ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF COUNTRY

In the spirit of reconciliation, we acknowledge the traditional custodians of the lands in which the Catholic Parish of St John XXIII and the Diocese of Parramatta sits, the land of the Darug and Gundungurra people. We would like to pay our respects to the Aboriginal Elders past, present and future for they hold the traditions, memories and wisdom of Mother Earth on which we place our feet upon today.

Gospel Reflection

History is helpful for understanding such feasts as the Exaltation of the Holy Cross. After Saint Helena is claimed to have found the True Cross in AD 326, Emperor Constantine the Great, her son, ordered the Church of the Holy Sepulchre (or of the Resurrection, in Greek) to be built at the site. It was consecrated on 13 September 335, and on the following day, today, Helena's Cross was publicly shown for veneration. This observance spread in various forms and is still observed in all three ancient branches of the Church (Catholic, Orthodox, and Eastern Orthodox), all focusing on the veneration of the cross itself as the sign of salvation. While the feast has a focus on the cross, like a second Good Friday, it can also be considered a global celebration of Jerusalem's main church, similar to our observance of the dedication of Rome's cathedral, the Lateran Basilica. The first reading was chosen for an obvious reason: it is referred to in today's Gospel that says the Son of Man would be lifted up as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert (John 3:14). The Hebrew does not say directly that Moses lifted the bronze serpent, but it is implied by its being placed on a standard or pole that it might be seen. The Gospel reading (John 3:13-17) refers to the Son of Man's being lifted up, but it is found not only here, early in John, but also in 8:28 and 12:32, 34 (following the entry into Jerusalem, with a comment in between that this signified how he would die). This image is peculiar to John, but in this chapter alone it is associated with today's first reading, Numbers 21:4-9. However, John's use of it appears to be related also to the interpretation in Wisdom 16:5-14. There the raised serpent is explained as the symbol of deliverance in the Greek, or the sign of salvation in the Latin (v.6). That author said that whoever turned to the sign was saved, not by what was seen, but by God, Saviour of all (v.7), and that they were healed not by any medicine but by the Word of God, which heals all things (v.12). Only God has power over life and death, the capacity to lead

anyone to the gate of death (or Hades) and to lead back again (v.13). Humans may through malice kill, but they cannot bring the dead to life. It is easy to see how this passage in Wisdom was seen by early Christians, perhaps especially in the Johannine community, as a prophecy of Christ, the Word made flesh, who died and was raised to life. John emphasises what is only implied in Numbers, and entirely absent from Wisdom, that this sign is lifted up. The verb used in Greek (hypsō) is also synonymous with exalt or glorify, both used of Christ in his death and resurrection. The sole instance of a compound form of the same verb (hyperypsō) is employed in today's second reading (Philippians 2:6-11). Various linguistic elements reveal this to be a poetic hymn that Paul borrowed, and its very existence testifies to a creative vibrancy within the infant Christian communities, which were already expressing themselves in new ways of worship. It is called the Kenotic Hymn, after its key word, he emptied (v.7), and it praises God the Father who "super-exalted" the self-humbled Jesus from death, making him the object of veneration by all in the realms of heaven, and earth, and death. The text appears to have much in common with Johannine expression, but Paul added his own comment in the middle, identified by the way it interrupts the clear poetic structure: "even death on a cross". This reference to the cross is a particularly Pauline concern; indeed Paul is the New Testament writer who mentions it most. Returning to the first reading, the appearance of the fiery serpents is in response to the people's complaining about the lack of bread and water, and saying they loathe this "unsatisfying food", more directly translated as "bland bread", referring to the manna. In answer, the cross, as it is expressed in the liturgical hymns for Good Friday, offers the new medicine that truly saves, the Bread of life that truly satisfies.




COLUMBARIUM



Good to Know

Feast of Exultation of the Cross

Quote: But may I never boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, through which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world. ~Galatians 6:14

Reflection: The Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, also known as the Feast of the Triumph of the Cross, commemorates three historical events: the discovery of the True Cross in 326, its initial exaltation for public veneration in 335, and the recovery of the Cross from the Persians in 628. Nowadays, this feast also celebrates the boundless impact of Christ's Cross upon all of creation.

The Edict of Milan, issued in 313, granted religious freedom across the Roman Empire. This was a mutual agreement between Roman Emperors Constantine I in the West and Licinius in the East. Before this edict, Christians had endured various state-sponsored persecutions over the prior two and a half centuries.

