

Ordinary Time 6 November 2022



Welcome to the community of the Catholic Parish of St John 23rd Glenwood-Stanhope Gardens where the love of Christ is shining in so many ways.

Today's gospel (Luke 20:27-38) picks up over a chapter later than last Sunday's, so we have missed more references to the resolute march to Jerusalem, Jesus' warnings of his approaching death, his entry into the city (in which is found the last mention of the Pharisees) and the cleansing of the temple, and the consternation of the chief priests and leaders that provokes them to keep a watch on him. Thus we suddenly find ourselves in Jerusalem with the chief priests and leaders having replaced the Pharisees as opponents of Jesus, and just as the Pharisees did, they engage him in typically Jewish disputes over the Law—which, as in all philosophising, is a method of teasing out nuances of meaning. The gospels are often the earliest witnesses to some disputed points at that time.

The link to the first reading (2 Maccabees 7:1-2,9-14) is their shared phrase "there were seven brothers", and that the brothers die. The Maccabees excerpt is curiously abbreviated as we leap from the opening speech of the first brother to the last breath of the second, thence continuing until abruptly terminating with the final witness of the fourth. So having heard the testimony of three, and of the death of not entirely the same three, the final three of the seven are omitted entirely, possibly leaving attentive congregants feeling somehow riddled upon if not bemused. Perhaps the Lectionary's devisers drew inspiration from Scheherazade's legendary method of telling her 1001 stories to keep hearers hungering for the next instalment, but the Lectionary does not deliver it. On the other hand, perhaps we should be relieved in not having to hear all the gruesome details and are to attend solely to the terminating witness to the brothers' belief in the resurrection, the denial of which was a tenet of the Sadducees. Modern Christians often find it incomprehensible that some Israelites, even the priests, could have rejected, as do modern atheists, any notion of an afterlife and the immortality of the soul, but they did. There is, after all, nothing new under the sun.

The Sadducees' hypothetical case of the seven-times widowed yet still childless woman was used to challenge belief in any kind of afterlife, but it opens questions about the nature of marriage itself. Jesus' response locates marriage entirely within the earthly life (the only one the Sadducees accepted) and with a solely earthly purpose. How so? Because marriage exists as a social arrangement to do with procreation, and procreation has to do with the fact that we die: on earth people marry and have children because people die on earth; in heaven there is no dying, and so there is no begetting or birthing, and so there is no marrying in heaven. So, murderous so-called martyrs with expectations of endless virginal recreation are deluded dupes who would find heaven disappointing. On a different path, others seek to redefine marriage in an entirely novel manner, historically speaking, almost refusing to acknowledge that across all human societies, and in whatever manner they have contracted or honoured it, it has always been a socially regulated arrangement emerging from procreation. Other unions may be deserving of similar social regulation, but that does not make them the same.

In the second part of Jesus' response we find a typically Jewish style of arguing based in the form of a verb used in a Scripture passage. Hebrew verbs function differently from ours and allow peculiar shades of meaning, so many rabbinic discussions revolve around a text's use of a particular form. Referring generally to Exodus 3 Jesus draws on the form of the verb "to be" used in verse 14 to explain the name of God, and this is followed by the second instance of the description, "God of Abraham..." The form cannot be tied to the past, so that statement indicates also now and the future. His point is that, according to Scripture, Abraham and Isaac and Jacob are, but since they have died in this world they are alive in another way, alive to God.

The king of the world will receive us into life eternal at the resurrection.

There were seven brothers who were arrested with their mother. The king tried to force them to taste pig's flesh, which the Law forbids, by torturing them with whips and scourges. One of them, acting as spokesman for the others, said, 'What are you trying to find out from us? We are prepared to die rather than break the Law of our ancestors.'

With his last breath the second brother exclaimed, 'Inhuman fiend, you may discharge us from this present life, but the King of the world will raise us up, since it is for his laws that we die, to live again for ever.'

After him, they amused themselves with the third, who on being asked for his tongue promptly thrust it out and boldly held out his hands, with these honourable words, 'It was heaven that gave me these limbs; for the sake of his laws I disdain them; from him I hope to receive them again.' The king and his attendants were astounded at the young man's courage and his utter indifference to suffering.

When this one was dead they subjected the fourth to the same savage torture. When he neared his end he cried, 'Ours is the better choice, to meet death at men's hands, yet relying on God's promise that we shall be raised up by him; whereas for you there can be no resurrection, no new life.'


