Gospel Reflection

'Very well, give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar – and to God what belongs to God.'

These words have been a constant source of wisdom for the Church throughout her two thousand years. They have prompted many to think about the relation Christians should have with the world and the way the Church interacts with the State. At many times throughout those two thousands years Christians have enjoyed a peaceful cooperation with the world, contributing much to it. At other times they have had to withdraw from the world and the State because of persecution. This is currently the state of play for many Christians in China or Sudan, for example. The first reading reminds us that whatever the state of play is, God is over-looking everything; his providence is our guide; he rules the world. We should always take comfort in this and trust in it. Easier said than done, I suppose.

Yet even when things are well and we Christians can live peaceably in the world, there ought to be something that does not quite sit well with us, there is still some distance between us and the world, however much we should work for its good. The second reading gives us a clue as to why. We have been chosen; we have been called by God to a life beyond this one. Our eyes must be set on that life, on its promise, its hope, its joy, which means that our eyes cannot be set on this world, not entirely at least. We cannot become absorbed by the world because we know that our life is not bound by it. This means that we cannot render to Caesar certain things because God has already claimed them. We cannot give Caesar our whole mind, our unreserved obedience because God has a prior claim on these. We cannot live for the world. Jesus Christ has won for us a new life, an everlasting life and we must render to him what belongs to him. We should, as Christians, always feel a little uncomfortable or incomplete in the world because we know that our existence does not end here, that we are not fulfilled here. If we do not feel this discomfort, then perhaps we have not rendered to God what is God's, but handed it over to Caesar instead; perhaps we have not appreciated the grace that Jesus Christ has won for us. This week, let us ask ourselves what we have rendered to God, and what we have rendered to Caesar and make sure that the scales are properly balanced.

Diocesan and Deanery Pastoral Councils - Why they Matter

How do we cooperate across parishes and regions in our mission to serve Jesus Christ? How do listen to one another, identify key priorities and make informed decisions to serve those in need and increase the faith and witness of our church? About five years ago, consultations took place across the Diocese of Parramatta, as lay people joined with clergy to consider what mattered in supporting our mission to follow Christ. Our resulting Diocesan Pastoral Plan, *Faith in our Future*, offers goals of growing our faith and sharing our faith to shape the life and structures of our Diocese.

Of course, we are called not to live these goals in isolation but as the Body of Christ. And while our main plan to love, know and serve Jesus Christ never changes, our particular goals grow and change, because our communities change, along with the issues affecting our local region. So, we need to continue to consult with our communities to ensure we are reading the signs of the times, and remaining attentive to what the church calls the *sensus fidelium*, in other words, the living voice of the whole people of God.

How do we ensure we are listening to the people of our Diocese? Successive papal and Vatican documents as well as the <u>Code of Canon Law</u> offer strong encouragement for the formation of councils of the faithful, especially of lay people. Such councils express the laity's rightful co-responsibility for the mission of the Church. Our Diocese has previously called upon each parish to establish a Parish Pastoral Council to support the pastoral priorities in each faith community. And now, Bishop of Parramatta, Bishop Vincent Long OFM Conv, in his desire to enhance our communion and mission, has instituted <u>Deanery Pastoral Councils and a Diocesan Pastoral Council</u>. These bodies aim to strengthen the growing and sharing of faith in Christ within the Diocese of Parramatta. They are also formed to assist our collaboration with the wider Church in Australia as we look forward to the 2020 National Plenary.

RELATED: An invitation from Bishop Vincent

We can be forgiven for being somewhat sceptical at the development of these councils. Why gather people to meet about things when we already have a plan? Why not just get on with it? Councils offer several important roles. The first, is to broaden the thinking about and responsibility for important matters beyond the clergy. Lay people can offer advice from a range of perspectives. After all, there is no point in rolling out actions if the very parishes these actions are supposed to benefit do not see the relevance of what is on offer. As such, councils have a significant consultative role. Secondly, councils enhance our Diocese's accountability for what we do. Diocesan agencies, works and clergy must consider many complex pastoral realities. While there are certain sensitivities surrounding many of these matters, there is also a need to ensure that key decisions are justifiable and transparent to the broader community being served. Councils offer a level of transparency and accountability to our leadership. Thirdly, councils witness to the role of all the baptised in the building up of the Church and the service of the mission. The Church is constituted both of laity and clergy, and when we work together, we can offer a far more enriching result in the service of our God. Bishop Vincent wants to hear the voices of everyday Catholics on the issues that matter to our Church and world. The Diocesan and deanery pastoral councils seek a cross-section of people from different places in the Diocese and from different ages, backgrounds and experiences. They will meet about four times a year. It would be great to have a range of inspiring and challenging voices contributing to the councils. As such, your help is needed.



