In the spirit of reconciliation, we acknowledge the traditional custodians of the lands in which the Catholic Parish of St John XXIII and the Diocese of Parramatta sits, the land of the Darug and Gundungurra people. We would like to pay our respects to the Aboriginal Elders past, present and future for they hold the traditions, memories and wisdom of Mother Earth on which we place our feet upon today.

Gospel Reflection

Context determines meaning—an ever useful maxim. The Lectionary gives today's parable, generally misnamed "The Rich Man and Lazarus", no more context than its being addressed to Pharisees. Isolated from its context, and as concerns about heaven and hell gained attention, this parable has often been taken to be particularly interested in describing the topography of the underworld or afterlife. It shares many features with other ancient texts with the same setting (and later literature, e.g., Dante's Inferno), but topographical details are always secondary and subservient to the qualities of the persons involved. We would also do well to remember that as Jesus travelled around he may have used some parables more than once and in differing contexts, and that not all versions could be preserved in the relatively short gospels. Today's parable appears to have two possible contexts and uses. The first arose in last Sunday's reading, with Jesus teaching the disciples to make friends using unrighteous mammon "and thus make sure that when it fails you, they will welcome you into the tents of eternity" (16:9). The more immediate cue picks that up, but this is omitted from the Sunday Lectionary: "The Pharisees, who loved money, heard all this and laughed at him" (16:14). This first context concerns the use of one's goods in the service of others who may never be able to return the kindness on earth. The immediate cue (16:14) was probably omitted because the four intervening verses seem disconnected, as most easily noted in the final one, where Jesus says, "Anyone who divorces his wife and marries another commits adultery..." (16:18), but all four deal with the Pharisees' relationship with the Law. It is evident from later rabbinic texts that the Law was envisaged allegorically as the daughter of God given in marriage as the spotless bride to Israel at Sinai. Luke appears to be an early witness to this tradition, with Jesus sharply accusing the Pharisees of being adulterers for having divorced themselves from the Law to marry something else, something of their own devising. This is the second context of the parable, one of a dispute as to who the true heirs of Abraham are and who the true spouse of the Law

Turning attention to the content of the parable, note first that its unique use of names is not trivial. The first name, Lazarus, was later confused with Lazarus of Bethany, brother of Martha and Mary, since John (12:1-7) has Jesus at supper there with Lazarus, with Martha serving, and is anointed by Mary, while Mark (14:3-9) and Matthew (26:6-13) report an anointing at a supper in the house of "Lazarus the leper" in Bethany, which Luke sets it in an unnamed town in the home of a Pharisee named Simon (read on Sunday 11C). This attempt at identifying the parable's Lazarus with an historical character ignores the fictitious nature of parables. However, the name Lazarus is a later form of that found in Genesis 15:2, Eliezer, who though technically a gentile is Abraham's chosen heir for want of a son. Later Jewish folklore continues to tell stories of Abraham and Eliezer. If this is the original intent, it points to the parable's being used to suggest that gentiles may lay claim to being the true heirs of Abraham's promise rather than those who are his descendants in the flesh, as was the parable's rich man who persistently addressed Abraham as "Father". This fits well with the progentile trajectory of Luke's writings.

The major focus in the parable is the conversation between Abraham and the rich man, sometimes called Dives, "rich man" in Latin. Abraham is the first in Scripture to be called rich (Genesis 13:2), so this parable contrasts two rich men. The differences between them are exposed in the first part of the parable, which compares with the story of the hospitality of Abraham (read on Sunday 16C): Abraham runs to welcome the visitors, but this rich man ignores the beggar at his gate; Abraham provides water for them to wash, but this rich man leaves it to the dogs to wash Lazarus; Abraham offers a bit of bread yet feasts his guests, but this rich man does not even give the fallings from his table. This rich man fails in any way to be like Abraham; not using his considerable wealth for the good of others, not even from what was surplus to his needs, he forfeits any claim to being Abraham's

"My son," Abraham replied "remember that during your life good things came your way, just as bad things came the way of Lazarus. Now he is being comforted here while you are in agony. But that is not all: between us and you a great gulf has been fixed, to stop anyone, if he wanted to, crossing from our side to yours, and to stop any crossing from your side to ours."

"The rich man replied, "Father, I beg you then to send Lazarus to my father's house, since I have five brothers, to give them warning so that they do not come to this place of torment too." "They have Moses and the prophets," said Abraham, "let them listen to them." "Ah, no, father Abraham," said the rich man "but if someone comes to them from the dead, they will repent." Then Abraham said to him, "If they will not listen either to Moses or to the prophets, they will not be convinced even if someone should rise from the dead.""


COLUMBARIUM





PURPOSE OF THE MASS

Church documents describe the Mass as having many purposes, some of which we have described below.

The Mass is a time when Jesus is present with us

'Christ is always present in the Church, especially in its Liturgical Celebrations.' (CSL no.7)

During the Mass, Jesus is present in the form of the Word, the bread and wine when it is changed into the Body and Blood of Christ, by the action of the Holy Spirit; through the Priest and through us, the community, which has gathered together.

The Mass is a time when we pray through words, actions and gestures

We take part by acclamations, responses, songs, actions and gestures.' (CSL 30) When we celebrate the Mass we participate through the words, actions and gestures.

The Mass is a time to listen and respond to God's Word

In the reading, God's word is laid before the people and the treasures of the Bible opened to them.' (GIRM 33-34)

During the Liturgy of the Word, we listen to the Word of God in the readings and the Gospel and then respond in prayer to each.

