liturgical celebration.

Every human action has to have a beginning. This is true of ordinary events like cooking a meal and planting a garden, and it is true of sacred actions. Before we do anything important, we need to prepare ourselves, set the scene, and make sure everyone is focussed.

It is clear that throughout the history of worship this need for preparation before the celebration was felt strongly. From a simple opening prayer in the liturgy of the early church, the introductory rites gradually became quite elaborate. During the Middle Ages they were also "privatised": the Introit chant and the Kyrie litany were recited by the celebrant alone and a collection of private penitential prayers by the priest were added.

Some of the elements of the present Introductory Rites date back to antiquity while others come from the medieval period. The revision of the rites was aimed at shortening and simplifying what had become protracted and complex over time.

More importantly, the private nature of the prayers was reversed. All of the ritual elements of the current rites are now intended for the preparation of the assembly as a whole. They demonstrate the principle that the liturgy is the action of the whole church and the human need for preparation in order to participate fully in that action.



Why we do .. (cont'd)

The ordinary sequence of Introductory Rites includes: the entrance song and procession; the sign of the cross and exchange of greetings, formal and informal; a penitential rite, which includes the Kyrie; the Gloria (according to the season); and the opening prayer, which is the climax of this series of ritual actions. These rites are dropped in whole or part for certain special occasions such as a nuptial or funeral Mass, and the celebration of some seasonal feasts requires the rearrangement of these elements to accommodate other rituals.

There is a popular children's book about a symphony orchestra. It begins with some hundreds of people, scattered throughout the city, rising from their afternoon naps, getting themselves ready, setting out for the orchestra hall on various modes of transportation, taking their places, tuning their instruments..... and it concludes with the first, glorious, totally harmonised opening chord of the symphony. Perhaps it is not too far-fetched to think of gathering for the Eucharist in these terms, the Introductory Rites being everything that precedes and enables us to offer God total and harmonised worship.
