

Thirty First Sunday in Ordinary Time 30 October 2022



Welcome to the community of the Catholic Parish of St John 23rd Glenwood-Stanhope Gardens where the love of Christ is shining in so many ways.

Today's gospel (Luke 19:1-10) features not a fictitious tax collector in a parable but a real one, named Zacchaeus, who we are told is a wealthy man. Luke also tells us he was little. This is given as a reason for Zacchaeus' doing two things considered unseemly for a man of his social stature as he sought to see who Jesus was: he ran, and he climbed a tree. Preachers may often entertain various conjectured reasons as to why Jesus then invited himself to Zacchaeus' house: perhaps recognising a man wealthy enough to host him (and his followers) without being a burden; perhaps he divinely intuited an outcast who needed repatriation. But perhaps it was simply the curiosity of a wealthy man climbing a tree that caught his attention. Each is now interested to know more of the other, the grounds for true personal encounter. And like last Sunday's parable's tax collector, there is in this real one a humility, here displayed in his resorting to such a desperately unseemly measure. And like last Sunday's parable's Pharisee, the crowd here has contempt for the tax collector as they complain about Jesus' going to that sinner's house.

From Luke's narration it seems the crowd's objecting was obvious enough to motivate Zacchaeus to an apparent self-defence. If this is an accurate reading, then humility does not mean you may not also be appropriately self-assertive; being humble does not require being walked all over. Zacchaeus' twofold offer is of interest, and often misconstrued. The first part is unqualified; he will give half his wealth to the poor. The second part is qualified, but people often overlook the important "if". If he has cheated anyone, he offers to pay them back fourfold, an assertion more likely to come from one who believes he has not cheated. It may also indicate the realisation that if a wrong were done then not only the original sum should be restored but also recompense be offered for the hardship suffered in the meantime. But returning to the crowd, the fact that a crowd of a certain disposition towards Zacchaeus presumes him to be a sinner (and unjust) does not mean that he is.

This story brings to mind a literary scenario, and an historical one. In Victor Hugo's Les Misérables Jean Valjean becomes so mortified by his brutish theft of a boy's silver coin that he searches vainly for him in order to right the wrong, and later he would surreptitiously give every beggar a coin, often a silver one. In this he was in some way blending the two parts of Zacchaeus' promise. The other scenario is of the cases of the women on the island of Jersey during and after World War II. At what point in time does a foreign occupation become a permanent reality, and at what point is it acceptable to accommodate oneself to a new realty? Not all occupying German soldiers were bad, nor were they there of their own volition. The women who fraternised with any of them were not kindly treated by their own compatriots after the war, but at what stage would it have become acceptable, and when did it become acceptable for bakeries and bars, and shops and farms to do business with the occupying soldiers or German forces? Zacchaeus and others were caught in a similar situation and the presence of the Romans or their imperial legions could hardly be ignored. Zacchaeus did not find in Jesus the judging opprobrium of his own compatriots in Jericho; rather he is declared equally to be a "son of Abraham", and here too is the fulfilment of Zechariah's prophecy in Luke 1:68-79, for salvation has come to his house.



ALL SAINTS' & ALL SOULS' DAY

All Saints' Day is a solemn holy day of the Catholic Church celebrated annually on November 1. The day is dedicated to the saints of the Church, that is, all those who have attained heaven. It should not be confused with All Souls' Day, which is observed on November 2, and is dedicated to those who have died and not yet reached heaven.



Although millions, or even billions of people may already be saints, All Saints' Day observances tend to focus on known saints --that is those recognized in the canon of the saints by the Catholic Church.

All Saints' Day is also commemorated by members of the Eastern Orthodox Church as well as some protestant churches, such as Lutheran and Anglican churches.

Generally, All Saints' Day is a Catholic Holy Day of Obligation, meaning all Catholics are required to attend Mass on that day, unless they have an excellent excuse, such as serious illness.

Other countries have different rules according to their national bishop's conferences. The bishops of each conference have the authority to amend the rules surrounding the obligation of the day.

All Saints' Day was formally started by Pope Boniface IV, who consecrated the Pantheon at Rome to the Virgin Mary and all the Martyrs on May 13 in 609 AD. Boniface IV also established All Souls' Day, which follows All Saints.

The choice of the day may have been intended to co-opt the pagan holiday "Feast of the Lamures," a day which pagans used to placate the restless spirits of the dead.

The holy day was eventually established on November 1 by Pope Gregory III in the mid-eighth century as a day dedicated to the saints and their relics. The May 13 celebration was subsequently abandoned.

In Ireland, the Church celebrated All Saints' Day on April 20, to avoid associating the day with the traditional harvest festivals and pagan feasts associated with Samhain, celebrated at the same time.

Following the establishment of the Frankish Empire, and following the reign of Charlemagne, the holy day, which was already celebrated on November 1, became a holy day of obligation by decree of Pope Gregory IV and Louis the Pious, who was king over a portion of Charlemagne's former empire.

Following the Protestant Reformation, many Protestants retained the holy day, although they dismissed the need to pray for the dead. Instead, the day has been used to commemorate those who have recently died, usually in the past year, and to remember the examples of those who lived holy lives.

The Catholic practice however, celebrates all those who have entered heaven, including saints who are recognized by the Church and those who are not. Holy day customs vary around the world. In the United States, the day before is Halloween and is usually celebrated by dressing in costumes with themes of death commonly associated. Children go door-to-door in costume, trick-or-treating, that is soliciting candy from their neighbors. The holiday has lost much of its connection to its religious origins.

Although nearly everyone celebrates Halloween for the fun of the secular holiday, the following religious solemnity, is not widely practiced or acknowledged by most Americans unless they are Catholic.

In other countries, such as Portugal, Spain and Mexico, traditional practices include performance of the play, "Don Juan Tenorio" and offerings made to the dead. All Saints' Say occurs on the same day as the Mexican "Dide los Innocentes" a day dedicated to deceased children.

Across much of Europe, the day is commemorated with offerings of flowers left on the graves of the dead. In Eastern Europe, candles are lit on graves instead of offerings of flowers.

In some places, such as the Philippines, graves can be painted and repaired by family members. Many of these practices blur the distinction between All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day.



These celebrations often blur the distinction between All Saints' Day, which is properly dedicated to those who are in heaven, and All Souls' Day, on which prayers are offered for all those who have died, but have not yet reached heaven.

In Mexico, the Day of the Dead holy days extend from October 31 through November 2.

It is important to remember these basic facts:

- **†** All Saints' Day is on November 1, and it is a Holy Day of Obligation.
- **†** All Souls' Day in on November 2, and it is NOT a Holy Day of Obligation.

The Day of the Dead is a Mexican holiday that has spread in popularity into parts of the United States and across Latin America. It is celebrated from October 31 through November 2, to coincide with both the American tradition and the Catholic holy days. Those three days are dedicated to all of the dead.
