Dear sisters and brothers in Christ

This week in our Ecclesial Reflections we commence a summary of Pope Francis' revolutionary Apostolic Exhortation, Amoris Laetitia: On Love in the Family. I would encourage you to download the whole document from the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference website and read it in its entirety.

With today's Gospel speaking of us receiving the Peace of Christ which the world cannot give, let us pray for Hope - that our world, our community, our families, ourselves - that all will experience the abundant grace of the Holy Spirit of God; and that we will all be peacemakers in all things and in all circumstances, imitating our Lord who brought about peace for the world through his unconditional love for all.

- # During this weekend and next, let us keep our First Communicants in our thoughts and prayers in a special way: so that all the young children of our Parish Community who are receiving the Lord in the Eucharist for the First Time over these days may be touched by the powerful presence of Christ and be renewed in their practice of our shared Christian Faith. May the Holy Spirit gift them with the Peace that the world cannot give!

# The official Summary of *Amoris Laetitia: On Love in the Family* - Pope Francis' Apostolic Exhortation on the Family, recently published in Rome

(as taken from the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference website)

It is not by chance that Amoris Laetitia (AL), "The Joy of Love", the post-synodal Apostolic Exhortation "on Love in the Family", was signed on 19 March, the Solemnity of Saint Joseph. It brings together the results of the two Synods on the family convoked by Pope Francis in 2014 and 2015. It often cites their Final Reports; documents and teachings of his Predecessors; and his own numerous catecheses on the family. In addition, as in previous magisterial documents, the Pope also makes use of the contributions of various Episcopal Conferences around the world (Kenya, Australia, Argentina...) and cites significant figures such as Martin Luther King and Erich Fromm. The Pope even quotes the film Babette's Feast to illustrate the concept of gratuity.

#### Introduction (1-7)

The Apostolic Exhortation is striking for its breadth and detail. Its 325 paragraphs are distributed over nine chapters. The seven introductory paragraphs plainly set out the complexity of a topic in urgent need of thorough study. The interventions of the Synod Fathers make up [form] a "multifaceted gem" (AL 4), a precious polyhedron, whose value must be preserved. But the Pope cautions that "not all discussions of doctrinal, moral or pastoral issues need to be settled by interventions of the magisterium". Indeed, for some questions, "each country or region ... can seek solutions better suited to its culture and sensitive to its traditions and local needs. For 'cultures are in fact quite diverse and every general principle ... needs to be inculturated, if it is to be respected and applied" (AL 3). This principle of inculturation applies to how problems are formulated and addressed and, apart from the dogmatic issues that have been well defined by the Church's magisterium, none of this approach can be "globalized". In his address at the end of the 2015 Synod, the Pope said very clearly: "What seems normal for a bishop on one continent, is considered strange and almost scandalous – almost! - for a bishop from another; what is considered a violation of a right in one society is an evident and inviolable rule in another; what for some is freedom of conscience is for others simply confusion."

The Pope clearly states that we need above all to avoid a sterile juxtaposition between demands for change and the general application of abstract norms. He writes: "The debates carried on in the media, in certain publications and even among the Church's ministers, range from an immoderate desire for total change without sufficient reflection or grounding, to an attitude that would solve everything by applying general rules or deriving undue conclusions from particular theological considerations" (AL 2).

This led to disagreement, and after Paul and Barnabas had a long argument with these men it was arranged that Paul and Barnabas and others of the church should go up to Jerusalem and discuss the problem with the apostles and elders.

Then the apostles and elders decided to choose delegates to send to Antioch with Paul and Barnabas; the whole church concurred with this. They chose Judas known as Barsabbas and Silas, both leading men in the brotherhood, and gave them this letter to take with them:

The apostles and elders, your brothers, send greetings to the brothers of pagan birth in Antioch, Syria and Cilicia. We hear that some of our members have disturbed you with their demands and have unsettled your minds. They acted without any authority from us, and so we have decided unanimously to elect delegates and to send them to you with Barnabas and Paul, men we highly respect who have dedicated their lives

to the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. Accordingly we are sending you Judas and Silas, who will confirm by word of mouth what we have written in this letter. It has been decided by the Holy Spirit and by ourselves not to saddle you with any burden beyond these essentials: you are to abstain from food sacrificed to idols, from blood, from the meat of strangled animals and from fornication. Avoid these, and you will do what is right. Farewell.'

#### Gospel Reflection

All three readings for this Sixth Sunday of Easter (Year C) give us Hope, for the infinite love of God will continue among us in the presence of the Paraclete. The Holy Spirit will strengthen us and help us in our living of live worthy of the name, Christian!

The First Reading from the Acts of the Apostles speaks of the First Council of the Church, the Council of Jerusalem. After much discussion, the elders and Apostles decide that all people are free to be Christians. And thus the Response to our Psalm echoes the delight of the peoples of the world at this decision: "O God, let all the nations praise you!". This gives us all hope, for it assures us of the presence of God's Spirit in His Church. The decisions made by the Apostles and elders acting unanimously have the authority of God: "It has bee decided by the Holy Spirit and by ourselves...." As we can see in the present Pontificate, Christ and His Spirit are very present in the Church, and always will be, leading us into the "complete Truth".

The Second Reading from the Book of Revelation offers Hope to a people suffering persecution. The vision of the "New and Eternal Jerusalem" speaks of the coming of God's Reign over all the earth and its peoples. Thus, God's Love will be supreme and the world will accept the Teachings of Jesus, especially the New Commandment we heard in last week's Gospel text: "Love one another, as I have loved you". No matter what sufferings we may endure in this life - the future is brilliant: the Light of God and Lamb will enlighten us all, and bring us into a right relationship with our Creator.