After the Edict was signed, from 314 to 324, Constantine and Licinius were in continual conflict. The tension escalated when Constantine accused Licinius of plotting against him. In 324, Constantine defeated Licinius in battle and subsequently executed him on charges of conspiracy. This made Constantine the sole ruler of the Roman Empire, including Jerusalem, which had previously been under Licinius's control.

In 326, Constantine's mother, Saint Helena, a devout Christian, embarked on a pilgrimage to the Holy Land. Her mission was to identify significant sites from Christ's life and establish churches at those locations. In Jerusalem, she aimed to find the True Cross and to build a church over the sites of Mount Calvary and Jesus' tomb, known as the Holy Sepulchre. Upon identifying Mount Calvary and the empty tomb, she discovered three discarded and buried crosses. After an investigation, the local bishop confirmed they were the crosses used to crucify Jesus and the two thieves. Since Helena did not know which cross was Christ's, she arranged for a sick woman to touch all three. The woman was immediately healed upon touching one of them, indicating that it was the True Cross.

Following the discovery of the True Cross, Mount Calvary, and Christ's tomb, Emperor Constantine ordered the construction of a church to encompass these sites and house the True Cross. The Church of the Holy Sepulchre was erected and dedicated on September 13, 335. As the legend goes, the following day, Christ's Cross was brought outside the newly built church for the faithful to venerate. Thus, the first showing, or Exaltation of the Holy Cross, might have occurred on September 14, 335. Over the next three centuries, because liturgical celebrations were not widely centralized, the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross was likely celebrated annually in Jerusalem and varied in other ecclesiastical jurisdictions.

In 614, the Persians invaded Jerusalem and took the True Cross as a trophy. The Persians, primarily followers of the ancient religion of Zoroastrianism, were not Christians. Allowing the Holy Cross to remain in their possession was seen as sacrilegious. Eight years later, in 622, Eastern Roman Emperor Heraclius initiated military campaigns to recapture Jerusalem and the True Cross. Finally, in 628, he triumphed, and the following year, Emperor Heraclius entered Jerusalem with the True Cross, restoring it to the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. After that, the Feast of the Holy Cross became a universal celebration within the Church, starting in Rome and subsequently spreading throughout the entire empire, and has been celebrated annually on September 14 ever since.


Although we commemorate these three historical events today, the core of our celebration is not the physical wood of the Cross or the holy sites where Jesus died and was buried. Our primary focus is the infinite love shown through the selfless and perfect Sacrifice of the Son of God and the boundless mercy that has poured forth upon the world as a result. The Cross itself is a cruel instrument of torture and death. The fact that it is now the symbol of God's perfect love only further magnifies that love and showcases God's infinite power to use the worst for the best: to use death to bring life and to transform the greatest act of cruelty ever known into the greatest act of mercy ever bestowed upon the world.

The Cross of Christ must permeate each one of us, transforming us and making us new. First and foremost, this happens when we open ourselves to the infinite mercy of God flowing from that selfless Sacrifice. It also occurs when we allow every one of our sufferings, the injustices we endure, the crosses, hardships, and most undesirable aspects of our lives to share in the redemptive power of Christ. We do this when we embrace Jesus' commands to share in His sufferings, unite them with His own, and allow Him to bear an abundance of good fruit through us. "Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me. For whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it" (Matthew 16:24–25).

As we commemorate the triumph of Christ's Cross, call to mind the crosses you bear each day. More often than not, when faced with crosses, we seek a way out, succumb to self-pity, and are often tempted by anger and despair. Instead, try to allow Jesus to enter those crosses, transform them, and use them for His glory, your good, and the good of others. Crosses in life should not be avoided; they must be transformed. Although the suffering may remain, it must become redeemed suffering, thus bearing an abundance of good fruit in ways that only God can accomplish.

Prayer: Most glorious and triumphant Lord, You gave Your life for the salvation of my soul, using the most horrific act of cruelty as the means of Your redeeming grace. I open myself to that grace today and pray that You bestow it in superabundance. I also pray that I will have the courage and wisdom to embrace my crosses every day of my life, uniting them to Your Cross, and trusting that You will use these sacrifices as a means of the further bestowal of Your love on the world. Saving Cross of Christ, have mercy on me. Jesus, I trust in You.


