It's time to set a new course toward the future Father William Grimm, MM, Tokyo Japan

Why is it that Catholics in 2017 are still expected to use forms of worship that go back to late classical times?

Pope Francis has set about to introduce reforms in the Catholic Church and to redirect the way it functions. One step he has taken recently has far-reaching consequences not only for the entire church but particularly for local churches in Asia.

The pope has made a change to canon law that will put authority over liturgical translation clearly where it was put by Vatican II: "*Translations from the Latin text into the mother tongue which are intended for use in the liturgy must be approved by the competent territorial ecclesiastical authority.*"

That authority is the bishops' conferences.

Since all the English-speaking bishops' conferences in the world unanimously approved a translation prepared in 1997 that was later rejected by non-English speaking hierarchs in Rome, it should be a simple matter to replace the present maltranslation with that one in real English.

However, it remains to be seen if what should be will actually be done by bishops appointed in part because of their fidelity to Roman centralization and an atavistic nostalgia for ancient forms. How else is one to interpret the fact that in 2017 Catholics are still expected to use forms of worship that go back to late classical times?

The pope is allowing modern languages and sensibilities to be part of that ancient usage, but the central act of Catholic worship remains a translation of a dead language that embodies dead customs and attitudes. We continue to sail back in time.

There was a time when the liturgy developed in various ways in response to differing cultures. That is why we have more than 20 rites in the Catholic Church. But, at some point in history, a conviction apparently arose that the Holy Spirit was no longer around to work in different times and climes, at least in Catholic times and climes.

So, the language of Shakespeare in literature and the King James Bible and Book of Common Prayer in worship, a language that continues to embody the aspirations and wisdom of vast numbers of God's children, cannot be used to create liturgy, but may merely be a tool for translation of dead Latin.

Is it impossible that 21st-century Catholics are less able than our brothers and sisters a millennium and a half ago to develop liturgies and prayers that respond to the working of the Holy Spirit in our age and proclaim that working in ways intelligible not only to others but to ourselves as well?

Yet, we continue to sail away from our own time and culture, all the while moaning that the world is little interested in journeying with us. And that ship bears more than liturgy into the past.

Last year, a commission appointed by Pope Francis began to study the history of the early church to see if the presence of women deacons then can be used to justify opening that ministry to women today. Why?

The presence or absence of women deacons then is irrelevant today. The church in its first centuries did not look to precedents in answering the needs of the community. There were none. Those Christians apparently had enough confidence in the presence of the Holy Spirit among them that they simply did what needed to be done.

Dear sisters and brothers,

As I write to you, the national debate on same-sex civil marriage is in full swing. It is an issue that many feel passionate about and hence, it has potential to polarise the community. I appeal to all Catholics in the Diocese of Parramatta to conduct this dialogue with a deep sense of respect for all concerned, and for the opinion and decision that each person is free to make.



It is important to remember from the very outset that the postal survey is about whether or not Australians want the legal definition of civil marriage changed to include same-sex couples. It is not a referendum on sacramental marriage as understood by the Catholic Church.

Many years ago, divorce was legalised in Australia; but this change did not alter the law of the Church. Therefore, whatever the outcome of the survey or the eventual legislation by the government, the Church will continue to hold that marriage is a natural institution established by God to be a permanent union between one man and one woman, directed both to mutual companionship and to the formation of a family in which children are born and nurtured.

For many Catholics, the issue of same-sex marriage is not simply theoretical but deeply personal. These may be same-sex attracted people themselves or that may be the case with their relatives and friends. In such cases, they are torn between their love for the Church and their love for their same-sex attracted child, grandchild, sibling, cousin, friend or neighbour.


As your bishop, I wish to reiterate the commitment I made at my installation: "I am committed to make the church in Parramatta the house for all peoples, a church where there is less an experience of exclusion but more an encounter of radical love, inclusiveness and solidarity." As a community of disciples, we seek to accommodate, accompany and care for one another irrespective of sexual orientation, marital status and situation.

I invite all Catholics in our Diocese to exercise our responsibility as citizens to engage in this community discernment. It should not be a matter of a simple answer Yes or No to the postal survey. It should be an opportunity for us to witness to our deep commitment to the ideal of Christian marriage. But it should also be an opportunity for us to listen to what the Spirit is saying through the signs of the times.

Throughout much of history, our gay and lesbian (or LGBTI) brothers and sisters have often not been treated with respect, sensitivity and compassion. Regrettably, the Church has not always been a place where they have felt welcomed, accepted and loved. Thus, regardless of the outcome of the survey, we must commit ourselves to the task of reaching out to our LGBTI brothers and sisters, affirming their dignity and accompanying them on our common journey towards the fullness of life and love in God.

Let us pray, discern and act with the wisdom of the Holy Spirit. Catholics, in keeping with the tradition of the Church, are asked to exercise their consciences, ensuring that they are informed as they come to exercise their democratic rights in the coming postal survey.

Why are you jealous because I am generous?

Jesus said to his disciples: "The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner going out at daybreak to hire workers for his vineyard. He made an agreement with the workers for one denarius a day, and sent them to his vineyard. Going out at about the third hour he saw others standing idle in the market place and said to them, "You go to my vineyard too and I will give you a fair wage." So they went. At about the sixth hour and again at about the ninth hour, he went out and did the same. Then at about the eleventh hour he went out and found more men standing round, and he said to them, "Why have you been standing here idle all day?" "Because no one has hired us" they answered. He said to them, "You go into my vineyard too." In the evening, the owner of the vineyard said to his bailiff, "Call the workers and pay them their wages, starting with the last arrivals and ending with the first." So those who were hired at about the eleventh hour came forward and received one denarius each. When the first came, they expected to get more, but they too received one denarius each. They took it, but grumbled at the landowner. "The men who came last" they said "have done only one hour, and you have treated them the same as us, though we have done a heavy day's work in all the heat." He answered one of them and said, "My friend, I am not being unjust to you; did we not agree on one denarius? Take your earnings and go. I choose to pay the last-comer as much as I pay you. Have I no right to do what I like with my own? Why be envious because I am generous?" Thus the last will be first, and the first, last.'





