

#### World Day of Migrants and Refugees 2018 (extract)

Dear brothers and sisters!

"You shall treat the stranger who sojourns with you as the native among you, and you shall love him as yourself, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God" (Leviticus 19:34).

Every stranger who knocks at our door is an opportunity for an encounter with Jesus Christ, who identifies with the welcomed and rejected strangers of every age (Matthew 25:35-43). The Lord entrusts to the Church's motherly love every person forced to leave their homeland in search of a better future. This solidarity must be concretely expressed at every stage of the migratory experience - from departure through journey to arrival and return. This is a great responsibility, which the Church intends to share with all believers and men and women of good will, who are called to respond to the many challenges contemporary migration with generosity, promptness, wisdom and foresight, each according to their own abilities.

In this regard, I wish to reaffirm that "our shared response may be articulated by four verbs: to welcome, to protect, to promote and to integrate".

Considering the current situation, welcoming means, above all, offering broader options for migrants and refugees to enter destination countries safely and legally. This calls for concrete a commitment to increase and simplify the process for granting humanitarian visas and for reunifying families. At the same time, I hope that a greater number of countries will adopt private and community sponsorship open humanitarian programmes, and corridors for particularly vulnerable refugees. Furthermore, special temporary visas should be granted to people fleeing conflicts neighbouring countries. in Collective and arbitrary expulsions of migrants and refugees are not suitable solutions, particularly where people are countries which guarantee respect for human dignity and fundamental rights. Once again, I want to emphasise the importance of offering refugees migrants adequate and dignified initial accommodation. "More widespread programmes of welcome, initiated in different places, seem to favour a personal encounter and allow for greater quality of service and increased guarantees of success". The principle of the centrality of the human person, firmly stated by my beloved Predecessor, Benedict XVI, obliges us to always prioritise personal safety over national security. The situation of migrants, asylum seekers and refugees requires that they be guaranteed personal safety and access to basic services. For the sake of the fundamental dignity of every human person, we must strive to find alternative solutions to detention for those who enter a country without authorisation.

The second verb - protecting - may be understood as a series of steps intended to defend the rights and dignity of migrants and refugees, independent of their legal status. Such protection begins in the country of origin, and consists in offering reliable and verified information before departure, and in providing safety from illegal recruitment practices. This must be ongoing, as far as possible, in the country of migration, guaranteeing them adequate consular assistance, the right to personally retain their documents of identification at all times, fair access to justice, the possibility of opening a personal bank account, and a minimum sufficient to live on. When duly recognised and valued, the potential and skills of migrants, asylum seekers and refugees are a true resource for the communities that welcome them. This is why I hope that, in countries of arrival, migrants may be offered freedom of movement, work opportunities, and access to means of communication, out of respect for their dignity. For those who decide to return to their homeland, I want to



#### Gospel Reflection

Jesus had a sense of humour! Simon, son of Jonah, was far from being a rock solid supporter of Jesus. So Jesus gave him the nickname 'Rocky' which in the Greek is Petros.

Jesus puns with the nickname: 'You are Rocky and upon this rock I will build my church.' The natural personality of shifting sands was being transformed by the blessing just given (the only blessing bestowed upon an apostle by Jesus).

Notice that Jesus only makes promises about 'my church', not a church shaped by human imagination, e.g. modes of Roman Imperial rule or with a Eurocentric mindset.

Fortunately, we have a successor of St Peter responding to our Risen Lord's command to St Francis of Assisi, 'Rebuild my church'.

We could pause for a moment to pray that the Risen Lord showers the 265th successor of St Peter with every blessing so that the Church of Jesus the Christ continues to prevail over the forces of death which threaten humanity.



#### POSTAL PLEBISCITE on "SAME-SEX MARRIAGE" announced

The Australian Government announced there will be a postal plebiscite on whether the definition of marriage in the Marriage Act 1961 should be changed to include "same-sex marriage". Ballot papers will be sent out to households on Tuesday, 12 September and all votes must be received back by Tuesday, November. If you are not enrolled to vote, or if you need to update your postal address, go to www.aec.gov.au/enrol/ before the cut-off date of Thursday, 24 August. Vote No, to keep marriage as a unique relationship between a woman and a man.



emphasise the need to develop social and professional reintegration programmes. The International Convention on the Rights of the Child provides a universal legal basis for the protection of underage migrants. They must be spared any form of detention related to migratory status, and must be guaranteed regular access to primary and secondary education. Temporary custody or foster should be provided for programmes unaccompanied minors and separated from their families. The universal right to a nationality should be recognised and duly certified for all children at birth. The statelessness which migrants and refugees sometimes fall into can easily be avoided with the adoption of "nationality legislation that is in conformity with the fundamental principles of international law".

Promoting essentially means a determined effort to ensure that all migrants and refugees – as well as the communities which welcome them - are empowered to achieve their potential as human beings, in all the dimensions which constitute the humanity intended by the Creator. In 2006, Benedict XVI highlighted how, in the context of migration, the family is "a place and resource of the culture of life and a factor for the integration of values". The family's integrity must always be promoted, supporting family reunifications - including grandparents, grandchildren and siblings – independent of requirements. While I recognize praiseworthy efforts, thus far, of many countries, in international terms of cooperation and humanitarian aid, I hope that the offering of this assistance will take into account the needs (such as medical and social assistance, as well as education) developing countries which receive significant influx of migrants and refugees. I also hope that local communities which are vulnerable and facing material hardship, will be included among aid beneficiaries.

