Gospel Reflection

The Parable of the Talents is part of the so-called 'Eschatological Sermons' (Chapters 24 and 25 of Matthew's Gospel) which consist of prophetic pronouncements and parables about the Second Coming of Christ. These accounts remind us to be always vigilant and prepared for Christ' unexpected return.

The Parable of the Talents is narrated in the Gospel for this last Sunday (33rd) of Ordinary Times (Year A). 'Ordinary' here, does not mean the 'simple routine' of life. But it means the orderliness of life with God which we should always aim and work for.

This parable is described by some biblical commentators as quite difficult. This is probably because of the unusual use of business words like 'invest, interest, trade, bankers and the like'. This parable is clearly not just about trading and business, not about making profit nor investing wealth and the like. It is about how we could use God's gifts prudently in dealing with others and doing our daily life activities.

The surprisingly favourable endorsement of the master to the first and the second servants as 'profit-takers' in the parable may add to its difficulty. There is no doubt that the parable challenges us to a deeper reflection in finding its meaning and lessons in our faith life. The master in the parable depicts God as generous and trustworthy God. He gives us gifts and rewards in abundance. He totally trusts us and takes risks on us and on how we could use his gifts wisely and productively.

The third servant did nothing except to hide his talent in the ground. He is then branded as a 'wicked and lazy slave' by the master.

Like the third servant, we are always faced with the danger to fall into complacency. This is like being trapped in a life of laxity with 'lacklustre and care-free attitude' that impedes and endangers our relationship with God and with each other.

Like the third servant, any inaction may also have been triggered by fear...fear of change, fear of responsibilities, fear of getting involved and even fear of God. As humans, we usually find ease, satisfaction and comfort to deal only with what are 'predictable, manageable and under-controlled' situations.

The Parable is about seeking enthusiastically and joyfully to relate to others. It teaches us to face life with courage and prudent decisions. It encourages us to use our talents, potentials and gifts and to multiply these to a hundred fold. By constantly using these gifts, we develop ourselves as loving and grateful persons. The parable also teaches us to be willing to dare, to take risks, to be passionate and committed to serve God and His Kingdom. These are essential parts of our faith life.

The last verse of the Gospel (v30) warns us, with extreme images highlighting urgency, about the dire consequences of inaction and complacency. Jesus does not intend to instil fear but He always invites us through the Gospel, the sacraments and the Church to remain faithful to God. He encourages us through the Holy Spirit to use our talents and gifts to be vigilant and prepared to meet Him when He comes in glory. NOW is the time to ...**Use it or lose it.**

The Diocese of Parramatta respects the will of the Australia people as expressed through the results of the same-sex marriage postal survey.

It now seems likely that civil marriage will be open to people of the same-sex and we respect that outcome.

The Catholic Church will continue to promote and practice the tenet of our faith that marriage is a lifelong union of a man and a woman, open to the possibility of children. The survey has confirmed that this is a position shared by millions of people in this country.

The focus is now on our parliament to ensure that the proper freedoms are legislated to guarantee that the many people who remain in favour of the traditional definition of marriage are free to speak, teach and act on this belief.

Gospel (long) Matthew 25:14-30

Because you have been faithful over a few things, enter into the joy of the Lord.

Jesus spoke this parable to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a man on his way abroad who summoned his servants and entrusted his property to them. To one he gave five talents, to another two, to a third one; each in proportion to his ability. Then he set out. The man who had received the five talents promptly went and traded with them and made five more. The man who had received two made two more in the same way. But the man who had received one went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money. Now a long time after, the master of those servants came back and went through his accounts with them. The man who had received the five talents came forward bringing five more. "Sir", he said "you entrusted me with five talents; here are five more that I have made." His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness." Next the man with the two talents came forward. "Sir," he said "you entrusted me with two talents; here are two more that I have made." His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness." Last came forward the man who had the one talent. "Sir," said he "I had heard you were a hard man, reaping where you have not sown and gathering where you have not scattered; so I was afraid, and I went off and hid your talent in the ground. Here it is; it was yours, you have it back." But his master answered him, "You wicked and lazy servant! So you knew that I reap where I have not sown and gather where I have not scattered? Well then, you should have deposited my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have recovered my capital with interest. So now, take the talent from him and give it to the man who has the five talents. For to everyone who has will be given more, and he will have more than enough; but from the man who has not, even what he has will be taken away. As for this good-for-nothing servant, throw him out into the dark, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth.""



