ECCLESIAL REFLECTIONS

(continued from last week)

Citing Familiaris consortio, Francis states that "we do well to focus on concrete realities, since 'the call and the demands of the Spirit resound in the events of history', and through these 'the Church can also be guided to a more profound understanding of the inexhaustible mystery of marriage and the family" (AL 31). Conversely, if we fail to listen to reality, we cannot understand the needs of the present or the movements of the Spirit. The Pope notes that rampant individualism makes it difficult today for a person to give oneself generously to another (cf. AL 33). Here is an interesting picture of the situation: "The fear of loneliness and the desire for stability and fidelity exist side by side with a growing fear of entrapment in a relationship that could hamper the achievement of one's personal goals" (AL 34).

The humility of realism helps us to avoid presenting "a far too abstract and almost artificial theological ideal of marriage, far removed from the concrete situations and practical possibilities of real families" (AL 36). Idealism does not allow marriage to be understood for what it is, that is, a "dynamic path to personal development and fulfilment". It is unrealistic to think that families can sustain themselves "simply by stressing doctrinal, bioethical and moral issues, without encouraging openness to grace" (AL 37). Calling for a certain "self-criticism" of approaches that are inadequate for the experience of marriage and the family, the Pope stresses the need to make room for the formation of the conscience of the faithful: "We have been called to form consciences, not to replace them" (AL 37). Jesus proposed a demanding ideal but "never failed to show compassion and closeness to the frailty of individuals like the Samaritan woman or the woman caught in adultery" (AL 38).

Chapter three: "Looking to Jesus: The vocation of the family" (58-88)

The third chapter is dedicated to some essential elements of the Church's teaching on marriage and the family. This chapter is important because its 30 paragraphs concisely depict the vocation of the family according to the Gospel and as affirmed by the Church over time. Above all, it stresses the themes of indissolubility, the sacramental nature of marriage, the transmission of life and the education of children. Gaudium et Spes of Vatican II, Humanae Vitae of Paul VI, and Familiaris Consortio of John Paul II are widely quoted.

The chapter provides a broad view and touches on "imperfect situations" as well. We can read, in fact: "Discernment of the presence of 'seeds of the Word' in other cultures (cf. Ad Gentes 11) can also apply to the reality of marriage and the family. In addition to true natural marriage, positive elements exist in the forms of marriage found in other religious traditions', even if, at times, obscurely" (AL 77). The reflection also includes the "wounded families" about whom the Pope – quoting the Final Report of the 2015 Synod extensively – says that "it is always

In my earlier work, Theophilus, I dealt with everything Jesus had done and taught from the beginning until the day he gave his instructions to the apostles he had chosen through the Holy Spirit, and was taken up to heaven. He had shown himself alive to them after his Passion by many demonstrations: for forty days he had continued to appear to them and tell them about the kingdom of God. When he had been at table with them, he had told them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for what the Father had promised. 'It is' he had said 'what you have heard me speak about: John baptised with water but you, not many days from now, will be baptised with the Holy Spirit.'

Now having met together, they asked him, 'Lord, has the time come? Are you going to restore the kingdom to Israel?' He replied, 'It is not for you to know times or dates that the Father has decided by his own authority, but you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you, and then you will be my witnesses not only in Jerusalem but throughout Judaea and Samaria, and indeed to the ends of the earth.' As he said this he was lifted up while they looked on, and a cloud took him from their sight. They were still staring into the sky when suddenly two men in white were standing near them and they said, 'Why are you men from Galilee standing here looking into the sky? Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven, this same Jesus will come back in the same way as you have seen him go there.'

Gospel Reflection

All three readings for this celebration of the Ascension of Lord speak to us of the Lord's abiding presence among us as we live the Gospel in our daily lives and come to know Jesus as Lord of our lives.

The First Reading from the Acts of the Apostles portrays the Ascension as the turning-point between Jesus' own ministry on Earth and the era of the Mission of the Church.

This is a time in which we are expected to act as Jesus did, proclaiming always and everywhere the Good News. This period of the Church finds the Lord's disciples (you and me) being supported by another Advocate with the Father, the Spirit of them both.

Thus, the Lord Jesus continues to be present among us (his disciples), albeit in a new mode of existence.

The Second Reading from the Letter to the Hebrews uses Jewish cultic language reminiscent of the Temple Liturgy of the Jewish people. The unknown author of this Jewish-Christian letter speaks of Christ's entry into the heavenly realm after his Resurrection and Ascension.

Through his sacrificial death, victory over sin and death has been won for all faithful followers of the Lord. Indeed, we are now 'free from any trace of bad conscience and our bodies (are) washed with pure water'.

And it is from his heavenly sphere of existence that Christ continues his mission of salvation, supporting us as we proclaim the Good News.

And the Reading from Luke's Gospel for this weekend speaks of the conclusion of the era of Jesus' ministry with the great Invitation to all Christ's followers to begin preaching the Good News.

