Evangelicum

"If the Jubilee does not come out of your pockets, it's not a true Jubilee. You understand?" Pope Francis said this during his General Audience in St. Peter's Square on Ash Wednesday. The Jubilee, the Pontiff highlighted, is — "as salvation throughout history teaches us" — a time for us to open our hearts, really be His children, and help our struggling brothers and sisters. Right away, the Holy Father



recalled that today is Ash Wednesday and wished those gathered a good Lenten journey, and noted that today we recall the ancient institution of the jubilee, that appears in Sacred Scripture in the Book of Leviticus. A jubilee, the Jesuit Pontiff explained, was a time of pardon, "kind of a 'general amnesty," which allowed everyone to get back into their original situation. With the idea that land belongs to God and is entrusted to man, Francis said, over history, this concept required and propelled the faithful to combat poverty and inequality. This is why the jubilee often meant debts cancelled, land restituted, and God's people able to enjoy their freedom again. Today, Francis stressed, we must ask ourselves what we have and what we can give to those who have nothing. "Ten percent, fifty percent," he said, adding, "Let the Holy Spirit inspire each of you." "If I'm not mistaken," the Pope went on to say, "More or less, I'm not certain about the figures, but about 80% of humanity's wealth is in the hands of less than 20% of the population."

How many fruits, the Pope exclaimed, are born from donating to those in need. The Pope recalled how the Bible always tells us to help others in need, without making petty calculations or demanding impossible interest from them. The Holy Father condemned how much families suffer due to being exploited by usury, which he called a grave sin, and decried how people become desperate. "And many times, in desperation, many men end in suicide because they do not have hope and no one has their hand outstretched to help them," Francis said, noting, "The only hand there is, is that which is there to make him pay interest." Reminding that the Lord promises to bless those who open their hands and are generous, he noted, that God "will give you twice as much back, maybe not in money but in other things." The Holy Father concluded, stressing that this sharing is mercy, and that if we expect God's mercy toward us, we better set a good example.

Gospel Reflection

The First Sunday of Lent call us - through the Liturgy of the Word - to reflect on the reality of sin in our lies; to look at those moments of temptation that exist every day; and, having done both these actions, to recommit ourselves to our Loving Father.

The First Reading recalls the major events that formed the People of Israel: from the time of Abraham an the Patriarchs; through Joseph, with Exile in Egypt and Deliverance from Egypt in the Exodus; to the wanderings in the desert with Moses and the People's subsequent falling into Temptations; to the Entry into the Promised Land of Canaan (Palestine). The Church is thus encouraging us in this text reflect on the desert experience of the Jews; and she asks us not to repeat their mistake of falling away from God during times of trial and drifting, but to imitate Jesus in the desert who conquered temptation and cast Satan behind his back!

The Second Reading follows the same theme and reminds all Christians that overt Discipleship of Jesus Christ is paramount for our Salvation. As St. Paul says, it is not enough to be a *private* Christian, believing in our hearts. That will make us righteous - but only that! No, we are instruction by the Apostle to be *public* Christians, for it is by 'confessing with your lips that you are saved'!

And the Gospel from Luke lists the three Temptations that Jesus endured before commencing his Public Ministry. Jesus rejects each temptation and reasserts God's primacy over materialism, worldly authority, and over our whole lives. Jesus wins the battle against he devil (the Tempter) and is thus enable to go forward to fulfil his destiny, the purpose for which the Son of God has been sent: to save the whole world from sin and give New Life to all.

We need to reflect on each of these Texts and recommit ourselves to the Lord our God, entering wholeheartedly into the spirit of this great penitential Season of Lent. Let us open ourselves to God's Spirit of Truth, so that we can work with the Lord's grace in coming to greater knowledge and understanding of His Will for us; and so that we may be able to resist the Temptations that come our way in life in order to be able to stand victorious with Jesus on the Day of Resurrection!



Why we do what we do......

Lent is a Christian tradition that is observed in many denominations. It is the hallowed forty-day period of sacrifice leading up to Jesus' death and Resurrection. During Lent, Catholics and some Protestants prepare for Holy Week by fasting, praying, and reconciling with the Lord. These forty days are a wonderful time to rethink everything and to allow ourselves to take up our crosses as Christ once did.

Why Catholics fast and abstain

Explain that Lent is the 40 days before Easter in which Catholics pray, fast, contemplate, and engage in acts of spiritual self-discipline. Catholics do these things because Easter, which celebrates the Resurrection of Christ, is the greatest holy day of the Christian year (even above Christmas) and Catholics have recognized that it is appropriate to prepare for such a holy day by engaging in such disciplines.

(Archbishop Fulton Sheen noted that the Protestant attitude is summarized by the line, "First comes the feast, then comes the hangover," while the Catholic attitude is "First comes the fast, then comes the feast.")

The reason Lent lasts 40 days is that 40 is the traditional number of judgment and spiritual testing in the Bible (Gn 7:4, Ex 24:18, 34:28, Nm 13:25, 14:33, Jon 3:4). Lent bears particular relationship to the 40 days Christ spent fasting in the desert before entering into his public ministry (Mt 4:1-11). Catholics imitate Christ by spending 40 days in spiritual discipline before the celebration of Christ's triumph over sin and death.

Fasting is a biblical discipline that can be defended from both the Old and the New Testament. Christ expected his disciples to fast (Mt 9:14-15) and issued instructions for how they should do so (Mt 6:16-18). Catholics follow this pattern by holding a partial fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Abstinence from certain foods is also a biblical discipline. In Daniel 10:2-3 we read, "In those days I, Daniel, was mourning for three weeks. I ate no delicacies, no meat or wine entered my mouth, nor did I anoint myself at all, for the full three weeks." Catholics use a practice similar to Daniel's when, as a way of commemorating Christ's Crucifixion on a Friday, they abstain from eating meat on that day of the week during Lent. The only kind of flesh they eat on Friday is fish, which is a symbol of Christ.

Even the Ash Wednesday practice of having one's forehead signed with ashes has a biblical parallel. Putting ashes on one's head was a common biblical expression of mourning (1 Sm 13:19, Est 4:1, Is 61:3; see also Est 4:3, Jer 6:26, Ez 27:30, Dn 9:3, Mt 11:21, Lk 10:13). By having the sign of the cross made with ashes on their foreheads, Catholics mourn Christ's suffering on the cross and their own sins, which made that suffering necessary.


