Welcome to the community of the Catholic Parish of St John 23rd Glenwood-Stanhope Gardens where the love of Christ is shining in so many ways.

As with Good Friday, this morning's liturgy has fixed readings each year, but an alternative second reading is available. Peter's speech in the first reading (Acts 10:34,37-43) describes the Church's foundation in the witness of the apostles and others to the resurrection of Christ crucified, and its mission to proclaim forgiveness of sins through him. This expression "forgiveness of sin", proclaimed in the institution narrative at Mass, should not be too greatly restricted to a purely spiritual meaning since its Aramaic form also translates as "remission of debt/penalty". As the mystery of the Incarnation itself indicates, there is a worldly engagement in this mission that is not restricted to the purely spiritual realm of sin—as if that does not have some effect in the world. The Exodus story, so crucial to Jewish and Christian interpretations of the Passover, should remind us that salvation history includes freedom from worldly ills, just as the people were rescued from worldly oppression and slavery in Egypt. There is no clear division that permits the relegation of the Church's activity to the purely private arena of the heart and mind and soul; there is no clear division between the secular and the sacred. Rather, as with the Incarnation, the one is manifested in the other, the one is touched through the other. Paul appears to contradict this, but that is a misreading. Both options for the second reading have been misused by people, each ripped from context and at times enshrined as if they were absolute rules. Whether the Eucharist is celebrated with leavened or unleavened bread, we are to be on guard for the contamination of sins that affects life in this world, here and now. And the thoughts of heavenly things must guide what we do now, that God's will be done on earth as in heaven.

The four gospels differ in their lists of who went to the tomb on the Sunday morning, but in varying ways all include Mary of Magdala – an enigmatic character who appears in the gospels only at the crucifixion and the empty tomb, except by Luke who names her among the women who provided for Jesus and his disciples during the Galilea ministry (Luke 8:2-3). Luke also added that seven demons had gone out of her, and conflation of that with other episodes and the later confusion of the gospels' many Marys led Western imaginations to recast her as a prostitute or woman of ill-repute – which cannot be sustained by the gospels themselves.

Today's gospel (John 20:1-9) is John's version of the first events on the Sunday morning in which Mary of Magdala is first to learn that the body of Jesus has gone, but John at first omits any detail of her seeing the empty space; it is merely implied in her report "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb." John also omits direct reference to others being present, but they may be implied in her saying "we do not know where they have put him." This allows John to emphasise Mary via a repetition typical of his peculiar style, so in the next section, 20:11-18 (which is read on Tuesday morning), she does look into the tomb and she sees the place where the body had been, but, with no reference to the binding cloths we are told she sees two angels. The already cited parts of her report are then repeated, with the Lord becoming my Lord and we becoming I. Then on encountering Jesus incognito, when she sees him yet sees him not, these repeat again, they becoming both you in "where you have put him" and I in "I will take him". Recognition comes to here only when he calls her by name; although she had seen the tomb empty she did not yet believe, but she believes now because she heard him whom she then saw. This progress in John slowly intensifies the encounter, making it more truly personal. It ends with Mary being the first to announce the resurrection when what she says to the disciples changes from "They have taken him... we know not where they put him" to "I have seen the Lord." This Mary is addressed today in the peculiar hymn called a Sequence that is sung before the gospel. In it she testifies that she has seen the risen Lord, leading to our response that we too know "Christ is truly risen form the dead."

In the meantime, that is, between the two reports about Mary of Magdala, Peter is first to enter the tomb to verify it is empty, and he sees the abandoned cloths, but he is closely accompanied by the Beloved Disciple who observes that someone had taken the trouble to roll up the headcover by itself; he saw and believed—or perhaps that should be reinterpreted: he did not see, that is, he saw the body of Jesus was not there, and he believed. Thus John (and also Luke) show us Mary of Magdala and Peter at that initial moment of incomprehension between seeing and understanding, when the mind cannot reconcile the contradictions between what it sees and what it already knows. Mary is led to knowledge, but Peter's status is left unclear. Between them is the Beloved Disciple who simply sees and believes; in him the threads of seeing and believing that run through the gospel are drawn together. His disposition finds a counterpoint later in the day (read next Sunday) in Thomas who in not seeing does not believe, and only on seeing the risen body does he believe, whence Jesus says "Since you have seen me you have believed; blessed are they who saw not and believed." The whole story is charged with that almost playful use of repetitions and reversals typical of John: first, disciples enter the tomb with its door already opened, and beholding its emptiness believe; then, Jesus enters the room with its door still closed, and beholding his presence the disciples believe.