The Mass as a community of believers gathered together

For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them.' (Mt 18:20)

The Mass is an opportunity for us to join together as a community of believers and pray and celebrate together.

The Mass is a memorial celebration

The Eucharist is a 'memorial of the Lord's Passion and Resurrection.' (CCC 1330) Jesus instructed his apostles to 'Do this in memory of me' at the Last Supper, and so we memorialise Jesus' Death and Resurrection at every Eucharistic celebration. The words and actions of the Last Supper are repeated during every Mass at the Eucharistic Prayer.

The Mass is a thanksgiving celebration

The Eucharist is an action of thanksgiving.' (CCC 1328)

The word Eucharist means thanksgiving. When we celebrate the Mass we are participating in a thanksgiving celebration. We give thanks for all that had been given to us by God, particularly the gift that is Jesus.

The Mass is a time when we share and celebrate our faith in Jesus

We gather at Mass that we may hear and express our faith.' (Music in Catholic Worship no.1)

In addition to being an opportunity to celebrate and express our faith in Jesus, the Mass is a time when our faith in Jesus is shared and has the opportunity to grow and develop. Through listening to the Word and the Priest's homily, we are able to draw closer in our faith in Jesus and develop a greater understanding of the life of Jesus.

The Mass is a time to share and to be nourished by God's gifts

'Take; this is my body... this is my blood of the covenant.' (Mk 14:22-25)

The Mass is a shared celebration where our faith is nourished by the Body and Blood of Christ, just as it is nourished through listening to the Word.

The Mass challenges us to go out and live as Jesus would

We are sent forth to live the Gospel in our daily lives.' (Directory for Mass with Children no.54)

At the end of Mass we are called to go out into the world and take our beliefs in Jesus and our knowledge of His life out into our own lives and to live a truly Christian life.

Why we do what we do at mass

The Catholic liturgy includes many different gestures, postures, and symbols. As a Catholic, you are likely familiar with these practices, which include sitting, standing, and kneeling during Mass. But these gestures all have specific meanings and are designed to help us pray with all of our being: not only mind and soul, but body as well. To better understand the meaning behind these physical movements, we need to keep in mind two important aspects of the Catholic Mass — that the priest acts in the person of Christ, and that Jesus is present in the Eucharist.

Standing and speaking in the place of Jesus, the celebrating priest leads us with the gestures, traditions, and rituals that are part of the Order of the Mass, and we respond to these with our own actions and words. In this way, the Mass is much like a conversation and shared meal with Christ Himself.

Secondly, Jesus is fully present in the consecrated Eucharist, in His Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity. This is the Catholic doctrine of transubstantiation, which states that the bread and wine literally become Jesus during the Eucharistic Prayer of the Mass.

So, why do we assume each specific posture and make different gestures during the Mass, and what do they signify?

Why We Sit During the Mass

After the Introductory Rite at each Mass, we sit for the Liturgy of the Word. As we listen to the readings from the lectionary, sitting indicates our willingness to be students at the feet of Jesus. We also sit down for the Homily, as we pay close attention and take in what is being preached. We are seated again while the Eucharistic elements are being prepared: a gesture of anticipation, as we prepare ourselves for and eagerly await the climax of the Mass in the Eucharistic Prayer.

Why We Stand During the Mass

At the very beginning of the Mass, we stand for the Introductory Rite, which includes the Penitential Act. Here we acclaim the Kyrie Eleison, meaning "Lord, have mercy" in Greek. The Kyrie is an ancient Christian prayer in which we confess our sins to both our Almighty Father and our fellow Christians. Standing during the Penitential Act shows that we are owning up to our sinfulness and openly asking for the Lord's mercy.

Standing is also a simple but profound way of honoring and respecting Jesus during the Mass, both in the person of the priest and in the scriptures, especially the Gospel. While we sit for the first and second readings, we stand for the Gospel reading. The Gospel is the pinnacle of the Word of God and to hear it proclaimed aloud is a great honor, which is why we rise from our seats and proclaim "Alleluia" as it is opened. Just before the reading of the Gospel, we make a small sign of the cross with our thumb over our foreheads, lips, and hearts. This simple act is a symbolic request for God to impress His Word upon our minds, lips, and hearts. When the priest or deacon has finished reading the Gospel, he shows respect to the Word of God by kissing the Gospel. After the homily, we stand back up to pray the Nicene Creed as a Profession of Faith, once again standing firm in our ownership of our faith.

Why We Kneel During the Mass

Kneeling is the most humble posture of worship during the Mass. When we kneel, we completely surrender ourselves to our Heavenly Father. We kneel during several parts of the Mass. After the Holy, Holy, Holy, we spend almost the rest of the Mass on our knees — an incredible act of faith and devotion by which we acknowledge that Jesus is personally present among us.

As we kneel during the Eucharistic Prayer, the priest's many gestures are also precise and meaningful. He makes the Sign of the Cross over the bread and wine and proclaims Christ's own words: "This is my Body," and "This is my Blood". As the bread and wine are consecrated, the priest kneels several times in front of the Blessed Sacrament to express reverence. Before or while receiving the Eucharist, it is traditional to kneel, bow, or genuflect to express your humility before God.

The Mass is rich with meaning — every element and gesture represents something profound and beautiful. When we understand them and take them to heart, each moment we spend at Mass will become more transformative and nourishing to our souls.