Why we do what we do

HALLOWEEN: ITS ORIGINS AND CELEBRATION

The celebration of Halloween has dual origins. The first is in a pre-Christian Celtic feast associated with the Celtic New Year. The second is in the Christian celebration of All Saints Day (Nov. 1st) and All Souls Day (Nov. 2). In the British Isles November 1st is called All Hallows, thus the evening before is All Hallows Eve.

The Celtic Feast: The ancient Celtic peoples who inhabited England, Wales, Scotland, Ireland and Brittany (NW France) celebrated their New Year's Day on what would be November 1st on our calendar. Prior to their conversion to Catholicism these peoples practiced a pagan religion controlled by a priest class known as Druids. The Druids are most famous for the stone monument of Stonehenge and other astronomical calendars that remain in their former domains.

The period prior to the New Year, as the year wound down, was a time to consider the mystery of human death. It was believed that on the last night of the year the lord of death, Samhain, allowed the souls of the dead to return to their homes. Souls that had died in sin, and in Celtic belief imprisoned in the bodies of animals, could be released through gifts to the lord of death, including human sacrifices. It was also thought that evil spirits, demons, ghosts, witches were also free to roam around this night and could be placated by a feast. They would also leave you alone if you dressed like them and thus appeared to be one of them. Families would also extinguish their hearth fires on this evening to be re-lit from a common New Year's bonfire built on the hilltops, which was meant to symbolize the driving away of darkness and evil with the coming of the new year. The jack-o-lantern as a means of scaring away evil and providing light may be a vestige of this custom. When the Romans conquered Gaul (France) and Britain (excluding Scotland and Ireland) in the century before and after Christ, the bloody elements of Druidic practice were banned.

The Christian Feasts of All Saints and All Souls: During the first three centuries of Christianity the Church frequently had to operate "underground" due to the persecutions of the Roman state against her. During these periods there were many martyrs who died for their faith in Jesus Christ. The most renowned of these were honored locally by the preservation of the relics (if available) and by the celebration of the anniversary of their death, as a feast in honor of their birth into eternal life. As time passed, neighboring dioceses would honor each others martyrs and even exchange relics for veneration, the way the first century Christians kept the clothes and handkerchiefs touched by St. Paul (Acts 19:12).


At the end of the third century and the beginning of the fourth the most vicious of all persecutions occurred, that of the emperor Diocletian (284-305). The martyrs became so many that in some places it was impossible to commemorate even the most significant of them. The need for a common feast of all martyrs was becoming evident. This common feast became a reality in some places, but on various dates, as early as the middle of the fourth century. As far as Roman practice goes it is known that on 13 May 609 or 610, Pope Boniface IV consecrated the ancient Roman Pantheon as a temple of the Blessed Virgin and All Martyrs. Beginning with Gregory III (731-741) the celebration of a feast of All Saints was commemorated at St. Peters on November 1. Gregory IV (827-844) extended this feast to the entire Church.

The feast of All Souls developed more gradually, first with a monastic celebration of their departed on October 1st. This seems to have occurred first in Germany in the

900s. The patronage of St. Odilio of Cluny extended this feast to other monasteries, first of his own Order, then to Benedictines and others, from where it spread to dioceses, including Rome. It was only in 1915 that the special privilege of three Masses was granted to all priests by Pope Benedict XV.

Halloween during Christian Times: The conversion of Celtic peoples to Christianity did not dampen their enthusiasm for the pre-Christian year-end custom of feasts, bonfires, and masks, essentially new year's eve costume parties. The proximity to the developing Christian feasts of All Saints and All Souls resulted in an attempt to move the celebration to the evening before All Souls, when children would go door to door receiving treats for a promise of prayer for the dead of the household. This attempt to associate the Celtic remembrance of the dead with the Christian memorial ultimately failed and the celebration remained a year-end custom (by the old Celtic calendar), though Halloween remains primarily a children's feast.

With the massive emigration of Irish in the last century the All Hallows Eve customs of costumes, jack-o-lanterns and trick or treating, were transported to North America. Scary costumes remain the historical norm for Halloween, though the advent of more sinister and violent times has encouraged many parents to take a gentler approach. Today many families, and even parishes, hold group celebrations, often with costumes of the saints, the poor souls or famous Catholics (such as the Pope, Mather Teresa or the like) and other elements which re-enforce the Christian side of Halloween's origins.

Call for Nominations: Deanery & Diocesan Pastoral Councils

Bishop Vincent Long OFM Conv is calling for nominations for Deanery Pastoral Councils and the Diocesan Pastoral Council.
