In the spirit of reconciliation, we acknowledge the traditional custodians of the lands in which the Catholic Parish of St John XXIII and the Diocese of Parramatta sits, the land of the Darug and Gundungurra people. We would like to pay our respects to the Aboriginal Elders past, present and future for they hold the traditions, memories and wisdom of Mother Earth on which we place our feet upon today.

Gospel Reflection

Today's gospel (Luke 12:32-48) extends last Sunday's theme of treasuring heavenly above earthly things in a different direction as it turns to readiness. But the text is somewhat disjointed as variously related elements are grouped together. The shorter form (Luke 12:35-40) retains the awkwardness of a sudden change of focus as it is the householder who becomes the one who must be vigilant for the unexpected and improper burglary, rather than the servants who await an expected return. We have a clumsy merger of two parables of vigilance, but, from whichever perspective, the point is the same: be vigilant. However, the shorter form omits the three opening verses (12:32-34) with the memorable saying, "where your treasure is, there will your heart be also". This saying not only connects us back to last Sunday's reflection but today is its sole occurrence in the Sunday Lectionary, and thus it is proclaimed only once every three years. In general, shorter forms of readings should be used only in genuine need. The emphasis in the merged parables in this section is entirely on vigilance, whereas the longer form (12:32-48) turns to the qualities of the first parable's steward, who is entrusted with the running of the household in the master's absence.

The development on personal qualities comes after Peter asks to know for whom the parable is meant, though it takes some time before his question is actually answered. What the master expects a good steward to be is one who uses the authority entrusted to him not for his own benefit but to care for those in the household under his supervision. Any steward who has contempt for the other servants and mistreats them, and consumes the master's goods for his own pleasure, invalidates his commission and is unfit for the job, but, what is more, he stands opposed to the master. The need for vigilance against such false stewards has always been with the Church. Laws were needed once to try to prevent aristocrats from appointing their own children, especially younger and illegitimate sons, to church positions, whence they might treat diocese and parishes as their personal fiefdoms. This type of corruption at times reached even the highest echelons as not a few popes were utterly contemptible in their behaviour. But there have been other less obvious forms of this lack of care for those entrusted to them. The lack of care for those abused by clerics and other leaders reveals a

9.15am 11.15am (School Mass) 7.00pm lamentable misunderstanding of the steward's, or shepherd's, commission. Some have treasured more highly the hierarchy's earthly esteem than the care of the master's servants. When Peter's question is answered, it is with a "both and": it is intended both "for us" (the apostles) and for everyone, but those in the first group have more expected of them.

Readiness is part of the first reading too, though only by recalling its point of reference, the night of the first Passover: in Exodus 12:11 the people were told to eat the Passover standing, "with a girdle round your waist" ("your loins girded" in the NRSV). The same phrase in the Septuagint is used in Luke 12:35, but now translated as "dressed for action" (also in the NRSV). This opens another interpretive aspect, for this vigilance is focused not on someone's return, but on a coming saving act. When we hear the gospel's call to readiness for the master's return, what do we think of if not when Christ "will come (again in glory) to judge the living and the dead"? And yet this teaching is given on the way to the cross. This is part of the paradox of the genre of the gospels, for they relate not merely past events and episodes of teaching, but comment on the post-resurrection community. Thus today's gospel of collected teachings was both a preparing of the first disciples for what was to come-that is, of both Christ's shocking arrest (for the defence against which the disciples were ill-prepared) and the wondrous saving work of the death and resurrection-and a reminder to us now of his coming again. The vigilance required is for all manifestations of God's saving work in the here and now, as well as in the distant future.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'There is no need to be afraid, little flock, for it has pleased your Father to give you the kingdom.

'Sell your possessions and give alms. Get yourselves purses that do not wear out, treasure that will not fail you, in heaven where no thief can reach it and no moth destroy it. For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.

'See that you are dressed for action and have your lamps lit. Be like men waiting for their master to return from the wedding feast, ready to open the door as soon as he comes and knocks. Happy those servants whom the master finds awake when he comes. I tell you solemnly, he will put on an apron, sit them down at table and wait on them. It may be in the second watch he comes, or in the third, but happy those servants if he finds them ready. You may be quite sure of this, that if the householder had known at what hour the burglar would come, he would not have let anyone break through the wall of his house. You too must stand ready, because the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect.'

Peter said, 'Lord, do you mean this parable for us, or for everyone?' The Lord replied, 'What sort of steward, then, is faithful and wise enough for the master to place him over his household to give them their allowance of food at the proper time? Happy that servant if his master's arrival finds him at this employment. I tell you truly, he will place him over everything he owns. But as for the servant who says to himself, "My master is taking his time coming", and sets about beating the menservants and the maids, and eating and drinking and getting drunk, his master will come on a day he does not expect and at an hour he does not know. The master will cut him off and send him to the same fate as the unfaithful.

'The servant who knows what his master wants, but has not even started to carry out those wishes, will receive very many strokes of the lash. The one who did not know, but deserves to be beaten for what he has done, will receive fewer strokes. When a man has had a great deal given him, a great deal will be demanded of him; when a man has had a great deal given him on trust, even more will be expected of him.'





Good to Know

ABOUT FORGIVENESS

What does the Catholic Church teach about forgiveness?

The Church draws its teachings on forgiveness from Jesus, who spoke frequently about forgiveness in a religious culture that punished sin heavily.

It is easy to know what Jesus taught about forgiveness because his followers asked Him explicitly about it. Here is His exchange with His disciple Peter in Matthew's gospel.