PARISH ASSEMBLY

Our recent parish assembly was a great success, with over 120 parishioners in attendance. There was a lot of discussion and the discussion groups came up with over 280 comments, suggestions and ideas.

The organising committee is collating those suggestions and the various ministry groups in our parish will be reporting back with their plans in the near future. We would like to thank everyone who attended, the organising committee and those who prepared the marvelous lunch.

What is the origin of the sign of the cross at the gospel, bowing at the Creed, and shaking hands for the sign of peace?

These gestures are prescribed in the General Instruction of the Roman Missal, and accordingly should be practiced by all the faithful. Each of them also has a strong tradition in the celebration of Mass.

Concerning the making the sign of the cross at the proclamation of the Holy Gospel, after the deacon or priest says, “A reading from the Holy Gospel according to . . .,” he and the faithful make the sign of the cross with the thumb on the forehead, lips, and breast over the heart. (*The deacon or priest also makes the sign of the cross on the Lectionary or Book of the Gospels.*)

The first recorded instance of making the sign of the cross at the proclamation of the gospel is found in the ninth century: Regimius of Auxerre (d. c. 908) in his *Expositio* recorded how the people in the congregation would sign their foreheads, and the deacon would sign his forehead and breast. By the eleventh century, as attested to by Pope Innocent III, the deacon would make the sign of the cross on the Lectionary or Book of Gospels, and then both he and the congregation would sign the forehead, lips, and breast. The significance of the threefold signing is that we want to hear the Holy Gospel with an open mind, proclaim it with our lips, and cherish and safeguard it in our hearts. We are imploring the Lord for the grace to receive, acknowledge, and then profess the faith that has been received in the Holy Gospel through our Lord, Jesus Christ, the Word of God incarnate.

During the Profession of Faith (the Nicene-Constantinopolitan Creed) all bow at the mystery of the incarnation: “...by the power of the Holy Spirit, He was born of the Virgin Mary and became man.” Prior to the *Novus Ordo* of 1969, all genuflected at these words, and on the Solemnity of the Annunciation and on Christmas, we still do. The earliest record of this practice originates in the twelfth century, as found in the writings of Blessed Peter of Cluny (d. 1156), and in the rituals of the Carthusians and Premonstratensian orders. This physical gesture – whether bowing or genuflecting – makes us mindful of the ineffable mystery of the incarnation, when our Lord, Jesus Christ, entered this world for our salvation, true God becoming also true man.

Finally, the offering of a sign of peace (formally called the “Kiss of Peace”) boasts an even greater tradition. St. Justin the Martyr (d. 165) in his *First Apology* (which provides one of the earliest written accounts of the Mass) described the offering of a sign of peace after the readings and introductory prayers, but before the offertory prayers. Tertullian (d. 250) regarded the Kiss of Peace as a “seal” placed upon the prayers offered. St. Cyril of Jerusalem (d. 386) in his *Catechetical Lectures* also recorded how the deacon would call for the congregation to exchange a sign of peace. Moreover, St. Cyril explained, “Do not suppose that this kiss is like those given by mutual friends in the marketplace. Such a kiss this is not. This kiss blends souls one with another, and woos for them forgetfulness of every injury. This kiss, then, is a sign of the intermingling of souls and of the banishment of every remembrance of injury. It was in this regard that Christ said, ‘If you are offering your gift at the altar, and while there you remember that your brother has something against you, leave your gift at the altar and go out first and be reconciled to your brother; and then come up and offer your gift.’ The kiss, therefore is reconciliation, and because of this it is holy. Just so, where the blessed Paul cried out, saying, ‘*Bid one another welcome in a holy kiss*’ and Peter, ‘In a kiss of charity.’”

Seen as a natural prelude before the reception of Holy Communion and an affirmation of the whole meaning of the Mass, Pope Innocent I in a letter to the Bishop of Gubbio (416) mandated that the Kiss of Peace occur after the consecration. Later, Pope Gregory the Great (d. 604) set the exchange of the Kiss of Peace after the Our Father.

Because of the growth of the size of congregations over the centuries, how the Kiss of Peace was exchanged evolved. By the tenth century, the Kiss of Peace began at the altar and then emanated to the congregation. By the thirteen century a kissing board or “Pax board” (osculatorium) was introduced which the priest kissed and then this was passed through the congregation with each kissing it. Eventually, the sign of peace was offered only during the High Mass as an embrace between the priest, deacon, and subdeacon. In the low Mass the priest would simply kiss the altar, and say, “Pax tecum” followed by the response, “Et cum spiritu tuo.”

In the Novus Ordo, the Kiss of Peace has been restored to its more traditional practice. The priest may invite the congregation to offer to each other a sign of peace “according to local custom.” Note that the priest does not have to invite the congregation to do so; the verbal exchange between the priest and the congregation of “The peace of the Lord be with you always” followed by “And also with you” may suffice for this ritual. The actual sign of peace may include a handshake, embrace, or even a kiss for a loved one.

These gestures should be taken seriously and performed reverently. They are physical actions which help us form a proper spiritual disposition and reverence during the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass.