John gives a nuanced range of reactions among the disciples, including Mary of Magdala, who do not attain the same faith response to the resurrection, yet each does come to believe and all are witnesses to the resurrection. Peter's speech in the first reading (Acts 10:34,37-43) describes the Church's foundation in these witnesses and its mission to proclaim Christ to others that they too may come to believe in him and "have their sins forgiven through his name."

First Reading

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles 10:34, 37-43

We have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead.

Peter addressed Cornelius and his household: You must have heard about the recent happenings in Judaea; about Jesus of Nazareth and how he began in Galilee, after John had been preaching baptism. God had anointed him with the Holy Spirit and with power, and because God was with him, Jesus went about doing good and curing all who had fallen into the power of the devil.' Gospel

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John 20:1-9

The teaching of scripture is that he must rise from the dead.

It was very early on the first day of the week and still dark, when Mary of Magdala came to the tomb. She saw that the stone had been moved away from the tomb and came running to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one Jesus loved. 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb' she said 'and we don't know where they have put him.'

So Peter set out with the other disciple to go to the tomb. They ran together, but the other disciple, running faster than Peter, reached the tomb first; he bent down and saw the linen cloths lying on the ground, but did not go in. Simon Peter who was following now came up, went right into the tomb, saw the linen cloths on the ground, and also the cloth that had been over his head; this was not with the linen cloths but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple who had reached the tomb first also went in; he saw and he believed. Till this moment they had failed to understand the teaching of scripture, that he must rise from the dead.

What is Divine Mercy?

Divine Mercy, in General

Divine Mercy gets to the heart of Sacred Scripture. In fact, as the Catechism of the Catholic Church says, "The Gospel is the revelation in Jesus Christ of God's mercy to sinners" (1849). Right there: That summarizes it. Divine Mercy is the Gospel. It's the good news. And so, it gets to the very center of our faith. Moreover, in the words of Pope Benedict XVI, "Divine Mercy is not a secondary devotion, but an integral dimension of Christian faith and prayer." Benedict even goes so far as to say, "[M]ercy is the central nucleus of the Gospel message."

Okay, so what is Divine Mercy? What is this thing that gets to the heart of Sacred Scripture and to the very center of our faith? To begin, mercy is "love's second name," as John Paul II said. It's a particular kind of love, a particular mode of love when it encounters suffering, poverty, brokenness, and sin. Divine Mercy is when God's love meets us and helps us in the midst of our suffering and sin. In fact, because this side of eternity we're all sinners and because suffering is our lot in life, God's love for us here always takes the form of mercy. It's always the Lord stepping out in compassion to help us poor, weak, and broken sinners. From our perspective, then, every good we receive is an expression Divine Mercy.

The Message of Divine Mercy

The message of Divine Mercy is something that's most associated with a Polish nun who died in 1938, about a year before the start of World War II. She's known today as St. Maria Faustina Kowalska. Saint Faustina was a mystic. In other words, she received extraordinary experiences of the Lord Jesus in prayer. In fact, Jesus appeared to her and even spoke with her.

Of course, Jesus didn't reveal some new Gospel when he appeared to St. Faustina. He already revealed everything He needed to say 2,000 years ago to the Apostles and through Sacred Scripture. So, why did He do it? Why did He appear to Faustina? Actually, why does He appear to any mystic for that matter?

God sometimes appears to mystics because He has a prophetic message for a particular time in history, and He uses particular men and women to share His message. Sometimes it's to remind us of something that's been forgotten. Sometimes it's a warning. At other times, it's a message of comfort. Or it may simply be a call to conversion. Whatever it is, it doesn't change the Bible. Rather, it brings us back to it at a certain time in history.

