From the Pastor's Desk

I write this to you from our Clergy Conference, where the majority of Priests and Deacons in the Diocese are meeting with our New Bishop to look at the next 4-5 years of ministry in our Diocese. We are about to pull together some of the many suggestions concerning our Future that have been proposed by members of the clergy. It is a moment of excitement, as we re-envisage our ministry of service to you all.

And central to that many-faceted service is the Celebration of the Eucharist, the source and summit of our Faith. And it is this tremendous Gift of Jesus Christ that the Church places before us on this day: so that we can give thanks to the Father for the Sending of the Son, and give thanks to Christ the Son for his offering of His Body and Blood for our salvation and that of the world.

- + All masses return to normal this week.
- ★ Please NOTE that this Friday is First Friday, and thus there will be an extra Mass at 7:30 (including the Novena to the Sacred Heart of Jesus) followed by a brief period of Adoration and Benediction.
- **†** Also, being First Saturday this coming week, the 9am Mass will included the Anointing of the Sick for those in advanced age or who are seriously ill. This will be followed by a time of Adoration and Benediction.

Let us continue to pray for one another as we strive together to build up God's Kingdom in this place.

ECCLESIAL REFLECTIONS

In this line, gathering the observations of many Synod Fathers, the Pope states that "the baptized who are divorced and civilly remarried need to be more fully integrated into Christian communities in the variety of ways possible, while avoiding any occasion of scandal". "Their participation can be expressed in different ecclesial services... Such persons need to feel not as excommunicated members of the Church, but instead as living members, able to live and grow in the Church... This integration is also needed in the care and Christian upbringing of their children" (AL 299).

In a more general vein, the Pope makes an extremely important statement for understanding the orientation and meaning of the Exhortation: "If we consider the immense variety of concrete situations, ... it is understandable that neither the Synod nor this Exhortation could be expected to provide a new set of general rules, canonical in nature and applicable to all cases. What is needed is simply a renewed encouragement to undertake a responsible personal and pastoral discernment of particular cases, one which would recognize that, since 'the degree of responsibility is not equal in all cases', the consequences or effects of a rule need not necessarily always be the same" (AL 300). The Pope develops in depth the needs and characteristics of the journey of accompaniment and discernment necessary for profound dialogue between the faithful and their pastors.

For this purpose the Holy Father recalls the Church's reflection on "mitigating factors and situations" regarding the attribution of responsibility and accountability for actions; and relying on St. Thomas Aquinas, he focuses on the relationship between rules and discernment by stating: "It is true that general rules set forth a good which can never be disregarded or neglected, but in their formulation they cannot provide absolutely for all particular situations. At the same time, it must be said that, precisely for that reason, what is part of a practical discernment in particular circumstances cannot be elevated to the level of a rule" (AL 304).

The last section of the chapter treats "The logic of pastoral mercy". To avoid misunderstandings, Pope Francis strongly reiterates: "To show understanding in the face of exceptional situations never implies dimming the light of the fuller ideal, or proposing less than what Jesus offers to the human being. Today, more important than the pastoral care of failures is the pastoral effort to strengthen marriages and thus to prevent their breakdown" (AL 307).

Gospel Luke 9:11-17

It was late afternoon when the Twelve came to him and said, 'Send the people away, and they can go to the villages and farms round about to find lodging and food; for we are in a lonely place here.' He replied, 'Give them something to eat yourselves.' But they said, 'We have no more than five loaves and two fish, unless we are to go ourselves and buy food for all these people.' For there were about five thousand men. But he said to his disciples, 'Get them to sit down in parties of about fifty.' They did so and made them all sit down. Then he took the five loaves and the two fish, raised his eyes to heaven, and said the blessing over them; then he broke them and handed them to his disciples to distribute among the crowd. They all ate as much as they wanted, and when the scraps remaining were collected they filled twelve baskets.

Gospel Reflection

In today's Gospel Jesus tells the Apostles to 'give them something to eat yourselves'. Indeed, as we celebrate this tremendous gift of Jesus Christ to us all, the Eucharist, then we need to do all that we can to act like Jesus Christ: to feed the multitude.

Often we think of this 'feeding of the multitude' as the transmitting of Faith to those hungry for Hope. And this still stands. But MORE is required: we must actively work for the alleviation of hunger, poverty and oppression in our world, so that the 'feeding' of Faith is predicated on the concrete 'feeding' of those starving and in need in a physical sense..

Yes, as Australians, we are generous to a certain extent - with our money, and sometimes with our time. And this is good. But I sometimes wonder whether or not we actually contemplate or consider what 'feeding' the multitude could mean in the reality of our lives. Do we imagine ourselves leaving the comfort of our Australian society and offering a period of time in another culture in service of the Gospel. Some do this: I know of one couple who have decided to give up their life here to help in an orphanage in Cambodia for one year.

What of the young people in our congregation today: have you ever thought of a year of lay missionary work - possibly through organisations such as Palms?

Some of our WYD young adults will be having a taste of this missionary task when they go to a hurricane-ravaged village in the Philippines and help rebuild a school. But most of us (myself included) put such thoughts in the 'too hard' basket. But is this good enough?? What has all this to do with the Feast of Corpus Christi? Quite simply: if we don't work in a concrete way to alleviate starvation, poverty and injustice in Australia and in our word at large, then our preaching of the Gospel and our Reception of the Eucharist is less than perfect.

Jesus says to US as he said it to the Apostles those many years ago: "Give them something to eat yourselves". What do we intend to do in response to the Lord's



Why we do what we do.....

THE LORD'S SUPPER Or 'THE BREAKING OF BREAD' The 'Breaking of Bread Service' is also known as a 'communion' service.

This is a special time for people who love Jesus and have made a personal commitment (by faith) to love and trust Jesus himself as their Saviour.

Everyone is welcome to come along, but if you have not made this commitment to trust and obey Jesus or are not quite sure yet - we ask you simply to pass on the bread and the wine without tasting it yourself. There is nothing 'magical' in the actual bread or wine - they are simply symbols, but very important ones! If you're not sure where you stand, you are welcome to contact the church and request a chat to help clarify your thoughts.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR BREAKING BREAD

The Bible gives several instructions about how Christians should break bread to remember him, as we see on this page.

Two important principles stand out:

The attitude in which Christians approach the Lord's Table is certainly important. (1 Cor 11. 27-34)

A sense of order in gatherings of the Lord's people is essential. (1 Cor 14. 40)

No specific format, type of service or time of day is specified, although many scholars feel that in New Testament times it was probably often celebrated fairly informally after a meal.

Why Celebrate The 'Lord's Supper'?

Instructions given to the church at Corinth give a helpful insight:

Obedience - Obey

The Lord instructed believers to break bread together to remember Him.

Remembrance - Symbols

The bread and wine are potent symbols to stimulate worship and thanksgiving. (1 Cor 11 v 23-25) The bread remind us of the Lord's body given for us. The wine reminds us of His blood, shed for us.

Communion - Unity

Sharing in the bread and wine reminds us of our unity as believers in the Lord. (1 Cor 10. 14-17)

Proclamation - Witness

In celebrating the Lord's supper we proclaim the centrality and significance to us of the Lord's death as an act of witness (1 Cor 11. 26)

Confession - Prepare

We are to examine ourselves before the Lord before we take the bread and wine, confessing any unresolved sin in our lives. (1 Cor 11. 27-29)

Expectation - Until

He comes . . We celebrate the Lord's supper until He comes again, reminding us of our future hope in Him. (1 Cor 11. 26)
