Please refer all parish matters to Fr Robert or Deacon Tan in my absence.



Gospel Reflection

It must be very difficult for Jesus to break into the lives of the people of his time with his strange message of God. Caught up in the loving obedience which dominated his life, he preached a message which was disturbing. It was so disturbing that it took him to the cross. A message of the closeness of a loving God to all people, and the demands which such love creates, necessarily leads to opposition. Indeed, our attempts to domesticate such a message show that humankind, even those parts known to be Christian, is still unable totally to accept his message.

Jesus was aware the call to Christian love is judged as an unrealistic option to resolve the problems of our complicated world. Thus he spoke of the fire which he was bringing to this earth, setting alight not only the hearts but also the lives of the people whom this touched.

The fire which Jesus' life and preaching brought would spread. But as it spread, it brought division into the lives of the people who accepted him and the promises of God's reign. He announces that the divisions would happen at the deepest level of social relationships, that is the family. Indeed, in the time of Jesus himself, and in the time when Luke was writing the Gospel, such things were happening such as father against son, son against father, mother against daughter and vice versa. The most intimate of human communities was divided as some members accepted the risk of following Jesus of Nazareth, while others refused it.

The divisions which Jesus and Luke knew may not be a part of our society. We live in a more difficult world, where people just do not care! We have to ask ourselves if we are prepared to live, with Jesus, the fire he brought upon this earth. Are we prepared to accept the divisions which he forces us to admit?

How do we cope with the fact that the person of Jesus can still divide families, even those called Christian? Or are we happy to hide our belief in the saving love of Jesus from the world in which we live, and only parade it when it is convenient? But remember that the fire and the division which Jesus brought are still present.

Why we do what we do..

MARY & THE SAINTS

Catholics believe that worship is due to God alone. Catholics do, however, venerate Mary. In other words, we honor our Blessed Mother with great reverence and devotion because she is the Mother of God. Mary is the model of perfect love and obedience to Christ. God preserved Mary from sin, and she conceived our Lord by the power of the Holy Spirit, bringing Christ into our world. Catholics can't help but honor the Blessed Virgin Mary, who is full of grace, the Mother of God and our Mother, for her "yes" to God that made the Incarnation possible. And without the Incarnation, we would not have salvation. Mary is the most beautiful model of total submission to the will of God. Catholics do not view Mary as equal to Christ, but rather venerate Mary because of her relationship to Christ. The Catechism of the Catholic Church explains, "Mary's role in the Church is inseparable from her union with Christ and flows directly from it" (CCC 964).

As Catholics, we pray that we can respond to God's call to holiness for our lives in the way that Mary did. Mother Theresa prayed to emulate Mary's devotion to Christ:

"Mary, Mother of Jesus, give me your heart so beautiful, so pure, so immaculate, so full of love and humility that I may be able to receive Jesus in the Bread of Life, love Him as You loved Him, and serve Him as You served Him..."

Like all Christians, Catholics believe in life after death, but we also believe that our relationship with other Christians does not end with death. Catholic prayer to saints is a recognition of this communion.

The Communion of Saints

As Catholics, we believe that our life doesn't end at death but simply changes. Those who have lived good lives and died in the faith of Christ will, as the Bible tells us, share in His Resurrection.

While we live together on earth as Christians, we are in communion, or unity, with one another. But that communion doesn't end when one of us dies. We believe that the saints, the Christians in heaven, remain in communion with those of us on earth.

So, just as we might ask a friend or family member to pray for us, we can approach a saint with our prayers, too.

Why we do .. (con't)

The Difference Between Prayer and Worship

Many non-Catholic Christians believe that it is wrong to pray to the saints, claiming that our prayers should be directed to God alone.

Some Catholics, responding to this criticism, have argued that we do not pray to the saints but with them.

Both groups, however, are confusing prayer with worship. True worship (as opposed to veneration or honor) does indeed belong to God alone, and we should never worship man or any other creature as we worship God. But while worship may take the form of prayer, as in the Mass and other liturgies of the Church, not all prayer is worship. When we pray to the saints, we're simply asking them to help us, by praying to God on our behalf, or thanking them for having already done so.
