Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ

On the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception this week (Tuesday, 8th December) the *Holy Year of Mercy* proclaimed by Pope Francis begins. The hidden door at St Peter's Rome! And the boat in St. Patrick's Parramatta!

On 8th December the Holy Door in St Peter's Basilica in Rome will be opened for the first time in fifteen years. Sealed from the inside and only opened in a time of jubilee, it represents an extraordinary/additional means, given to the faithful on the journey of salvation. The recent removal of a cover of bricks at St Peter's has once again revealed the special door in readiness. And similar doors will be opened between now and the end of January at Rome's three other major basilicas.

As well, holy doors are designated in dioceses, our main door being at St Patrick's Cathedral where it will be opened ritually at the 11am Mass on Sunday 13th December. Pilgrims are welcome to the Cathedral throughout the Jubilee Year. Once through the Door of Mercy, you will find a large symbol of a boat inside the Cathedral chapel! The scripture at the boat recalls the frightened disciples in the storm on the Sea of Galilee and links to the stormy seas of life for us today and for all of creation. The jubilee announces anew God's mercy with us and for us. Mercy is God's sea of love. It is the shape of God's unconditional love, reaching out to embrace every experience of suffering, shame, impoverishment and marginalisation.

When visiting the Cathedral it will be possible to take time to enter into a sequence of prayer and reflection, assisted by the texts and prompts placed around the chapel.

As Pope Francis said in his message ahead of Krakow WYD2016: Jesus Christ came to proclaim and bring about the Lord's everlasting time of grace. He brought good news to the poor, freedom to prisoners, sight to the blind and freedom to the oppressed (Lk 4:18-19). The prayer suggestions for pilgrims around our Cathedral chapel join us to contemporary expressions of the scripture themes of mercy, happening and being yearned for, in our diocese and beyond.

Further to the message from Pope Francis: When the Church proclaims a jubilee in the name of Christ, we are all invited to experience a wonderful time of grace. The Church must offer abundant signs of God's presence and closeness, and reawaken in people's hearts the ability to look to the essentials. In particular, this Holy Year of Mercy is a time for the Church to rediscover the meaning of the mission entrusted to her by the Lord on the day of Easter: to be a sign and an instrument of the Father's mercy.

And so, this is to be a time for us all to receive God's merciful love anew. And blessed with such abundance, we are called as the Church to make mercy known; the mercy that is God's desire for the world and all creation to receive.

Jerusalem - God will show you splendour.

Gospel Reflection

In the Readings for this Second Sunday of Advent (Year C), we note the theme of the end of Exile and the Coming of Salvation.

The **Prophet Baruch** speaks of the joy that fills the hearts of the People of Israel when they return from Exile in Babylon to the Promised Land: "though they left you on foot (he is speaking to the *Land* here), with enemies for an escort, now God brings them back to you like royal princes carried back in glory". And to make this journey back from Exile easier, the valleys are to be filled in and the hills levelled.

This idea of levelling is taken up *in Luke's text* in the preaching of John the Baptist. This time, however, it is the *Lord's* path that is made straight, so that He can come to all people: "Prepare a way for the Lord, make his paths straight". And with the Coming of Jesus, all were lead to Repentance, the beginning of the journey from the Exile of Sin to the Promised Land of Salvation!

And St. Paul in his *Letter to the Philippians* urges all Christians to increase in love and the faithful practice of ethics / moral living so that this close relationship between Christ and His People can continue. In such a way, any separation or exile from God will be avoided.

In a sense we are living an exiled existence – exiled from the Loving God who created us and sustains us. Although there are moments of closeness between Christ and ourselves as we journey through life, there are also times when God seems far away from us. And the cause of this distance, this feeling of being exiled from God, is often our Sinfulness! We need to repent and turn back to God. And times of Preparation for Festivities (Advent and Lent) specifically draw our attention to the need that we all have for conversion and reconciliation.

In this second week of Advent let's reflect on the challenge offered to us by the Scriptures; let's look at our Christian journey honestly and with integrity. And through prayer and Reconciliation with the Lord, let's resolve to move closer to the Gift that the Christ-Child came to offer humankind, the Gift of Salvation. Indeed, let's allow Jesus Christ to be "Saviour" in our lives once again this Advent and Christmas!!

Why we do what we do......

What Is the Immaculate Conception? Few doctrines of the Catholic Church are as misunderstood as the dogma of the Immaculate Conception of Mary. Many people, including many Catholics, think that it refers to the conception of Christ through the action of the Holy Spirit in the womb of the Blessed Virgin Mary. That event, though, is celebrated at the feast of the <u>Annunciation of the Lord</u> (March 25, nine months before Christmas).

Answer: The Immaculate Conception refers to the condition that the Blessed Virgin Mary was free from Original Sin from the very moment of her conception in the womb of her mother, Saint Anne. We celebrate the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary on September 8; nine months before is December 8, the Feast of the Immaculate Conception.

Fr. John Hardon, S.J., in his Modern Catholic Dictionary, notes that "Neither the Greek nor Latin Fathers explicitly taught the Immaculate Conception, but they professed it implicitly." It would take many centuries, though, for the Catholic Church to recognize the Immaculate Conception as a doctrine, and many more before Pope Pius IX, on December 8, 1854, would declare it a dogma.

In the Apostolic Constitution <u>Ineffabilis</u> <u>Deus</u>, Pope Pius IX wrote that "We declare, pronounce, and define that the doctrine which holds that the most Blessed Virgin Mary, in the first

instance of her conception, by a singular grace and privilege granted by Almighty God, in view of the merits of Jesus Christ, the Savior of the human race, was preserved free from all stain of original sin, is a doctrine revealed by God and therefore to be believed firmly and constantly by all the faithful."

As Father Hardon further writes, the Blessed Virgin's "freedom from sin was an unmerited gift of God or special grace, and an exception to the law, or privilege, which no other created person has received."

Another misconception people have is that Mary's Immaculate Conception was necessary to ensure that Original Sin would not be passed on to Christ. This has never been a part of the teaching on the Immaculate Conception; rather, the Immaculate Conception represents Christ's saving grace operating in Mary in anticipation of His redemption of man and in God's foreknowledge of Mary's acceptance of His Will for her.

In other words, the Immaculate Conception was not a precondition for Christ's act of redemption but the result of it. It is the concrete expression of God's love for Mary, who gave herself fully, completely, and without hesitation to His service.


Working with Children Check

The result of a Working With Children Check is either a clearance to work with children for five years, or a bar against working with children. Cleared applicants are subject to ongoing monitoring and relevant new records may lead to the clearance being revoked.

The Working With Children Check is fully portable so it can be used for any paid or unpaid child-related work in NSW for as long as the worker remains cleared.