Okay, so what's the particular and important message that God wants to give to us in our modern time through St. Faustina? Simple. He wants to remind us of the heart of Sacred Scripture, namely, His mercy for us sinners. In fact, He's saying to us sinners, "Now is the time of mercy. Now is a time of extraordinary mercy! Now is a time when I want give especially great graces to the human race. I want to pour out My mercy in a big way."

Why would God say this? Why would He want to give such great graces in our time? Blessed John Paul II explained it best. First, he pointed out something we all know: namely, that there are all kinds of blessings in our contemporary society. For instance, modern technology has done so much to make life easier for us. Just think of e-mail, cell phones, smartphones, and air-conditioning. All these things are blessings. Yet, in the midst of these blessings and in some ways because of the very same advances in technology that brought them, John Paul would say that evil has a reach and power in our day like never before. Indeed, our time, sadly, is marked by unprecedented evil. Despite this, John Paul would also say, "Be not afraid." Why should we not be afraid? Because of what St. Paul writes in Romans, "Where sin increased, grace abounded all the more" (5:20). In other words, God is not outdone by evil. So, in a time of great evil, God wants to give even greater graces, and in our time, the graces are huge, precisely because there's so much sin.

What is the Divine Mercy Chaplet?

The Origin of the Chaplet

In the 1930s, Jesus appeared to St. Faustina Kowalska, a humble and kind Polish nun, and revealed to her the depths of His mercy. St. Faustina entered the Congregation of the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy in 1925, but she passed away just thirteen years later from tuberculosis in 1938. Throughout her life of holiness, she continually received revelations from Jesus and diligently wrote down what He told her in her diary. St. Faustina was canonized by St. (Pope) John Paul II on April 30, 2000.

In 1935, an angel appeared to St. Faustina, and she heard the call to pray for mercy. The next day, Christ appeared and urged her to pray the Chaplet herself and with others at the hour of death. She wrote down this revelation in her diary:

"Encourage souls to say the Chaplet which I have given you. Whoever will recite it will receive great mercy at the hour of death. When they say this Chaplet in the presence of the dying, I will stand between My Father and the dying person, not as the just Judge but as the Merciful Savior. Priests will recommend it to sinners as their last hope of salvation. Even if there were a sinner most hardened, if he were to recite this Chaplet only once, he would receive grace from My infinite mercy. I desire to grant unimaginable graces to those souls who trust in My mercy. Through the Chaplet you will obtain everything, if what you ask for is compatible with My will."

Praying the Divine Mercy Chaplet

The Divine Mercy Chaplet can be prayed with traditional Rosary beads, though to do so isn't necessary. The Chaplet only takes a few minutes, and thousands of Catholics around the world pray it every day to ask for God's mercy.

Why do we pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet?

We pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet for mercy — in our own lives and in our neighbors, too. And we also pray to remind ourselves that we must rely on God; we must recognize our weakness and replace our anxieties and worries with abounding trust in God. We pray so that we might honestly live out the words "Jesus, I trust in You."

"Those who sincerely say Jesus, I trust in You' will find comfort in all their anxieties and fears ... There is nothing more man needs than Divine Mercy—that love which is benevolent, which is compassionate, which raises man above his weakness to the infinite heights to the holiness of God."

When to pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet?

You can pray the Chaplet at any time, but here are three times that are especially impactful when praying for God's mercy:

After Mass

The Divine Mercy is an intercessory prayer that extends the offering of the Eucharist, so it is especially appropriate to use it after receiving Holy Communion at Mass.

Before the Feast of Mercy

The Chaplet may be prayed at any time, but our Lord specifically told St. Faustina to recite it as a novena during the nine days before the Feast of Mercy (the first Sunday after Easter). He then added: "By this Novena, [of Chaplets] I will grant every possible grace to souls." (St. Faustina's Diary, 796)

At 3:00 p.m.

3:00 p.m. is known as the "hour of great mercy" in remembrance of Christ's death on the cross at 3:00 p.m. on Good Friday. Similarly, people often pray the Stations of the Cross at this time.
