# Pope's Morning Homily: 'Real' Authority Enters Hearts

At Casa Santa Marta, Francis Speaks on 3 Characteristics of Jesus' Authority JAN 10, 2017 DEBORAH CASTELLANO LUBOVPOPE & HOLY SEE, POPE'S MORNING HOMILY

Authority, if true, will enter hearts, like Jesus' did. But if it's just formal, it won't

. . .

According to Vatican Radio, Pope Francis stressed this to faithful during his daily morning Mass at Casa Santa Marta, as he shared the three characteristics of Jesus' 'real' authority, as opposed to that which was just formal, that of the Pharisees.

Recalling that today's Gospel speaks of the amazement of the people because Jesus taught "as one who has authority" and not like the scribes, whose teachings never entered the people's hearts. He was not a "seducer," He taught the Law "down to the last point," He taught the Truth, but with authority.

#### Being at Service of Others

Noting the first characteristic was 'serving people,' Francis stressed how Jesus always served others, and took on the attitude of servant, which gave him authority.

On the other hand, the Pope explained, these doctors of the law that the people, even if they listened to and respected, didn't really feel they had authority over them.

"These," Francis said, "had a psychology of princes: We are the masters, the princes, and we teach you. Not service: we command, you obey.' And Jesus never passed Himself off like a prince: He was always the servant of all, and this is what gave Him authority."

#### Closeness to the people

The second characteristic that confers authority, Francis stressed, is being close to the people, one which Jesus demonstrated, and the Pharisees did not.

"Jesus did not have an allergy to the people: touching the lepers, the sick, didn't make Him shudder," Pope Francis explained, noting how on the other hand, the Pharisees despised "the poor people, the ignorant," they liked to walk about the piazzas, in nice clothing."

"They were detached from the people, they were not close [to them]; Jesus was very close to the people, and this gave authority. Those detached people, these doctors, had a clericalist psychology: they taught with a clericalist authority – that's clericalism."

The Pontiff also expressed how he enjoys reading about the closeness to the people the Blessed Paul VI had. In number 48 of Evangelii nuntiandi, Francis noted, "one sees the heart of a pastor who is close [to the people]."

#### Coherence

The third point that distinguishes the authority of the scribes from that of Jesus, Francis stressed, is 'coherence.'

Jesus "lived what He preached," the Pope highlighted, while criticizing the 'princes' who possessed 'clericalist attitudes.' The Pope, in order to make this better understood, recalled the parable of the Good Samaritan, and reiterated the servant, close, and coherent real authority of our Lord.

#### Gospel Reflection

Matthew's text for this Third Sunday of Ordinary Time (Year A) has two parts to it:

- i) Jesus is the Light who takes up where John the Baptist left off, preaching the coming of the Kingdom of God. He does this in Galilee, the land of Zebulun and Naphtali the place where the First Reading speaks of as a land in darkness where a light will shine. Matthew sees Jesus as the fulfilment of Isaiah's prophecy: he is a light to Jews and Pagans alike, a light to ALL the nations of the world.
- ii) The Preaching of Jesus creates a band of followers, called Apostles ones who are sent on a similar mission as Jesus. It is worth noting that Jesus is the 'actor'; that is, he is the one who initiates the relationship of Master/Disciple through his action of Calling. Furthermore, the Call was so powerful that those called left everything to follow him. One Biblical Commentator (J.P. Meier) states: "The creative Word of God simply meets them in their everyday world, lays hold of them, and changes their lives forever".

Building on these two themes, we can see that Jesus, the Light of God in the world, who calls others to follow him, demands a TOTAL COMMITMENT from his Disciples: like with Peter and Andrew, livelihood is sometimes left behind to walk in the Master's footsteps; like with John and Andrew, family relationships can take a back seat when one follows the promptings of the Spirit. A total commitment to the Mission of Jesus in bringing about the Kingdom is demanded of all who call themselves Christian. Our love for all, our living of the Gospel in everyday life = our faithful following of the Lord will then be as light to the darkness, lighting up our world with the Love of the Son for all humankind. Hence Jesus will say to his Disciples: "you are salt of the earth... light of the world".

So, my brothers and sisters, let's not be like the Corinthians in our Second Reading this weekend, who went off on tangents from the simple Truth of the Gospel, following the idiosyncratic spirituality of one preacher over another.... rather, let us strive to be people who are totally committed to the one Master and Lord. Let us be people who build up God's Kingdom on earth and who, as lights in The Light, shine out in this world of ours and proclaim with conviction and vigour that JESUS CHRIST IS LORD!





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#### Why we do what we do...

#### Why We Do What We Do at Mass, Part 1

Have you ever noticed how many different gestures and postures we use at Mass? Sometimes they are called Catholic calisthenics! There is a reason and meaning to everything that is done at Mass. As we begin summer I would like to begin a series in this column on the gestures and postures at Mass: Why we do what we do (WWDWWD).

It is worthwhile to consider why the Mass is so structured. Compared to the services of a good many non-Catholic Christians, the Mass can seem a bit rigid; not allowing for 'free expression'. There is reason to the strict format of the Mass. Can you imagine if, over 2000 years, the Church had allowed for every community to do what it wanted with and at the Mass? The Mass, essentially Jesus' Real Presence and Sacrifice on the altar to His Heavenly Father, would have been lost a long time ago. Essential words from the Last Supper, 'This is My Body . . . This is My Blood,' as well as the understanding of the Mass, would have been dropped and/or confusedly substituted by 'more meaningful' terms in each community. Perhaps, 'more appropriate' matter, physical stuff, would have been employed rather than bread and wine.

The Catholic Church that Jesus founded has, as one of its chief missions, to maintain the Seven Sacraments that Jesus instituted. Therefore, the Church is strict about how each sacrament must be celebrated. This is so that the Sacraments may be faithfully celebrated and passed on to all generations. In the document from Vatican Council II on the Sacred Liturgy, Sacrosanctum Concilium, as well as the General Instruction to the Roman Missal, (both documents guide priests as to the celebration of the Mass) the Church teaches that no one – including priests - may arbitrarily add or subtract from the liturgy of the Mass or other sacraments. The priest is guided as what to say and what gestures/postures to make at Mass by the Roman Missal which is nothing other than the big red book on the altar from which the priest reads at Mass.

Because of the structure of the Mass there is a beautiful phenomenon that occurs. The Mass is not dependent upon the personality and attributes of the priest. It doesn't matter who the priest is! Each priest plugs into the Mass. In this way, Christ the High Priest is able to shine through every priest at Mass. Years ago I met a woman who converted to Catholicism two years after her husband had died. Her husband had been one of the ministers at a local Baptist Church. When asked why, she responded that in her church every service's structure depended on the minister. It was quite focused on the personality of the minister as to how the service would run. For many years she had admired and longed for the continuity and consistency of the Catholic Mass.