The final verb - integrating - concerns the

opportunities for intercultural enrichment brought about by the presence of migrants and refugees. Integration is not "an assimilation that leads migrants to suppress or to forget their own cultural identity. Rather, contact with others leads to discovering their 'secret', to being open to them in order to welcome their valid aspects and thus contribute to knowing each one better. This is a lengthy process that aims to shape societies and cultures, making them more and more a reflection of the multi-faceted gifts of God to human beings". I reiterate the need to foster a culture of encounter in every way possible by increasing opportunities for intercultural exchange, documenting and disseminating best practices of integration, and developing programmes to prepare local communities for integration processes.

Dear brothers and sisters, in light of these processes currently underway, the coming months offer a unique opportunity to advocate and support the concrete actions which I have described with four verbs. I invite you, therefore, to use every occasion to share this message with all political and social actors involved (or who seek to be involved) in the process which will lead to the approval of the two Global Compacts.

The Holy Mother of God herself experienced the hardship of exile (Matthew 2:13-15), lovingly accompanied her Son's journey to Calvary, and now shares eternally his glory. To her maternal intercession we entrust the hopes of all the world's migrants and refugees and the aspirations of the communities which welcome them, so that, responding to the Lord's supreme commandment, we may all learn to love the other, the stranger, as ourselves.

#### Why we do what we do

#### Why We Need Marriage

In an age when so many question the need for marriage, it's helpful to remind ourselves why this was the first institution God created.

One of the most seductive lies in any era is the belief that we no longer need the old beliefs.

It usually sounds something like this: "Surely our world is now so modern and so sophisticated that we've transcended the need for biblical truth. That's old-fashioned. We need new, progressive values and institutions for our contemporary world."

And so, in our modern culture, the institution of marriage is under siege. It's not just that so many people are unable to keep a marriage going for more than a few years. An increasing number are also wondering if there's anything special about especially marriage. Many, cohabiting couples, don't see the need marriage. Some say it's time to replace marriage with something different.

A pair of Newsweek writers recently declared that the concept of a couple marrying for a lifetime is outdated: "With our life expectancy in the high 70s," they wrote, "the idea that we're meant to be together forever is less realistic. ... Healthy partnerships are possible, for sure—but the permanence of marriage seems naïve, almost arrogant."

When I asked Marriage Memo readers whether they agreed with statements that marriage is a "dying institution," a number made a great point: God is the one who created the institution of marriage, and He has the final word on whether it will die.

So it is helpful, in an age when so many question the need for marriage, to remind ourselves why this was the first institution God created. Marriage is at the center of God's purpose for mankind.

One of God's purposes for marriage is to mutually complete one another, and to experience companionship. The Bible speaks to this purpose in the book of Genesis, when God created man and then said, "It is not good that the man should be alone; I will make him a helper fit for him" (Genesis 2:18).

Marriage is God's provision to meet our deep longing for a close and intimate relationship. He puts a man and woman together and uses their respective strengths and weaknesses to make them stronger as a team. It is in marriage that God calls people to put aside their selfishness, commit themselves to another person unconditionally, and assume responsibility for others.

Another purpose for marriage is to multiply a godly legacy. Genesis 1:28 tells us that God blessed man and woman and said to them, "Be fruitful and multiply and fill the earth." Other Scriptures such as Deuteronomy 6:4-9 emphasize that the home is a crucial environment for teaching children the Word of God and modelling a lifestyle of love for God and commitment to Him. The best place for children to understand concepts like gender roles, unconditional love, and interdependence is in a family where both parents are present and involved.

Some would argue that the first two objectives I've mentioned could be fulfilled outside the bond of matrimony. But God's third purpose for marriage—to mirror His image to the world—reveals just how significant this institution is.

Genesis 1:27 says, "So God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them." He created humanity to reflect His image. The oneness a man and woman experience in marriage reflects the character and unity of God (Matthew 19:4-6). And Ephesians 5:22-33 tell us that the love and commitment between a husband and wife is a picture of the love and commitment between Christ and His followers.

For many years I've had trouble

grasping this final purpose, because it's a bit mysterious. But the longer I'm married the more clearly I've understood it. God gave me my wife—a woman whose love and commitment I trust without question—to give me a glimpse of His love for me. And, just as important, by looking at our marriage, other people can see a model of that same love.

One Marriage Memo reader spoke of this purpose for marriage in a comment on actress Cameron Diaz's belief that relationships work best when they last no longer than five years. "God did not send His Son so that we may spend five years with Him," the reader wrote. "He sent His son so that

who ever believes in Him shall have everlasting life. We get to spend eternity with the Father."

In the same way, "God did not create marriage to be given up whenever it gets tough. He created it so that we can have our companion to go through life's journey together, until death do us part." A solid, lasting marriage is a picture of God's lasting commitment to us.

Since marriage is that important to God, it should be that important to us. He created it for His glory and for our good. We cannot afford to let it continue to decline in our culture.
