Welcome to the community of the Catholic Parish of St John 23rd Glenwood-Stanhope Gardens where the love of Christ is shining in so many ways.

Each year this Sunday's first reading is an episode in Abraham's life (Gen 12:1-4, excerpts from 22:1-19 and 15:5-18 in years A, B, C respectively), and the gospel is of the transfiguration. This use of the account of the transfiguration became important in late antiquity as part of the program of preparation of catechumens for baptism at Easter, but why does our Lectionary persistently juxtapose it with Abraham? A closer look at the given forms of the Abraham stories reveals a common thread-God's promise to make Abraham a great nation (year A), his descendants as numerous as the stars or grains of sand (B), and his descendants to number as the stars (C). In two we find that all tribes (A) or nations (B) of the earth shall bless themselves by Abraham (A) or by his descendants (B). The juxtaposition is oriented to presenting Jesus as the fulfilment not only of the Law (Moses) and the Prophets (Elijah) but as the surprising fulfillment of the promises to Abraham who now has in Jesus, by faith, descendants from all nations.

By a linguistic oddity today's Abraham story (Gen 22:1-2,9-13,15-18) may be called The Sacrifice of Abraham, as we have it in the First Eucharistic Prayer, or The Sacrifice of Isaac, as it often is in art, but the Jewish tradition has it is The Binding of Isaac. It is an unsettling story, depending on how it is interpreted, since it indicates child-sacrifice. It thus becomes fodder for atheist critics who read it literally in the worst of fundamentalist approaches to Scripture. These Genesis stories are not for those given to reading Scripture with absolute certainty, nor from the limitations of any particular translation-all translations miss something; there are simply too many greys in the redaction layers across the oral and written traditions for any claim to certainty. Thus, for example, v.2 may be read "Take now your son, the only one whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah, and offer/raise/exalt ['alah] him there as an offering ['olah] on one of the mountains I tell you.' At least one rabbinic tradition notes that Abraham is told to offer/exalt Isaac not sacrifice/slaughter [zava] him. In others, Isaac is presented as active, not passive, and is willing to be offered.

There are too many such layers to explore here, but we should note the storyline's characters, which in this genre may even be inanimate objects. In the full story, which may be read at the Easter Vigil, the characters are, in order of appearance: God, Abraham the father, Isaac the son, the mountain, the ass and two servants, wood, the altar, the unmentioned fetters, the knife, an angel, and the ram. Today's short form omits Isaac carrying the wood up the mountain and his being bound, the factors so important to ancient Christian teaching which held the mountain to prefigure Calvary; Isaac the son, Jesus the Son; the wood, the Cross; the binding fetters, the fixing nails. These factors are important for the reading at the Easter Vigil with its connection to the crucifixion, but their omission today indicates another concern here. The gospel account's characters are Jesus, three disciples, the mountain, his clothes, brightness, Elijah, Moses, cloud and shadow, and the voice. The mountain links to today's Abraham story. By tradition Abraham's mountain is identified with Jerusalem's Temple Mount, but the thematic links to the crucifixion allow an association with nearby Calvary. Common to what unfolds on each height is theophany. The two stories have other links that the above notes should help



identify. First, Isaac the son is the beloved of his father, and the transfiguration's voice affirms that Jesus is the beloved Son. Second, in a contrast, Abraham is told to offer/exalt his son, but Jesus is indeed transfigured (glorified, exalted). [The overlapping nuances of verbs offer, glorify, exalt, raise, and lift up are too extensive to cover here, but compare 2 Cor 3:18, one of only four instances of the verb transfigure (metamorphoo) in the New Testament, the other two being Matthew 17:2 and Romans 12:2; see also the reflection for the Fifth Sunday of Lent B.] Thus the offering that obedient Abraham assented to but could not complete was done by God the Father, and what the willing Isaac could not achieve is accomplished in Jesus, raised or exalted on the cross and raised to life, in whom peoples of all nations are blessed.





GOOD TO KNOW

10 Things You Need to Know About Jesus' Transfiguration

What happened at the mysterious event known as the Transfiguration? What did it mean?

Here are 10 things you need to know.

1. What does the word "transfiguration" mean?

The word "transfiguration" comes from the Latin roots trans-("across") and figura ("form, shape"). It thus signifies a change of form or appearance.

This is what happened to Jesus in the event known as the Transfiguration: His appearance changed and became glorious.

Before looking at the Transfiguration itself, it's important that we look at what happened immediately before it in Luke's Gospel.

2. What happened right before the Transfiguration?

In Luke 9:27, at the end of a speech to the 12 apostles, Jesus adds, enigmatically:

There are some standing here who will not taste death before they see the kingdom of God.