Jesus replied, 'The children of this world take wives and husbands, but those who are judged worthy of a place in the other world and in the resurrection from the dead do not marry because they can no longer die, for they are the same as the angels, and being children of the resurrection they are sons of God. And Moses himself implies that the dead rise again, in the passage about the bush where he calls the Lord the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob. Now he is God, not of the dead, but of the living; for to him all men are in fact alive.'

A well-known word that is close in meaning to 'liturgy' is the word 'worship'. But while worship can be done privately, 'liturgy' is always a public, group activity.

Like many other 'churchy' words, 'liturgy' comes from the language used by the early church in its worship and writings – Greek. The word liturgy is derived from leitourgia which was used to refer to any public work or function exercised by the people as a whole. The people who do the work of liturgy are the people of God, all baptised.

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
A working definition of 'liturgy' that is helpful is 'The official, public worship of the Church'.

Some of the best-known forms of liturgy in the Roman Catholic Church are:

- ◆ Mass (or Eucharist) (In the celebration of Eucharist, the bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Christ.)
- ◆ Baptism (Because water is essential to all life, the water of baptism symbolises the life-giving grace that sustains those who have become children of God.)
- ◆ Confirmation (Confirmation is about renewing one's baptismal promises before receiving communion for the first time.)
- Marriage (The mutual love of man and woman becomes an image of the absolute and unfailing love with which God loves humanity.)
- ◆ Funerals (At a Catholic funeral the community gathers to say farewell to the person who has died and entrust that person to God's loving care.)
- ◆ Penance (or Confession) (Through this process, a person is reconciled with the Church and continues to live as a disciple of Jesus Christ.)

In the Catholic Church, we worship using forms and patterns of worship that have developed during the Church's 2000-year history. Every day of the year falls into a particular place into the church's liturgical calendar, and certain scripture readings and prayers are assigned for use at Mass each day. The celebration of the rites of Baptism, Marriage, Funerals and so on are set out in the Church's ritual of books.

Liturgy is always an action, something we do. It is a public action, a ritual action, and a symbolic action. It is the proclamation of the word that God speaks to us; it is in the breaking of the bread that we recognise Christ. We participate in the action of the liturgy by responding, singing, listening and joining the gestures.



Liturgical seasons

The worship of the Catholic Church follows a calendar that is based on a cycle of liturgical seasons plus saints' days celebrated throughout the year.

Just as we mark our lives by anniversaries, the Church celebrates the mysteries of Christ's life in a recurrent pattern. Within the cycle of a year the Church remembers and celebrates Christ's conception, birth, death, resurrection and sending of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost.

During the course of the year we bring to mind past events and people to keep the mystery of faith alive today and we look forward to Christ's return in glory at the end of time. As pilgrim people, we are constantly nourished by the story of Jesus and guided by the saints, our ancestors in the faith, living witness of God's unchanging love.

In some respects the church's way of keeping time conflicts with the secular calendar. The new liturgical year begins on the first Sunday of Advent at the end of November, just as many other things like the academic year are coming to an end.

The seasons of the liturgical year are:

- ◆ Advent a period covering the 4 Sundays before Christmas during which we prepare to celebrate Christ's birth and anticipate his coming again at the end of time. The liturgical colour for Advent is violet.
- Christmas the season of Christmas celebrates Christ's birth and early manifestations. It runs from 25th December to until the feast of the Baptism of the Lord on the Sunday after 6th January. The liturgical colour for the Christmas season is white.
- ◆ Lent the 6-week time of preparation for the celebration of Easter. It begins on Ash Wednesday and finishes on the evening of Holy Thursday. The liturgical colour for Lent is violet.
- ◆ Easter the heart of the liturgical year is the Easter Triduum (three days) celebrated from the evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday to Easter Sunday evening. The Easter Vigil is the high-point of the celebration. The joyful celebration of Christ's resurrection continues for the 50-day Easter season from Easter Sunday to Pentecost. The liturgical colour for Easter is white.
- Apart from these seasons, there are 33 or 34 weeks of the year that do not celebrate a particular aspect of the mystery of Christ but are devoted to the mystery of Christ in all its aspects. This period of the Church calendar is called Ordinary Time because the weeks are numbered in order. The liturgical colour for Ordinary Time is green.