"Lord, how often shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? As many as seven times?" Jesus said to him, "I do not say to you seven times, but seventy times seven." Matthew 18:21-22

What does Jesus mean by this? Most understand Jesus to be telling Peter to forgive his brother an unlimited number of times. This is, of course, a difficult teaching and a real test of our human capacity to love others.

Jesus goes on to cement this teaching in the most famous Christian prayer, the Our Father, which includes these lines:

"And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us". Matthew 6:12

Here, Jesus makes a connection between God the Father's mercy and forgiveness to us and how this is an example of how we should love those who sin against us. Catholics experience God's forgiveness and mercy directly and powerfully through the sacrament of confession.

This extraordinary depth of forgiveness characterises Jesus' ministry. Many stories feature this, but perhaps the most famous is the story of the woman caught in adultery (meaning that she has had an affair) who will be stoned as a punishment for this sin.

Jesus says to the crowd:

"Let him who is without sin among you be the first to throw a stone at her." John 8:7

When no one does, He turns to the woman and says:

"Has no one condemned you? ... Neither do I condemn you; go and do not sin again." John 8:10-11

Here we can see clearly that Jesus does not dismiss sin, telling her directly to not sin again, but also inspiring those who would punish her to be forgiving.

This hard teaching of forgiveness reaches its most difficult and most powerful form in Jesus' teaching to love even your enemy.

"You have heard that it was said, 'You shall love your neighbour and hate your enemy.' But I say you, Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you". Matthew 5:43-48

Whilst this is very challenging, it has also been the foundation for great social change and was a great inspiration for Martin Luther King Jr.'s peaceful campaign for the Civil Rights of black Americans.

'This command is an absolute necessity for the survival of our civilization. Yes, it is love that will save our world and our civilization, love even for enemies.' Martin Luther King Jr.

5 Myths About Forgiveness: A Catholic Perspective

As Catholics, we understand that there is a Gospel call toward forgiveness - yet forgiveness is never an obligation, but a creative act of possibility and grace. This is especially important on a restorative justice journey.

Together, we can work to dispel common myths about forgiveness and open up new possibilities for reconciliation and healing.

Myth #1: Forgiveness means forgetting the past.

As theologian Fr. Robert Schreiter writes, "In forgiving, we do not forget; we remember in a different way" (The Ministry of Reconciliation: Spirituality and Strategies).

Indeed, in our forgiveness journeys, we cannot and should not forget the history of violence and harm. Rather, we must learn to let go of the anger and hatred that feeds the cycle of violence. This release of negative emotions through forgiveness allows us to build, in the words of Pope Francis, "a shared hope stronger than the desire for vengeance" (Fratelli Tutti, 226).

Myth #2: Forgiveness is incompatible with justice.

On the contrary, justice and forgiveness are intimately linked. When someone forgives, they do not give up their right to seek justice.

In Dives In Misericordia, St. John Paul II says that without the presence of merciful love, justice gets distorted into revenge. (Think: "An eye for an eye.") The end goal of mercy is true justice, which addresses harm while also affirming the human dignity of all persons impacted.

To Pope Francis, mercy and justice are two dimensions of a single reality, working together towards the fullness of God's love. "God's justice," Francis writes, "is his mercy given to everyone as a grace that flows from the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ' (Misericordiae Vultus, 21).

"Forgiveness is precisely what enables us to pursue justice without falling into a spiral of revenge or the injustice of forgetting" (Fratelli Tutti, 252).

Myth #3: Forgiveness is weak.

Experientially, we know that forgiveness is challenging and can require inner strength and external support. St. Thomas Aquinas speaks of God's mercy as a sign of his strength: "It is proper to God to exercise mercy, and he manifests his omnipotence particularly in this way" (Summa Theologiae).

An ancient collect of the Mass offers a similar insight: "O God, who reveal your power above all in your mercy and forgiveness..." (Misericordiae Vultus, 6).

Recognizing that forgiveness is difficult and that it is understandable that some people are unable to forgive, Pope Francis states that forgiveness "shows its strength by refusing to take revenge" (Fratelli Tutti, 243)

For Fr. Schreiter, the vulnerability that love and mercy require is a sign of strength. Vulnerability is not weakness or "an unwanted deficit of power," but a freely chosen stance of trust and love (The Ministry of Reconciliation).

Myth #4: Forgiveness demeans victims of harm or negates the harm done to them.

Forgiveness is compatible with seeking justice for the survivors of wrongdoing and does not negate their pain and suffering. Forgiveness is not demeaning but a free choice by the survivor, through which survivors reclaim personal agency and redefine their relationship to the past.

As Pope Francis explains, "Free and heartfelt forgiveness is something noble, a reflection of God's own infinite ability to forgive. . . Those who truly forgive do not forget. . . They break the vicious circle; they halt the advance of the forces of destruction." (Fratelli Tutti, 250-251)

In justice, no one can or should be forced to forgive, and no other person can justly forgive on behalf of victims.

Myth #5: Forgiveness cannot happen unless the perpetrator repents.

The truth is that, as an act of freedom and renewed personal agency, survivors can and do forgive without regard to the attitudes of the wrongdoer. It is possible for survivors to let go of their anger, to envision and create a future not controlled by the past, without first reconciling with the perpetrator of the harm they suffered.

Consider the words of St. Paul: "But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:8).

In the salvific plan of God, love precedes repentance. People must know their innate dignity as children of God, prior to being called to transformation.

Love, including in the form of forgiveness, has a transformative power which can help move people who have caused harm to repentance.


