

Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time 31st July 2022



Welcome to the community of the Catholic Parish of St John 23rd Glenwood-Stanhope Gardens where the love of Christ is shining in so many ways.

There is a tension in maintaining things in balance. We cannot consume everything as soon as it comes to hand, and it is prudent to set things aside for the future, so we harvest in summer and autumn, or at any time of plenty, and store the produce so as to have something to eat during winter or other times of want. It also frees us from having to search for food daily. In my childhood memories the pantries and cupboards of the extended family were filled each year with preserved fruits and vegetables of all kinds. Today's perennially stocked supermarkets are our pantries, and so the habit of lardering has diminished or vanished. After cyclones have destroyed shops and closed supply lines people suddenly remember, too late, the benefit of stocking at least a few days worthy of emergency supplies. Today little is left in larders or cellars upon death, though the bank account may be full.

Several bird species, and more famously squirrels, cache nuts and seeds, but inevitably the day comes when they die and whatever was stored is lost to them. Is their caching folly, and vain wastage? It is true that the store may then be pilfered by another who thus gains easy pickings from the other's hard work. But some troves are never found, especially those that are buried. Was the time spent doing it in vain? From the perspective of the individual alone, yes, but it could not be known when the activity would become superfluous—and in the case of buried seeds, trees have benefited in having the next generation more widely propagated. The system requires the creative tension of prudent storage for future survival against the inevitable superfluity. It would be a gift indeed to know the hour of death so precisely as to be able to cease working at the right time and to live off one's goods to leave the world with a balance of zero. But that is a very selfish view.

The first reading's "Preacher" laments the system's inevitable "wastage"—and that may be the book's weakness; it seems to have the selfish preoccupation that is prominent in modern times. When society and cultures focus more on the family or community than the individual, what is worked for and stored continues for the benefit of the family or community after the death of the individual. In the gospel parable the focus is entirely on the wealthy man. But the given context for the parable is avarice, the disordered desire for goods beyond need, or purely for self-interest. This is not the same as the wise use of one's goods, which will appear later in the gospel to be read on Sundays 24C and 25C, indirectly in the parable of a division of a future inheritance (or the parable of "The Prodigal Son") and the parable misnamed as "The Rich Man and Lazarus", told in response to Pharisees mocking Jesus for his teaching on the use of wealth.

By coincidence, the little-used word for "avarice" in the gospel is also found in our second reading (Colossians 3:1-5, 9-11) translated as "greed", as Paul advises Christians in Colossae to put aside earthly qualities, "especially greed, which is the same thing as worshipping a false god". Just before that we hear "Let your hearts be on heavenly things" that a direct translation would read as "Consider (or ponder) things above (or on high)". When those two translations are considered together we may be reminded of the opening dialogue to the Eucharistic Prayer, "Lift up your hearts", though our Latin text's Sursum corda more literally reads "Hearts on high (or upward, or above)". The tone of this part of Paul's letter to the Colossians does indeed resonate with the impetus of the Eucharistic Prayer, the "Anaphora" or "Lifting up" of "Offering", which is most clearly spelled out in the dialogue and preface, culminating in the conscious joining of the song of the angels. What we express in the Eucharist and put before us as our model of right living is that selfless self-giving of Christ, the very quality missing from today's parable's rich man. This is true also for all who consider their material acquisitions to be their measure of wealth instead of treasuring the immaterial wealth that surpasses earth and the earthly.



Body Worship: Liturgical Movement and Gestures

Liturgy consists of more than words and music. Gesture, posture and movement are also important elements of ritual worship.

Five different whole-of-body positions are adopted at various times in the liturgy: standing, sitting, kneeling, walking and, occasionally, prostration.

Standing expresses joy, praise and thanksgiving and is a sign of respect and reverence. Hence we stand for the prayers of the Mass, for the general intercessions and for the reading of the gospel. In some parts of the world, the assembly stands throughout the Eucharistic Prayer.

Sitting is a posture of rest and openness and so is appropriate for listening to readings from scripture and the homily and for times of silent reflection.

Kneeling is a gesture of subservience, petition and piety. In the early Church, kneeling was forbidden on Sundays and feast days and during the Easter Season. It has most commonly been used as a posture for private prayer and as an expression of humility, penance and adoration. Kneeling as a posture of adoration before the Blessed Sacrament is an important part of the liturgical tradition of the Roman Rite.

It is customary for people to genuflect before taking their seats in the church as a sign of reverence for the real presence of Christ in the Blessed Sacrament reserved in the tabernacle. The gesture is not necessary if the Blessed Sacrament is reserved in a separate eucharist chapel.

Walking symbolises that we are a pilgrim people. At every Mass we walk in procession to receive communion. On Palm Sunday the community processes around the church carrying palm branches and singing 'Hosanna!' At the Easter Vigil we process into the darkened church following the new paschal candle and proclaiming Christ as our light.

Prostration, a gesture of total submission and vulnerability, involves lying full length on the floor. It is reserved for solemn moments in the liturgy. At the liturgy of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday the celebrants prostrate themselves before the altar in silence before the service begins. An ordinand lies prostrate during the singing of the litany of saints in the sacrament of Holy Orders.

Hands and arms are frequently used during worship. We make the sign of the cross with holy water on entering a church, trace small crosses on our forehead, mouth and heart when the gospel reading is announced, shake hands at the sign of peace, and receive the host and chalice in our hands at communion.

Celebrants use their hands in a variety of ways in the liturgical rites: for anointing with oil, sprinkling or pouring water, holding over the bread and wine at the consecration, and laying on heads. Arms are opened wide as a sign of welcome and inclusion when the assembly is addressed and stretched over them for a blessing. The classical orans (praying) position, which involves standing with both arms raised to the side and extended upwards, is assumed whenever the celebrant addresses prayer to God in the name of the assembly.

Liturgical body language unifies the assembly and communicates respect for the liturgy, the community, for God. Through our gestures we are totally involved – body, mind and spirit – in the act of worship.

ABOUT THE ICON



Our Lady of Perpetual Help (also known as Our Lady of Perpetual Succour) is a Roman Catholic title of the Blessed Virgin Mary associated with a 15th-century Byzantine icon with an alleged Marian apparition. The icon is believed to have originated from the Keras Kardiotissas Monastery and has been in Rome since 1499. Today it is permanently enshrined in the Church of Saint Alphonse of Liguori, where the official Novena to Our Mother of Perpetual Help text is prayed weekly.

Pope Pius IX granted a Pontifical decree of Canonical Coronation along with its present title on 5 May 1866. The Latin Patriarch of Constantinople, Cardinal Ruggero Luigi Emidio Antici Mattei executed the rite of coronation on 23 June 1867.

The Redemptorist Congregation of priests and brothers are the only religious order currently entrusted by the Holy See to protect and propagate a Marian religious work of art. In

the Eastern Orthodox Church iconography, the image is known as the "Virgin Theotokos of the Passion" due to the instruments of the Passion of Jesus Christ present on the image.

Novena devotions are held before June 27 every year. Under Pope Pius XII's Pontificate, the image was designated as the national Patroness of the Republic of Haiti and of Almoradí, in the Valencian Country, Spain.

Due to promotion by the Redemptorist Priests since 1865, the image has become very popular among Roman Catholics. Modern reproductions are oftentimes displayed in residential homes, commercial establishments, and public transportation. Pope John Paul II issued a decree to crown a namesake image for Poland on 16 June 1999.



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