This has often been taken as a prophecy that the end of the world would occur before the first generation of Christians died out.

The phrase "kingdom of God" can also refer to other things, though, including the Church — the outward expression of God's invisible kingdom.

The kingdom is embodied in Christ himself and thus might be "seen" if Christ were to manifest it in an unusual way, even in his own earthly life.

3. Did such a manifestation occur?

Yes, and it is the very next thing that Luke relates: the Transfiguration.

Pope Benedict states that it has been ...

... convincingly argued that the placing of this saying immediately before the Transfiguration clearly relates it to this event.

Some—that is to say, the three disciples who accompany Jesus up the mountain—are promised that they will personally witness the coming of the Kingdom of God 'in power.'

On the mountain the three of them see the glory of God's Kingdom shining out of Jesus. On the mountain they are overshadowed by God's holy cloud. On the mountain—in the conversation of the transfigured Jesus with the Law and the Prophets—they realize that the true Feast of Tabernacles has come. On the mountain they learn that Jesus himself is the living Torah, the complete Word of God. On the mountain they see the 'power' (dynamis) of the Kingdom that is coming in Christ (Jesus of Nazareth, vol. 1, p. 317).

We thus may have the key to understanding Jesus' mysterious statement just before the Transfiguration. He wasn't talking about the end of the world. He was talking about this.

In fact, Luke notes that the Transfiguration took place "about eight days after these sayings," thus stressing its proximity to them and suggesting that it was the fulfillment of this saying, concerning the fact that some of them would see the kingdom of God. Mark gives a different number of days, saying it was "after six days" (Mark 9:2), but these both approximate a week.

4. Who witnessed the Transfiguration?

The three who are privileged to witness the event are Peter, James and John, the three core disciples. (Andrew was not there or not included.)

The fact that Jesus only allowed three of his disciples to witness the event may have sparked the discussion which swiftly ensued about which of the disciples was the greatest (Luke 9:46).

5. Where did the Transfiguration take place?

Luke states that Jesus took the three "on the mountain to pray." This mountain is often thought to be Mount Tabor in Israel, but none of the gospels identify it precisely.

6. Why did the Transfiguration take place?

The Catechism explains it this way:

Christ's Transfiguration aims at strengthening the apostles' faith in anticipation of his Passion: the ascent onto the 'high mountain' prepares for the ascent to Calvary.

Christ, Head of the Church, manifests what his Body contains and radiates in the sacraments: 'the hope of glory' [CCC 568].

7. What does Luke (in particular) tell us about this event?

Luke mentions several details about the event that the other evangelists do not:

- He notes that this happened while Jesus was praying.
- He mentions that Peter and his companions "were heavy with sleep, and when they wakened they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him."
- He mentions that Peter made his suggestion to put up booths as Moses and Elijah were departing.

8. Why do Moses and Elijah appear on the mountain?

Moses and Elijah represent the two principal components of the Old Testament: the Law and the Prophets.

The fact that these two figures "spoke of his departure, which he was to accomplish at Jerusalem" illustrates that the Law and the Prophets point forward to the Messiah and his sufferings.

This foreshadows Jesus' own explanation, on the road to Emmaus, of the Scriptures pointing to himself (cf. Luke 24:27, 32).

9. Why was Peter's suggestion misguided?

The fact that Peter's suggestion occurs when Moses and Elijah are preparing to depart reveals a desire to prolong the experience of glory. This means Peter is focusing on the wrong thing.

The experience of the Transfiguration is meant to point forward to the sufferings Jesus is about to experience. It is meant to strengthen the disciples faith, revealing to them in a powerful way the divine hand that is at work in the events Jesus will undergo. This is why Moses and Elijah have been speaking "about his departure, which he was to accomplish at Jerusalem."

Peter misses the point and wants to stay on the mountain, contrary to the message the two heavenly visitors have been expounding.

As a seeming rebuke of this, a theophany occurs: "A cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were afraid as they entered the cloud. And a voice came out of the cloud, saying, "This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!""

10. What can we learn from this event?

The Transfiguration was a special event in which God allowed certain apostles to have a privileged spiritual experience that was meant to strengthen their faith for the challenges they would later endure. But it was only a temporary event. It was not meant to be permanent.

In the same way, at certain times in this life, God may give certain members of the faithful (not all of the faithful, all the time), special experiences of his grace that strengthen their faith.

We should welcome these experiences for the graces they are, but we should not expect them to continue indefinitely, nor should we be afraid or resentful when they cease.

They may have been meant only as momentary glimpses of the joy of heaven to sustain us as we face the challenges of this life, to help strengthen us on the road that will — ultimately — bring us into the infinite and endless joy of heaven.
