Pope Francis Asks: Are We So Busy We Never Listen?

Receiving a guest into our home doesn't require so many things, says Pope Francis, as only one thing is necessary: listening to the guest, hearing the thoughts of his heart, so that he feels he is truly among family. This was the Pope's reflection today before praying the midday Angelus with those gathered in St. Peter's Square.

Commenting on the Gospel from Luke, which recounts the story of Mary and Martha receiving Jesus in their home, the Holy Father spoke about the virtue of hospitality.

"In busying herself and doing things, Martha runs the risk of forgetting — and this is the problem — the presence of her guest, which in this case is Jesus," the Pope explained. "She forgets the presence of her guest." The Holy Father said that a guest — any guest, not just Jesus — doesn't need only to be served and fed. "Above all it is necessary that he is listened to," he said. With listening, a guest is welcomed as "a person, with his history, his heart rich in sentiments and thoughts, so that he might feel truly that he is among family."

Failing to do this, the Pope said, is like treating the guest like a rock.

"A guest must be listened to," Francis emphasized, adding, "Certainly, the answer Jesus gives Martha — when he tells her that only one thing is necessary — finds its full meaning in reference to hearing the word of Jesus himself, this word that enlightens and sustains all that we are and all that we do. If we are going to pray, for example, before a crucifix, and we talk and talk and talk and then we leave, we don't listen to Jesus. We don't allow him to speak to our hearts."

Lost virtue

Pope Francis said that in understanding hospitality in this way — with an emphasis on listening so as to respect the personhood of guests — we see that it is a human and Christian virtue, and one that "runs the risk of being left aside."

There is an increasing number of guest houses and types of accommodations, he said, "but in these places, a true hospitality isn't always lived out."

Are the stories of the ill, the marginalized, the refugee, the migrant listened to, he asked.

"Even in one's own house, among one's own family, it's easier to find service and care of various types than listening and welcome," the Pope lamented.

"Today we are so busy and in such a hurry, with so many problems, some of which are unimportant, that we lack the capacity to listen. We are constantly busy and thus we don't have time to listen," he said.

The Pope then turned his reflection to questions: "You, husband, do you have time to listen to your wife? You, wife, do you have time to listen to your husband? You, parents, do you have time, time to lose so as to listen to your children, or your grandparents, the elderly?"

Grandparents, especially, he said, need to be heard.

"I ask you to learn to listen and dedicate more time to this," the Pope concluded. "In the capacity to listen is the root of peace."

He said, 'I am bold indeed to speak like this, but perhaps there will only be twenty there.' 'I will not destroy it' he replied 'for the sake of the twenty.' He said, 'I trust my Lord will not be angry if I speak once more: perhaps there will only be ten.' 'I will not destroy it' he replied 'for the sake of the ten.'

Once Jesus was in a certain place praying, and when he had finished, one of his disciples said, 'Lord, teach us to pray, just as John taught his disciples.' He said to them, 'Say this when you pray:

If you then, who are evil, know how to give your children what is good, how much more will the heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him!'

Gospel Reflection

In the Gospel today, Jesus taught us how to pray to God our Father. It is the first and the greatest of all Christian prayers. Its short and simple phrases embrace every relation between us and God. It not only tells us what to pray for, but also how to pray for it. However we tend to recite it so hurriedly and unthinkingly that much of its meaning is lost. This is a pity. Because, properly understood, the Our Father contains a whole program for Christian living. If we were to live up to what it contains, we would be perfectly in tune with the mind of Christ, because undoubtedly that is how he himself prayed and lived.

The first part deals with God. We acknowledge God's existence, and calling him "Father". Then we praise his name. We pray for the coming of his kingdom - a kingdom of truth and life, holiness and grace, justice, love, and peace. We often say these words without being aware that our lives often point in the opposite direction, as we advance our own fame and we work hard to construct our own kingdoms. We only turn to God when our plans are disturbed. We also pray that

kingdoms. We only turn to God when our plans are disturbed. We also pray that his will may be done in our lives too. God's will may not always be the easiest thing to do, but it is always the best thing.