This reading contains Jesus' promise of the Coming Spirit, the Spirit of Power, the Spirit of the Living God, who will enable Christians to be fearless in their faithfulness to the Lord's admonition to evangelise in the face of persecution and ridicule.

So, how do these readings encourage us in Mission? Does the fact that the Lord is with us at all times aid us in the living out of His Gospel? Does His perpetual presence enable us to stand up and be counted as Christian despite peer pressure or human misunderstanding? Does Christ's continuing presence in the world strengthen us in our Proclamation of the Truth, the high ideals of the Gospel, to a world unable or unwilling to hear those words of salvation and liberation?

In the week ahead, the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, let's ask the Spirit to help all followers of the Lord Jesus to support each other as we strive to bring the Good News to a waiting world.

Why we do what we do.....

Why Must Roman Catholics Go to Mass Every Sunday?

The Catholic Church tells us that we have an obligation to go to Mass every Sunday. It is an obligation that most of us fulfill willingly, but many people don't understand why the Church requires this of us.

Our Sunday Obligation

In the Third Commandment, God tells us to "Remember to keep holy the sabbath day." For the Jews, the sabbath was Saturday; Christians, however, transferred the sabbath to Sunday, the day of Jesus Christ's resurrection from the dead. The Church tells us that we have an obligation to fulfill the Third Commandment by refraining from unnecessary work on Sunday and by participating in the Mass, our chief form of worship as Christians.

Private Worship Is Not Enough

From the earliest days of the Church, Christians have understood that being a Christian isn't a private matter. We are called to be Christians together; while we can and should engage in the private worship of God throughout the week, our primary form of worship is public and communal, which is why Sunday Mass is so important.

Why Is Mass Important to Catholics?

Catholics go to Mass every Sunday to participate in sacred worship and rituals. The service holds utmost importance in their lives because it allows them to receive the Holy Eucharist, or Communion, to put God first above all idols according to the Catholic First Commandment, and to observe the holiness of the Sabbath as part of the Third Commandment. The Mass ceremony consists of two parts: the Liturgy of the Word, and the Liturgy of the Eucharist.

First Commandment

The First Commandment proclaims to Catholic believers: "You shall not have strange Gods before me." Attending Mass is the main way that Catholics show their devotion to the Holy Trinity above all other gods or idols -- not limited to other entities, but pertaining to things of the material world, such as shopping or working. By setting aside time each Sunday for Mass, Catholics make God, Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit their most important priority in life.

Third Commandment

"Remember to keep holy the Lord's Day," says the Third Commandment. Sunday is considered the Lord's Day because it is the day on which Jesus was resurrected from the dead. By observing Mass on Sunday, Catholics honor and place importance on the eternal salvation that Jesus offers them through overcoming death. It was also on this day, after he rose from

the dead, that Jesus made an appearance to two of his disciples and broke bread with them, which is honored in Mass as the Liturgy of the Eucharist.

Liturgy of the Word

Liturgy is a term of Greek origin meaning an official public service. During the Mass, the Liturgy of the Word focuses on Bible readings and prayers. Each week, the Catholic Church chooses different selections from the Word of God. or Bible scripture, for reading and explanation, and related prayers are recited. Hymns are also sung as part of the service. The Liturgy of the Word holds great importance to Catholics because it connects them with the life instructions given them directly from God, helping them to apply their faith to everyday aspects of their lives.

Liturgy of the Eucharist

Eucharist is also a term of Greek origin that means "thanksgiving." The Liturgy of the Eucharist is an answer to Jesus' request to break bread, or take communion, in remembrance of him, as explained in the book of John: "Whoever eats this bread and drinks this blood will have eternal life": and in the book of Luke: "Do this in memory of me." The ritual of consuming a wafer that symbolizes Christ's body, and wine symbolizing his blood, takes place at Mass. Participating in the Eucharist places importance on having a personal relationship with Christ and giving thanks to him.

necessary to recall this general principle: Pastors must know that, for the sake of truth, they are obliged to exercise careful discernment of situations' (Familiaris Consortio, 84). The degree of responsibility is not equal in all cases and factors may exist which limit the ability to make a decision. Therefore, while clearly stating the Church's teaching, pastors are to avoid judgements that do not take into account the complexity of various situations, and they are to be attentive, by necessity, to how people experience and endure distress because of their condition" (AL 79).

Chapter four: "Love in mariage" (89 -164) The fourth chapter treats love in marriage, which it illuminates with Saint Paul's Hymn to Love in 1 Corinthians 13:4-7. This opening section is truly a painstaking, focused, inspired and poetic exegesis of the Pauline text. It is a collection of brief passages carefully and tenderly describing human love in absolutely concrete terms. The quality of psychological introspection that marks this exegesis is striking. The psychological insights enter into the emotional world of the spouses positive and negative - and the erotic dimension of love. This is an extremely rich and valuable contribution to Christian married life, unprecedented in previous papal documents.