Why we do what we do

THE FEAST OF CHRIST THE KING

Christ the King Sunday, the last Sunday in October (and Reformation Sunday) on the Extraordinary Form Calendar and on the and the final Sunday of the Liturgical year on the Ordinary Form calendar, is a feast day that focuses on the authority of Christ. While the problems our world faces today differ from the particular events that inspired Pope Pius XI to establish this feast in the 1920s, his message and call to honor Christ the King in a society that denies the authority of Our Lord is no less pertinent now than it was then.

History of the Feast

The solemnity is a newer feast in the Catholic Church; it was established by Pope Pius XI in 1925. The pontiff was witness to a turbulent time in the world's history. Secularism was on the rise and dangerous dictatorships were emerging in Europe and beyond. Christ had long been referred to as King, but Pope Pius and the Christian faithful saw the respect and reverence for Christ's authority waning in the midst of the unrest during the first part of the 20th century. In response, the feast was set with the intent to reaffirm and refocus faith and respect in the kingship of Jesus.

On the importance of the public world recognizing the kingly authority of Jesus, Pope Pius XI wrote:

"When once men recognize, both in private and in public life, that Christ is King, society will at last receive the great blessings of real liberty, well-ordered discipline, peace and harmony. Our Lord's regal office invests the human authority of princes and rulers with a religious significance; it ennobles the citizen's duty of obedience. It is for this reason that St. Paul, while bidding wives revere Christ in their husbands, and slaves respect Christ in their masters, warns them to give obedience to them not as men, but as the vicegerents of Christ; for it is not meet that men redeemed by Christ should serve their fellow-men. You are bought with a price; be not made the bond-slaves of men.'

If princes and magistrates duly elected are filled with the persuasion that they rule, not by their own right, but by the mandate and in the place of the Divine King, they will exercise their authority piously and wisely, and they will make laws and administer them, having in view the common good and also the human dignity of their subjects. The result will be a stable peace and tranquility, for there will be no longer any cause of discontent.

Men will see in their king or in their rulers men like themselves, perhaps unworthy or open to criticism, but they will not on that account refuse obedience if they see reflected in them the authority of Christ God and Man. Peace and harmony, too, will result; for with the spread and the universal extent of the kingdom of Christ men will become more and more conscious of the link that binds them together, and thus many conflicts will be either prevented entirely or at least their bitterness will be diminished."

As detailed at Churchyear.net, Pope Pius XI was hoping for these effects to occur:

1. That nations would see that the



Church has the right to freedom, and immunity from the state.

- 2. That leaders and nations would see that they are bound to give respect to Christ.
- 3. That the faithful would gain strength and courage from the celebration of the feast, as we are reminded that Christ must reign in our hearts, minds, wills, and bodies.

Christ the King in Immaculate Conception Basilica

The feast was initially fixed to the final day of October, the day before All Saints Day. Later, in 1969, Pope Paul VI moved the feast to the last Sunday before Advent, to emphasize the importance of the feast. This is fitting within the Church year. The liturgical year begins with Advent, the season of awaiting the coming of Christ, and now the year ends with celebrating the Kingship of Christ.

History of the Title "Christ the King"

While the feast is relatively new, the tradition of calling Christ "King" is not. Jesus is referred to as King throughout the New Testament:

To the King of ages, immortal, invisible, the only God, be bonor and glory for ever and ever. Amen – 1 Tim 1:17

Nathan'a-el answered him, "Rabbi, you are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!" – John 1:49 Now Jesus stood before the governor; and the governor asked him, "Are you the King of the Jews?" Jesus said, "You have said so." – Mt. 27:11

And this will be made manifest at the proper time by the blessed and only Sovereign, the King of kings and Lord of lords – 1 Tim 6:15 And they sing the song of Moses, the servant of God, and the song of the Lamb, saying, "Great and wonderful are thy deeds, O Lord God the Almighty! Just and true are thy ways, O King of the ages!" – Rev. 15:3

And from Jesus Christ the faithful witness, the first-born of the dead, and the ruler of kings on earth. To him who loves us and has freed us from our sins by his blood – Rev. 1:5

On his robe and on his thigh he has a name inscribed, King of kings and Lord of lords. – Rev. 19:16

Clearly "King" was one of the earliest titles given to the Son of God. The title does not refer to a status of an earthly king, which many of the Jews had been expecting – someone to overthrow the Roman rule and be earthly king of the Israel. Rather He came to be the spiritual king; His kingdom is in heaven, not confined to the earth alone. In respecting the name of Christ the King, and in celebrating the yearly feast, both citizens and leaders are to remain reverent and devoted to the higher authority of Christ.