The second part deals with us and our needs.

We are asking God to provide all our material needs for today. We pray for forgiveness for our own sins, and for the grace to be able to forgive those who sin against us. Inability to forgive others makes it impossible for us to receive God's forgiveness. We also pray not to be led into temptation. God does not put temptation in our path but life does. We are asking God to help us to cope with the temptations that come to us unbidden, and to avoid those of our own choosing.

Finally, we pray to be delivered from all evil, both physical and moral. What we are asking God for is the grace to be victorious over all evil, but especially moral evil.

Notice that the whole of our Father is couched in plural terms. This shows that we are one family under God, and that there can be no salvation for us independent of others.

God has given the world into our hands to care for, but this never takes away the fact that the Lord of the whole of creation is our Lord and Father.

we are half-way through the preparation and anticipate the coming joy of Christmas or Easter. Some liturgists, particularly in the Episcopalian Church, have introduced the use of blue vestments during Advent as a way of distinguishing this season from Lent; however, no approval for blue vestments has been given for the Catholic Church. Purple vestments may also be used for Masses of Christian Burial or Masses for the Dead.

Although not seen very frequently in the United States today, black vestments may be worn for Masses of Christian Burial as a sign of death and mourning. Black may also be used on the Feast of All Souls or for any Mass of the Dead, such as on the anniversary of the death of a loved one.

In all, the colors of the vestments awaken us to the sense of sacred time. They are another visible way to make present the sacred mysteries we celebrate.

Why we do what we do..

STRAIGHT ANSWERS - THE COLOR OF LITURGICAL VESTMENTS

The Church's liturgical norms do prescribe specific vestment colors for various celebrations. The purpose of utilizing different colors for vestments is twofold: first, the colors highlight the particular liturgical season and the faithful's journey through these seasons. Second, the colors punctuate the liturgical season by highlighting a particular event or particular mystery of faith. The following explanation is based on the norms of *The General Instruction on the Roman Missal*>.

White or gold, a color symbolizing rejoicing and purity of soul, is worn during the liturgical seasons of Christmas and Easter. White vestments are also used for feasts of our Lord (except those pertaining to His passion), the Blessed Virgin Mary, the angels, and the saints who were not martyrs. White vestments are also worn on the Solemnity of St. Joseph, and the Feasts of All Saints, St. John the Baptist, St. John the Evangelist, the Chair of St. Peter, and the Conversion of St. Paul. White may also be used for Masses of Christian Burial and Masses for the Dead to signify the resurrection of our Lord, when He triumphed over sin and death, sorrow and darkness.

Red has a dual imagery: On one hand, red symbolizes the shedding of blood and is therefore used on Palm Sunday (when Christ entered Jerusalem to prepare for His death), Good Friday, any other commemoration of the Lord's passion, the votive Mass of the Precious Blood, the days marking the martyrdom of the apostles (except St. John), and the feasts of other martyrs who offered their lives for the faith.

On the other hand, red also signifies the burning fire of God's love. For this reason, red vestments are won on Pentecost when the Holy Spirit descended on the apostles and tongues of fire rested on their heads; for the celebration of the Sacrament of Confirmation; and for the votive Masses of the Holy Spirit.

Green is used during the liturgical season called Ordinary Time. This season focuses on the three-year period of our Lord's public ministry, and the Gospel passages, particularly on Sundays, recount His teachings, miracles, exorcisms, and other deeds during this time. All of these teachings and events engender great hope in the mystery of salvation. We focus on the life He shared with mankind during His time on this earth, the life we share now with Him in the community of the Church and through His sacraments, and we look forward to sharing everlasting life with Him perfectly in Heaven. Green symbolizes this hope and life, just as the hint of green on trees in early Spring arouses the hope of new life.

Violet or purple is used during Advent and Lent as a sign of penance, sacrifice and preparation. At the midpoint of both of these seasons—Gaudete Sunday (the third Sunday of Advent) and Laetare Sunday (the fourth Sunday of Lent—rose vestments are traditionally worn as a sign of joy: we rejoice at the midpoint because