And the Gospel text from John assures us that the Spirit of Jesus will live within all believers, offering them the Peace of God, which is beyond whatever the World can give. We pray for this Peace in every Mass - at that dramatic moment when the Lord is addressed on the altar under the form of bread and wine: "Lord Jesus Christ, at your Last Supper,..." Then we share this Peace with our sisters and brothers. The words of the Gospel reassure us in a world of hatred, violent and terrorism that the Peace of Christ will conquer all evil and gift us with Hope, even in the midst of difficulty.

And so, we can see that the Readings give us cause for Hope: our Church is continually under the influence of the Holy Spirit of God; our destiny is to live with God forever in the New Jerusalem; and we are encouraged by the Lord's Gift of Peace. So, in our Eucharistic celebrations this weekend, let's pray for an increase in the Gift of Hope in our lives, a Hope which will lead to that Peace which the world cannot give...

With the Rosary in fact we meditate the mysteries of joy, of sorrow and the glory of Jesus and Mary. It's a simple prayer, humble so much like Mary. It's a prayer we can all say together with Her, the Mother of God. With the Hail Mary we invite Her to pray for us. Our Lady always grants our request. She joins Her prayer to ours. Therefore it becomes ever more useful, because what Mary asks She always receives, Jesus can never say no to whatever His Mother asks for. In every apparition, the heavenly Mother has invited us to say the Rosary as a powerful weapon against evil, to bring us to true peace. With your prayer made together with Your heavenly Mother, you can obtain the great gift of bringing about a change of hearts and conversion. Each day, through prayer you can drive away from yourselves and from your homeland many dangers and many evils. It can seem a repetitive prayer but instead it is like two sweethearts who many times say one another the words: "I love you"...

The Blessed Holy Father John Paul II on October 16th, 2002 with the Apostolic Letter Rosarium Virginis Mariae on the Most Holy Rosary has added 5 new mysteries of the Rosary: The Mysteries of the Light.

# Why do Catholics pray the rosary? Catholics pray the rosary because it's a powerful prayer to God, through His mother, Mary.

Praying the rosary has been a tradition in the Church for a long time. It's a bit fuzzy who made it more formal; some say it was St. Dominic and others say it wasn't. What really matters is that this prayer is super powerful.

Throughout Church history, many popes and saints have highly recommended that we pray the rosary. St. Louis de Montfort said, 'When the Holy Rosary is said well, it gives Jesus and Mary more glory and is more meritorious than any other prayer.'

The rosary begins with the recitation of the Apostle's Creed, an Our Father, three Hail Mary's and a Glory Be. Then there are five decades which each begin and end with an Our Father and Glory Be, and have ten Hail Mary's in between. When you pray the rosary, you meditate on the events in Jesus' life. There are the joyful, luminous, sorrowful, and glorious mysteries.

In various apparitions, Mary has appeared holding a rosary and has asked that we continue to pray this prayer. She always leads us to her Son, and presents our needs before Him. Prayer is about developing our relationship with God, and loving Him more, so it makes sense to get to know Him through the events of the life of Christ that we meditate on during the rosary.

#### Chapter One: "In the light of the Word" (8-30)

Following this introduction, the Pope begins his reflections with the Holy Scriptures in the first chapter, which unfolds as a meditation on Psalm 128 (which appears in the Jewish wedding liturgy as well as that of Christian marriages). The Bible "is full of families, births, love stories and family crises" (AL 8). This impels us to meditate on how the family is not an abstract ideal but rather like a practical "trade" (AL 16), which is carried out with tenderness (AL 28), but which has also been confronted with sin from the beginning, when the relationship of love turned into domination (cf. AL 19). Hence, the Word of God "is not a series of abstract ideas but rather a source of comfort and companionship for every family that experiences difficulties or suffering. For it shows them the goal of their journey..." (AL 22).

#### Chapter two: "The experiences and challenges of families" (31-57)

Building on the biblical base, in the second chapter the Pope considers the current situation of families. While keeping "firmly grounded in [the] reality" of family experiences (AL 6), he also draws heavily on the final Reports of the two Synods. Families face many challenges, from migration to the ideological denial of differences between the sexes ("ideology of gender" AL 56); from the culture of the provisional to the antibirth mentality and the impact of biotechnology in the field of procreation; from the lack of housing and work to pornography and abuse of minors; from inattention to persons with disabilities, to lack of respect for the elderly; from the legal dismantling of the family, to violence against women. The Pope insists on concreteness, which is a key concept in the Exhortation. And it is concreteness, realism and daily life that make up the substantial difference between acceptable "theories" of interpretation of reality and arbitrary "ideologies". #### The Catechism of the Catholic Church says:

'Meditation engages thought, imagination, emotion, and desire. This mobilization of faculties is necessary in order to deepen our convictions of faith, prompt the conversion of our heart, and strengthen our will to follow Christ. Christian prayer tries above all to meditate on the mysteries of Christ, as in lectio divina or the rosary. This form of prayerful reflection is of great value, but Christian prayer should go further to the knowledge of the love of the Lord Jesus, to union with him' (CCC 2708).

Rosaries are not just decorations. Battles have been won because people prayed the rosary! There have been hearts converted, and impossible intentions answered too. Your life can only be blessed if you start praying the rosary.


